1. Enclosure (1) is a report on the sighting of an unidentified flying object observed by Mr. ██████████ and his wife while at home on 8 October 1954. It is forwarded in accordance with references (a) and (b).

2. In addition to Mr. ██████████'s report, the following supplemental information not contained in Mr. ██████████'s report is submitted:

a. Location - The geographical location of the observer was approximately 38°45' North Latitude and 86°51' West Longitude.

b. Weather - Clear, winds approximately 10-15 miles per hour.

c. Visibility - Good.

d. Air Traffic - There was no known air traffic in the air at the time of sighting.

e. There was no known activity or condition, meteorological or otherwise, which might account for the sighting.

3. The observer is a reliable Depot employee, and it is believed that his report is a true statement of his observation.

Friday 10-8-54 - 1930

At the time and date mentioned above, while I was digging a water line trench, with my wife for company, we spotted an object racing through the sky. My wife spotted it first and yelled for me to look. At first sight, I thought it to be a meteor but it traveled in a true horizontal plane with no arc whatsoever.

It was ovular in shape and in comparison to conventional aircraft it appeared to be about 75 ft in length, and was ringed with a very brilliant halo of blue-violet flame. The color was spectacular. It trailed a stream of fire or flame about 6 times the length of the object with occasional bursts of white fire. It had a high, barely audible sound similar to a sound produced by a ricochet.

I estimated the height at between 800-1000 feet. I can not estimate the speed but I watched it for a distance of about 4 ground miles and at last sight it was well within the station limits. The whole incident took perhaps 3-5 seconds. The speed of the object was terrific. I have watched jets in the daytime at altitudes of 1000 feet but its speed far exceeded that of a jet and what sound was audible was incomparable to that produced by a jet.

The object was headed in a NE by E direction straight and true.
