BRIEF SUMMARY OF SIGHTING Military pilot was flying in B-25 type aircraft as instructor, turned to student and first saw object which he described as follows: Large, (120-130' across) metallic, disc shape, looked like two pie tins placed together at their rims. During the time of sighting, the object changed its position to both face the observer's aircraft with both its edge forward, and with its circular surface exposed to view. Object paralleled aircraft and disappeared after approximately 7 minutes.		11.
