On II March 1954, while attempting to pick up targets during exercise battle stations we locked on an object at first believed to be a stationary ground target. During the complete period of observation the object maither changed position in altitude, azimuth, range or elevation. The size and shape of the object was undetermined.

The object was first sighted approximately 2230 hrs 11 March 1954, and observed until Site # 70 was relieved approximately 1300 hrs 12 March 1954.

The object appeared on the "A" scopes of the track radar as one sharp return. The item could not be observed on the PPI scope due to the acquisition radar being out of action. Spotters wore put out but no visual contact of the target was available.
