



To whom it may concern.

Date of Occurrance - Monday April 25th, 1954 - between 3:30 & 4:00 P.M.

I was standing at the rear of the Newburyport high School talking with two people, a Mr. and his wife, when I suddenly hear a loud noise from the sky. It was a noise similar to a newerful motor, - a noise which accelerated rapidly and died down rapidly. My first thought was of a rapidly approaching jet and yet the sound was more of a motor character that a jet. I immediately looked skyward and saw a circular ring of rather strong intensity. The shape was similar to this: (5), with a protrusion within the ring circumirence. The space within the two lines was of a oright bluish white. The inner space was dark. The object seemed to be moving in a downward direction, slightly to the right, followed by a vaporous, or smoky, trail. As the object approached its greatest intensity it seemed to stop and travel upward again in a right direction forming an angle between its dommward and upward onth of about 450 to 600. As the object appeared to recede it became less bright and took the appearance of a solid, paler, disc, and then disappeared entirily from view. The sound which I heard at the beginning lasted for approximately 5 seconds, and the object was visable for about 30 seconds. When talking about the phenomena at house later in the evening, my daughter mentioned that she had also heard the noise while' in the house at the same time that I had heard it. My home is about a mile from the school where I was standing. My daughter is thirteen years of age, and I honestly believe it was the same sound that I had heard. There were to planes in the sky within this vicinity at the time this phenomena took place. I sky was only partially obscured with scattered high clouds. There were no clouds near the spot where the object appeared. The object was unquestionably at a very high altitude, and it was also much brighter than the scattered clouds in the distance.

This is a true description of the object as I saw it.
