



1. The following is an extract from the 1975-1 AACS Daily Report of Controller dated 5 March 1954 which was supervised by A/20 11235276, 1975-1 AACS Detachment, Novasseur Air Depot:

"1918 - AF 6537 reports unidentified A/C or objects making passes at him. NO-97's position was 1500 ft, 5-8 ml SW of station.

"1938 - AF 6529 reserves likewise; Unid targets were on West Heading approx
1500 ft, 6-8 mi S of Sta. No incident.

"1949 - AF 6529 rpts again; target was 5 mi SW of station approx 1500 ft. Appeared to be two or three A/C; one passed under and one passed over 6529; he was umble to ident type, etc. but believes them to be conventional type A/C... ATC says no A/C rprtd here, GGA nor Randall can pick up anything on scores.

"2010 - Talked with pilet of AF 5289, G-47; Says he saw targets about same locale as 97's but there was no incident; says the target apprel to be approx 500 ft abv, to him locked like one big A/G...still nothing on scores. Nothing fr ATG...Also...About 1945-50 am A/G, AF 2844, broke traffic to look for objects but sould see nothing; all A/G mentioned were on CGA appr at the time.

"2155 - AF 2684, G-54, rptd similar circumstance...a bright light similar to A/G ludg lt at some alt accapta come to within two miles of A/G and then either shut off or west behind cloud...WI carrying clear skies; came on again and started to sink to grad then appeal up again and lit and then A/G loot sight of it.

"2223 - Randall Otl says they have target about 10,000 ft on hing of 180 for their stations and about 25 miles out. Target appears stationary. GCA can see nothing. Checking with ATC.

"2243 - Remdell new rpts tots at 10,000 ft, 12-14 mi South.

"2305 - Remdell now rpts tgte at 15,000 ft, 15 ml South, brng 185 degs.

"2310 - CGA rots 3 trets, maller than a G-47 tret, Mi of station, 3-4 mi, alt 2,000 on track of 240 dogs.

"2315 - GGA has two more trets now same locale on bdng of 255 degs, all moving very slowly.

"2324 - Randell has two trgts, 2 miles spart, brng 180 degs, 22 most miles, 10,000 ft. Trgts vary alternately in intensity, one bright and one week, not very large.

"0015 - ... Provious logs being reviewed by BASOFS regarding 'Flying Sensor's

"0035 - Randell spotted target 25 miles North of Station.

Air Depot, gave the fellowing information from memory. Airman Grossman estimated the times given insermed as his watch was inaccurate.

"At approximately 2147-2150, the pilot of NO-97, #6537, shooting GGA landings, approximately 6 mi SN quadrant of Nounescur range, saked if there were any targets straight shead and same altitude on the collission heading of his aircraft. NO-97, #6537, was at 1500 feet on a heading of 175 degs. No targets on radar except NO-97 - no moving targets. Turned NO-97 on base leg and pilot completed approach. He stated that the target appeared to be a 'comple of lights'.

"The next aircraft, HL-97, #6429, approximately 5 miles behind and approximately same position, reported seeing 2 lights appearing to be fighter aircraft at the same altitude and coming in at it left to field. The aircraft turned a base leg and completed approach. We further mention of targets.

The next aircraft, HI-97, #527, appeared to be in the same position as provious aircraft (approx 2120 hours) when the pilot stated he was going to get out of pattern and go around because objects were making passes at him. No sighting on some except Aeft #527. Nade Left Nurs, 360 dogs out of pattern and continued approach.

"A further incident occurred at approximately 2215 hrs. Acft #2684, 0-54, from lagoe, in approximately the same position of former sireraft, called and asked if there was a target 2 or 3 miles sheed at the same altitude (2000 ft). We sighting on seeps, Filet of #2684 described the target as an aircraft landing light which seemed to descend and assemble.

"No rilete sould give comercte description of target; pilete stated light was moving - one pilet says two objects. All pilets recerted it on approximately the same altitude but sould give no octimate of speed.

"The venther at the time of sightings was clear, no cloude, no have and with visibility at 7 miles. All sightings, approximately 6 miles 50 of field, were made at the approximate time aircraft were proparing to make a turn on base log. Targets never appeared on GGA seemes - Tower requested search - search seems put on at 30 mile range but misked up nothing except permanent targets."

3. T/Sgt Account the 1600S to 2400S shift, 5 March 1954, as Movement Identification Technician at Site /1, Medicum, reported the followings

"At approximately 2200-2230 hours, Light Endvised that information had been received to the effect that there was a possibility of flying sausers in the area. It. "The did not request up to make an identification since apparently no neversets had been plotted on the plot board. He plots were made although an object was found on the height finder at 10,000 ft and 185 or 189 degrees South of the station, 22 knots. The error was unable to locate this object on the min scope due to ground clutter in the area which is apparent for an area of approximately 30 miles".



SYNOPSES

Investigation initiated by the District Commander, North Africa District OSI, APO 118, USAF. At 2230 hours, 5 March 1954, Captain THEODORE A. BORST, Hos., 316th Air Division (Defense), advised that Radar Control Site #1 had reported unidentified serial objects flying in vicinity of Nousseur Air Depot. Investigation reflected that objects reported by Reder Site /1 believed to be due to "atmospherie phenomens. Targets reported by Nonasseur GC& identified to be known, permenent targets. Investigation reflected that during evening, 5 March 1954, pilete from three (3) of five (5) siroraft were flying in immediate area of Monosseur Air Depot and reported observing one (1) or two (2) white lights approaching their flight path at approximately same altitude while flying on down-wind lag. Lights reported to be: (1) Landing Light, (2) Two- (2-) ship formstion-possibly jets. Light appeared "amber" to one (1) Navigator. All observations unde while under GCA control immediately prior to turning on base leg; altitude 1500-2000 feet. A fourth aircraft verified previously reported unidentified object as C-47. 



BRADSHAW could add no further information pertinent to this inquiry

5 At OCIS hours 6 Farch 1954 Captain WILLIAM N. POND AO 4521CE Alreraft Commander, C-54 #2684, advised 3/4 WELCH that at approximately 2150 hours while flying at 2000 feet indicated altitude under Nomesseur-GCA control, on down-wind leg heading 1700, he observed a white light, which he thought to be the Landing light of another aircrafts to the left of his course at approximately the same altitude and heading in a Westerly direction, that is, on a collision course. As he proceeded on the down-wind legs FOND continued, the light appeared to turn and head directly towards his sircraft. At this moment, FOND went one he called GGA and requested to know whether or not another sirereft was in the area. Gul replied that they had received similar reports during evening and that the GGi scope did not reflect other sireraft in the area. Upon completion of turn on base leg, POND stated, the light disappeared for approximately 10-15 seconds. When it was apparent again, PO'M continued, it appeared to be hovering and it remained "on" until completion of turn onto final approach, at which time it disappeared behind his siroraft. Full stated that he sould furnish no additional identifying data other than that reflected above.

POND's co-pilot, Lieutenant I. W. GHICHRIST, AO 3022876, reiterated the same facts. The navigator, Captain JAMES F. PULLEN,
AO 724070, while agreeing with POND's and GHICHRIST's statements, added
that the light appeared to him to be an "amber" color. POND volunteered
that he had eleven (11) years experience as pilot and that he has never
had a similar experience to report.

6. At 0030 hours, 6 March 1954, BRADSHAW (previously identified) advised S/A WEIGH that report from Sidi Slimans Air Operations reflected only one (1) sinuraft, a G-47 #5289, on Round Hobin eross-country flight to Nousseur Lie Depot. All other flights from that been during evening of 5 Herch 1954, were local B-26 flights which remained in the immediate area of Sidi Slimans.

7. On 6 March 1954, A/2G GEORGE D. VAN DYKE, AF 11235276, 1975—1 AAGS Detachment, on duty at Nousseur Control Tower from 1700 hours to 2400 hours, 5 March 1954, furnished the writer with a copy of the "Daily Report of Controller". This report is reflected in Paragraph 4 of this report.

TITIAL.

VAN DIKE stated that while receiving the reports indicating unidentified aircraft or objects in the area of Nousseur Air Depot, he visually searched the area in which the objects were reported to be. In each case, VAN DIKE continued, he would have the reporting aircraft in sight but all other observations were negative. VAN DIKE added that weather conditions were as follows: Dark, no moon; Clear, no precipitation; Visibility approximately six (6) to seven (7) miles. Summer in use was Sumber 35.

VAN DYKE further stated that USAF Air Traffic Control at Camp Cases had reported no scheduled aircraft due in area. VAN DIKE could add no further pertinent information.

8. On 6 March 1954, let Lieutement W. D. KEMMITZER, AO 2081709, 27-8 Weather Squadron, Weather Forecaster, advised the writer that at 2130 hours, 5 March 1954, the weather station released a white weather balloom. This balloom, KEMMITZER stated, had a very bright white light attached to it, which burns for approximately one (1) hour. The balloom, KEMMITZER went on, usually bursts at an altitude of ten (10) to twelves (12) thousand feet. However, has added, at night they have been known to reach an altitude of twenty (20) thousand feet, depending on atmospheric conditions.

MEMMITTER verified weather conditions during evening of 5 March 1954 as stated by VAN DYKE, reference laragraph 7, this report.

(AGENT'S NOTE: First sighting of unidentified object was at 1915 hours, 5 March 1954.)

9. On 6 March 1954, Major THOMAS R. MC CARN, AO 798533, Wing Administrative Inspector, Southern Air Material Area, APO 30, USAF, pilot on AF C-47 #2844, advised the writer that he and Major CECIL E. FIELDER, AO 749219, Southern Air Material Area, upon hearing reports of unidentified aircraft/objects South-West of station, flew into that area and conducted a thorough visual search. MC CARN stated that this search met with negative results. Weather conditions were described by MC CARN as reported in Paragraph 7, this report.

16. On 6 March 1954, A/2G JOSEPH E. CROSSMAN, AF 12381667, 1975—I AAGS Detechment, GCA (Ground Control Approach) Controller, on duty at GGA unit from 170G hours, 5 March to 080G hours, 6 March 1954, inter-timent by S/A DAMSON, corroborated information reflected in Control Towar Log (Ref. Per 4, this report). CROSSMAN added that the GGA ten

(10) mile search scope indicated that sightings, which were reported to be in the SouthWest area, were made at approximate time subject aircraft were preparing to turn onto base leg. CROSSMAN continued that search of area with ten (10) and thirty (30) mile scopes failed to detect reported objects. 13. On 9 March 1954, Captain G. E. BROWN, AO 764200; Let Lieutenant L. B. GORDON, AO 2223842; and Let Lieutenant J. P. GLOVER, AO 3021699; Pilote, 301st Air Refueling Squadron, 301st Bank Wing, Gree of AF EG-97, #6537, during evening of 5 March 1954, furnished the writer with the following information concerning their observations: Their first sighting of unidentified object(s) was made at approximately 1915 hours while under GGA control, on down-wind log, altitude 1500 feet; on heading 180°.

They stated that at this time, they observed two (2) white lighter to the right of their course at approximately the same altitudes. Though they could only see the lights, they believed them to be two (2) siroraft in formation as one (1) light was slightly lower than the other. 14. On 9 Parch 1954, lat Lieutenant HARRY J. SAVOY advised the writer that targets/objects which had been reported at "10,000 feet, twelve (12) miles South of the station" during evening of 5 March 1954, were non-existent. SAVOY explained that on 6 March 1954, the targets, as reported during the previous evening, continued to remain stationary on Radar Scope on a bearing of 1850. Visual check of area, SAVOY continued, reflected no such target. SAVOY added that occasionally as "atmospheric phenomena" is responsible for this type of target appearing on the Radar Scope. SAVOY could add no further pertinent information.

15. Major CHESTER F. KORZON, AC 1011165, Base Intelligence Officer, Southern Air Materiel Area, APO 30, USAF, was kept orally advised at all times of the above reported events as they occurred.

Robert Johnson, 357th Fighter-Interceptor Squadron, Noussear Air Dovot, sighted an unidentified flying object at 30,000 feet in the approximate area of 33°31'N 07°11'W, flying on a heading of 010 degrees. The object was estimated as being approximately 2000 feet in front of Lt. Johnson's aircraft but was observed without wing tanks or visible smoke trails. The speed of the observer's aircraft was approximately 370 mph at the time of first sighting the object. Lt. Johnson increased the speed of his aircraft to approximately 530 mph but did not overtake the object. Although the observer F-86 was directly following the object, the pilot stated that the object simply disappeared from his sight after approximately thirty seconds. The weather at the time of the sighting was clear above 22,000 feet.
- 2. The AGAN site at Medicum was contacted for information concerning rader targets noted during the period of the reported sighting with negative results. Captain Producisk Place, element leader of Lt. Johnson's flight, searched the area with Lt. Johnson after the object disappeared but with negative results.



At 2000%, 5 March 1954 the Cri-1 and Tri-100 primary search and heightfinder radar at Site #1, this unit, war put into operation from a "standby" status upon report of unidentified direraft south of Nouasseur Air Dass by Nousessur Air Bass Operations.
