

- 1. This is in confirmation of a conversation between the Base Commander, Dobbins AFB and Mr. E. D. WALKER, Detachment Commander, Atlanta Detachment, Office of Special Investigations, concerning a report of an unidentified flying object:
- 2. On 10 May 1954 Mr. BRANT, ASIC, Atlanta Field Office, Federal Bureau of Investigation, telephonically advised S/A EMBERT D. WALKER, that Tucker, Georgia, had reported to Mr. BRANT the sighting of three objects that, in his estimation, were not conventional type aircraft.

SHAPE: Round; flying in horizontal position in relation

to earth.

SIZE: Estimated 20' diameter; thick in center, tapering to

thinner edges.

COLOR: Shiny appearance.

FORMATION: Three objects, flying in a V formation.

AERODYNAMIC FEATURES: None recognized.

VAPOR TRAIL OR EXHAUST TRAIL: None.

PROPULSION SYSTEM: Unknown

SPEED: Estimated 500 - 600 MPH.

SOUND: None.

MANEUVERS: None; straight flight.
