On 20 November 1953, Drive, Marietta, Ohio, Telephone: employed at Quaker State Engineering Company, First National Bank, Marietta, Chio, Telephone: at approximately 0830 hours, 20 November 1953, he, accompanied by his brother to 27 Southeast Seventh Street, Evansville, Indiana, and Street address unknown, Detroit, Michigan, were driving west on US Route Alternate 50, and at a point approximately ten (10) miles west of Marietta, fairly close to the Wood County Airport, when they noticed a luminous object, directly south of their position, noving slowly from east to west at approximately a 1500 foot lateral distance and an altitude of approximately eight (8) to ten (10) thousand feet. Suddenly the object made approximately a thirty degree lateral angle southward and then accelerated rapidly out of sight. All three (3) persons observed the object's flight; but because of its luminous surface and distance of observation, it was difficult to ascertain its shape or size.
