SPOT INTELLICENCE REPORT, Subj: Report of Unidentified Aerial Object by Major General the U.S. Marine Corps, Retired, 22 July 1954 at Coronado, California.

advised that, while standing in front of his home on Clorietta Eoulevard at exactly 0841 hours on this morning, he had heard the sound of an object which appeared to be proceeding slightly southwest at a speed which he estimated to be three to four times the speed of a Jet. General stated that he could make no estimation of the altitude, nor describe the object making the sound, as he did not see it as originally reported, but had heard its sound only. He said that the sound appeared to be above the overcast, which he estimated to be at 1500 feet with 700 feet scattered, and visibility six miles. General L further stated that he considered the sound he heard important enough to report, as during his 26 years in Marine aviation, he had become acquainted with the sound of Jets, rockets, and artillery shells, and that the sound he had heard did not seem to be any of these and appeared to come from an object travelling as fast or faster then an artillery shell. General said that immediately upon hearing the sound he went into his house, checked the time by telephone, and then reported the matter telephonically to the Duty Officer at the Naval Air Station.

3. ACTION: No similar reports relative to this matter were received, and no action was taken as a result of this report by this District Office.

- 1. SINOPSIS: On 22 July 1954, Major General 1. S. Marine Corps, Retired, advised that, while standing in front of his home on this date, he had heard the sound of an object in the overcast which indicated that it was proceeding in a southwesterly direction at an extreme rate of speed. Said that during his 26 years in Marine aviation, he had heard nothing comparable to this, and therefore felt the matter should be reported.
- 2. DETAILS: On 22 July 1954, Mr. C. District Intelligence Office, Eleventh Naval District, San Diego, California, telephonically advised Special Agent JAMES H. McNEVIN of this District's San Diego, California, Detachment, that the Operations Duty Officer at North Island Naval Air Station. San Diego, California, had reported that Major General U. S. Marine Corps, Retired, had contacted Base Operations at the Mayal Air Station and reported the sighting of an unidentified aerial object.
