On Sunday, Haroh 20, 1954, an unidentified flying object was seen over parts of Eastern Commediant composing the borns of Danielson, Plainfield, Moosup, Jawett City, Morwich, New London and others. The object was viewed for an approximate hour between 5 % 6 p.m. by hundreds of people throughout the areas mentioned above. The object caused anough constornation to have the local paper besigged with telephone calls requesting information on tho sighting. Police barracks were also alerted by some citizens.

The Harch 29th issue of the Horwich Bulletin had a short account of sighting, they listing the event as probably sither a balloon sighting or a sighting of Venus. The article also said other reports on object varied, as in direction object moved. The article made no effort to actually identify object.

The following is a resume of several eye witness reports as given to the author of this article:

Time of Sighting: 5:00 - 6:30 p.m. approximately. Dete: Sundey, March 23, 1954. Teather: Exceptionally clear with no clouds visible. Shape of Object: Round - A few observors said object had depth roundness like a ball - Most would not hazzard guess as to this fact, they saying only that object appeared round from bottom. Hany observors said object was definitely oliptical in shape. Two observors said it appeared hollow in center. Movement: All but one or two observors claimed movement was in different directions - horizontally and vertically but movement was in general easterly direction. This did not coincide with round wind at that time. All observors said object appeared lower at times. Then it disappeared it woved off streight up until it could no longer be seen. Color: At most times object was a bright metalic color. Observors felt that object was too bright to watch, and they felt the maces ity of shielding their eyes. All observors agreed that object acemed to change color at times, especially when moving. At this time, the top portion seemed to glow orange and red. Those observors watching through bineculars or scopes arreed that there seemed to be fire around object. Height: Height could only be approximated. All observors arreed object was far above regular transport planes' path, as some planes went over during sighting time. All observors agread object was higher than jets usually fly when jets are mere dots in the sky. At this height, object appeared through the naked eye about the size of an orange. Through 74 power binoculars, object appeared to be approximately 2 feet in diameter. Speed: Reports of speed differed. Some observors said object was moving slowly at all times; others said object moved very swiftly at times, so much so that it was impossible to keep object in sight through binoculars. Sound: Object was soundless at all times. Peculiarities: 1. One observor claimed he saw some sort of tail assembly at bottom of object, while looking at object through bineculars.

Comments:

All observors agree that object was something like which they'd never witnessed before. All objervors were convinced object was not a star, most observors were certain object was not a balloon. Object was seen at same time in localities at least 50 miles apart.

The last witness to contact me was one of a group of men in Horwich, Connecticut, who witnessed this sighting through powerful glasses. Among these men were some who were pilots, former pilots and engineers. Their account of sighting coincided with others noted above. This group was sure object was not a balloon; the men said object seemed to have energy because of its movements, etc. One man of this group, who after seeing object went into his house to telephone, noticed strange and unusual disturbances on his television set.

ly conclusion from above facts noted is that object was obviously not a star. There is still a pessibility that it was a balloon.



I had just completed the other long r report enclosed when another strange occurrence was brought to my attention.

I had placed a smell ad in a local paper requesting interesting reports on the March 28th sighting. This ad of course, had with it my name and address.

On Thursday, April 1, I received a phone call at 7:30 p.m. from an excited women who want i to know if I w re the one who requested informetion on the Sunday sighting. When I replied in the allimative, she asked for information on so ething strange her father-in-law had just witnessed. Her father-in-law a Fr. spoke only Polish, so she massed the information on to me with a translation of his words.

The story she told me was rather disjointed, but from what I could gather, the man had been outside of his home, in Goodyear, Connecticut, when he was suddenly covered by a bright light that cast shadows on the ground. Next, a Claming or bright object went over his head. He rushed in to his home for he was arparently badly frightened; he glanced at the clock immediately, and he placed the time at 7:15.

I asked the woman the direction in which object was moving, and I

learned it was heading north.

Because of the nature in which the report was given to me, I frankly did not rut much credence in it. Mr. about 200 feet in the sir; although this was low for a jet, this was what I in ediately thought it was although I'd failed to ask the man about the sound object made.

I was about to call Mr. of Mauregan, Connecticut, a man whom again when I had another call. I know well, and whose veracity I would never question.

The story im. gave me really startled me because it agreed with Mr. Here is the story as he told it to me without any em ellishments.

"At 7:15 this evening I was walking to my home when suddenly I was bathed in light. My first thought was that I was in the path of an on-coming car. The light cast huge shadows on the ground. As I glanced up a huge ball of light passed over.me. The light was 200 to 1000 feet up, and it was moving at tremeridous speed. Before a second had passed, it was sut of sight. I can only describe object as being spherical in shape and extremely bright. The object made no sound as all as it passed over me. It left no trail as a comet might."

I questioned lir. about the object's being a jet although of course, the fact object was silent pretty well ruled out its being a jet. Mr. was positive object was not a plane. Lot only because of lack of sound, but because of extreme speed. He said he had seen jets at low altitudes, but jets staged in sight longer than this object did.

Mr. said object was moving due north. It was headed directly toward the north star.

The summary of all this is that it was not a jet because of sound. Its being a comet is doubtful because of flat trajectory and this had no Tail showing. 'As to its being a fireball, I do not know, Because of soundlessness, that fact might be doubtful also.

Most interesting of all, I believe was the fact of object's being seen in two places, Goodyear and Wauregan, towns eight miles apart, at just about the same time. This is a real indication of the thing's speed.
