III. SOURCE'S DESCRIPTION OF SIGHTING: At approximately 10/01/02/1989, Source was standing in the driveway of his home at 1313 Wilson Drive, Duluth, Georgia. Looking west through a pair of toy binoculars when he observed a white light in the sky. The light was travelling slowly to the left. He watched it for approximately five (5) minutes before it disappeared. He continued watching for fifteen (15) minutes more but did not see it again.

SUPPLEMENTARY INVESTIGATION DATA (CONT'D)

1. A check was made with the Weather Reconnaissance Group, Dobbs Air Base, Georgia with negative results.

2. A check with US Weather Station, Birmingham, Alabama revealed that a weather balloon had been released at approximately 16/2200 April 1955 one and a half hours prior to the sighting.

3. A phone call to Maxwell AFB, Alabama Weather Station revealed a Radio-sonde balloon, 65' (6) feet in diameter by 1000 feet had been released at Maxwell AFB, Alabama and that wind conditions were placed in the area of the sighting at approximately 19/0005Z April 1955. Information from Maxwell AFB Weather Officer indicated that the balloon would possibly be visible at 10,000 feet and that it is possible the object could appear as a reflected light.

4. The Control Tower, Birmingham, Alabama, advised that there was considerable air traffic, both civil and military, in the area of sighting and that no unusual reports of aerial activity had been received.

5. A check was made with Base Operations, Dobbs Air Base, Georgia with negative results.
