Unidentified Flying Object Observed in Vicinity

of Bethesda, Maryland on 10 February 1955

1. Reference is made to telephonic conversation between Lt. Colonel EUGENE MCRITZ, Chief, sabotage and Espionage Branch, Counter Intelligence Division, your Directorate, and Mr. CHARLES A. SITHER, this office, regarding the above Subject on 16 February 1955.

- 2. At the request of Lt. Colonel WRITZ, Captain WILLIAM A. BROCKETT, 73572, U. S. Mavy, Industrial Officer, Eureau of Ships, David Taylor Model Basin, Carderock, Maryland, was interviewed on 16 February 1955. He advised that Mr. Andrew a civilian employee of the David Taylor Model Basin, had, on Friday, Il February 1955, reported that he had seen an unidentified, saucer-shaped, illuminous object while driving in his car at approximately 2200 hours the previous night.
- 3. Accordingly, on this same date, Yr. who is employed as action in the Metal Working Shop, Industrial Division, Bureau of Ships, Department of the Navy, Lavid Taylor Model Basin, Carderock, Maryland, was interviewed at the above installation. He advised that at approximately 2203 hours, Thursday, 10 February 1955, while driving his car east on McArthur Bouleverd, Bethesda, Teryland, between 75th or 75th Street and the entrance to Cabin John Gardens, a distance of approximately two (2) city blocks, he observed an illuminous object shaped like a very small portion of the bottom of the moon, very slightly, if any, to the right of his car and at an altitude of approximately one hundred and fifty (150) feet. 'c ording this object appeared to be enormous in size, between three (3) to four (4) hundred yards in length and ten (10) to fifteen (15) feet high at its widest point. He stated that it was about the color of the moon, "a yellowish, radiant color", and had a flat top, parallel to the horizon, and a spherical bottom. I recalled that it remained

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in the above-described shape and position, apparently not moving, for approximately thirty (30) seconds. He stated that the bottom portion then appeared to assume a funnel type shape, approximately thirty (30) to fifty (50) feet in depth at its widest point, narrowing at the bottom, and the object seemed to diminish in size. Upon arriving at the entrance to the Cabin John Gardens, according to the he drove back to the place where he had first sighted the object and retraced his route. He stated that, at that time, the object was not visible. He said that he had observed the object for approximately one and one-half (1) to two (2) minutes, and that his wife, dente and his son, ten years of age, were present in the car at the time of the incident and also observed the object. Trecalled that it was a dark, cloudy night with no moon or stars visible, and that there were no other cars on the road at that particular time.

- 4. Mr. also advised that he was an amateur "astrologer" for approximately seven (7) years until 1951, and that he has never previously seen an object of this size and shape. He could offer no logical explanation for the occurence, and stated that he heard nothing which might resemble aircraft engine noises.
