10. BRIEF SUMMARY OF SIGHTING 100 ft in diameter. Line of blue light 200-300 ft above sea. Approached observers position and changed to circle about 100 ft in diameter. After passing over ship. Then slowed down and rose rapidly, through thin layer of stratus cloud (Base 2,000 ft) As passed through clouds it illuminated clouds to same hue and agitated them violently. Object lost in clouds. 1. Object Description

- a. Size - Estimated at about 100 feet in diameter when directly over and close to the vessel by Mr. [Redacted] and four inches (about the size of a grapefruit held at arm's length) in diameter just before it entered the clouds at 2000 feet by Kosei Nakamoto.
- b. Shape - When first sighted by Mr. [Redacted], the object appeared to be a line of blue light. As it approached the ship, it became an ellipse and as it came directly over the ship it became a circle. (See Diagram I)
- c. Color - The circle was bright blue at the extremity of the diameter, reddish at the inside of the circle, and jet black inside the circle of light. Mr. [Redacted] described it as the same color as a blue neon tube or as the color of a burning gas jet. Definitely more blue than red.
- d. Rotation - None.

e. Features - There were no external projections discernible.

f. Light or Brightest - None.

g. Sound - There was no sound, so far as the observers could determine emanating from the object. However, the surface of the ship and its periphery could have covered the noise.

h. Other External Features - None.

2. Description of Course of Object

- a. What attracted attention - The line of blue light.
- b. Angle of elevation and azimuth from observer's position when first sighted - A degree or two above the horizon, about 1P miles distant at about 30° azimuth from the observer's position. (See Diagram II)
- c. At disappearance - Directly over observer's position.
- d. Maneuvers, Flight Path - The object flew to the observer's position, then rose vertically and disappeared through a cloud layer at 2000 feet.

3. Manner of Observation

- a. Visual only.
- b. Optical Aids - None.
- c. Ship's name, registry, position, speed, heading - The salvaged ship's name was "S.S. Docteur Angier." It was a wrecked vessel owned by the Moeller Salvage Company. Its position was 27°02'05"N/128°27'55"E. The vessel was not moving but was headed bow due east.

An unidentified flying object was sighted at approximately 2055 Item time, 11 August 1954, by Mr. [REDACTED] of Moeller Shipwrecker Company, Okinawa, and Kosei Takamoto, his assistant.

The object was sighted from the deck of a salvaged ship anchored off Yoron-Jima at 27°02'05"N/126°08'15"E. The object first appeared north, northeast of Mr. Ferrell's position as a line of bright blue light about 200 to 300 feet above the sea and about the length of an American five cent piece held at arm's length. This line of light expanded horizontally at high speed and as it drew near turned into an ellipse. Passing over the vessel it became a full circle of bright blue light with jet black center and appeared about the size of a basketball held at arm's length. The ring of light then appeared to slow down and pass rapidly through a thin layer of stratus clouds at about 2000 feet. As the object passed through the cloud layer, it illuminated these clouds to the same hue and agitated them violently. The object was lost from view shortly after entering the cloud layer.

The circle of light was estimated by Mr. [REDACTED] to be about 100 feet in diameter as it arrived directly over his position and about the size of a grapefruit held at arm's length after it had risen to the size of the clouds before disappearing. [REDACTED]'s approximate weight was 160 lbs.

No noise from the object could be heard above the sound of the sunken ship. No exhaust trail was seen.

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5. Light conditions - The moon was near full and was shining brilliantly through a thin layer of stratus clouds. The condition of light was such that the observers feel sure they could have read a newspaper by it.

b. Each of the observers was interrogated and each described essentially the same thing. This report was originally handled by the GSI in August and a comparison of the two reports reveals no major differences. Both observer had ever seen a similar object before nor had they observed anything of an unusual nature or pertaining to flying objects before this incident.

Mr. [redacted] and Mr. [redacted] appeared somewhat nervous in their attitude towards the investigating officer. It is considered that what they say actually is true, but they will be more cooperative with the investigating officer.

The reliability of the observers is unknown.

This report is late because the observers, Mr. [redacted] and Mr. Kosei, were not available when the original report was put into Intelligence channels. The original report was extremely sketchy, necessitating re-interrogation of the two men.

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
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DIAGRAM E:

OVERHEAD

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
