no longer of interest to the news media.**

At ten minutes past midnight, October 18, 1953, a National Airlines DC-3, just out of the domain en route for Washington, was flying over the Conowingo Dam. The pilot had just reported his position and estimated arrival time. He hung up the microphone and settled back for a routine milk run to the National Airport. Thirty seconds later he found himself confronted with a possible mid-air collision. A shiny, disc-shaped object shot out of a thin layer of clouds and came rushing at him. The co-pilot flipped on the wing lights as a warning. In return the object sent a blinding beam of white light into the cockpit of the airplane. The pilot, with only a few seconds left, threw the big DC-3 into a dive at full power. The object that had almost rammed them shot past overhead and vanished. The story of this unidentified flying object that apparently tried to ram a commercial airliner loaded with passengers appeared in the Washington Post next morning. It ran in only one edition. Then it was taken out, and it did not appear in any other paper, nor did it appear on any news wire—although such an incident was front-page news. It is obvious from this that censorship had taken place.

Report of Radar Sightings of UFOBS

I. **INITIAL REPORT:** Initial Report of Subject UFORS made 17 October 1953
Ref: TWX 151-J from Commander 528th Air Defense Group Presque Isle AFB, Maine
17/1737/Oct 53.

II. **INVESTIGATION:** At 17/0200Z/Oct 53, Limestone AFB, GCA Station (GOEREF HKGB 1055) alerted Presque Isle AFB, GCA Station (GOEREF HKGB 5841), in an effort to confirm observations of unidentified objects seen on Limestone AFB, PPI Radar scope. Presque Isle AFB, GCA Station went into operation at 17/0230Z/Oct 53. The objects were located and observed by M/Sgt. STANLEY YUCIKAS, M/Sgt EDWYN F. NEWELL, T/Sgt NORMAN K. FALLS and A/1C WILLIAM M. BRINLY of the 1974th Airways & Air Communications Service Squadron, Presque Isle AFB, during the period 17/0230Z/Oct 53 to 17/0445Z/Oct 53. Initial Report indicated duration of observation 16/0230Z/Oct 53 to 17/0445Z/Oct 53. This is erroneous, duration of observation was 17/0230Z/Oct 53 to 17/0445Z/Oct 53. Objects were approximately twenty five (25) in number, resembled conventional A/C targets on PPI scope. One (1) F-89 aircraft was scrambled at 17/0308Z/Oct 53 to attempt interception. No physical or electronic observation or contact was made. The objects were observed at irregular intervals, in groups of three (3) to eight (8). They first appeared within ten (10) mile marker on PPI scope in NW Quadrant (App 340 degrees). From NW Quadrant objects traveled in approximately same path, without deviating, and then disappeared in ground return in SW Quadrant (App 225 degrees). All objects traveled at approximate speed of eighty (80) to one hundred (100) miles per hour. There was no apparent formation, some tracks were parallel, others followed preceding tracks. Exact tracks were not plotted, nor were photos of PPI scope made. Altitude could not be determined, due to limitations of GCA set, but was estimated to be from 2000' to 6000' feet. Altitude estimated at a three (3°) degree angle of tilt of radar antenna.

B-36 type aircraft in vicinity during this period employed electronic E.C.M. intermittently from 17/0234Z/Oct 53 to 17/0258Z/Oct 53.


