II. RELATIVES: Due to the conflicting reports SOURCE gave Base Operations Dobbins AFB, O/C 750, AD, Dobbins AFB, and O/C 2-C, credibility to the information.

III. SOURCE'S DESCRIPTION OF SIGHTING: Shortly after midnight on 11/11/1955, SOURCE and his small boy, age 9 years, were working in the fields near his home at [REDACTED], ROMA, GEORGIA (Grid 5916). When an aircraft was seen heading N-E at an altitude of 1500-2500 feet, SOURCE stated that the aircraft was definitely of conventional design, had a reciprocating engine or engines, was displaying running lights, and traveling at a rather slow speed as compared to other aircraft. After the aircraft passed over, SOURCE continued with his work as there was nothing unusual about the aircraft.

Shortly thereafter, SOURCE stated his son called his attention to the aircraft again and what appeared to be a fireball, about the size of a shooting star without a tail, departing from the left wing of the left side of the aircraft and traveling in a westerly direction at the same speed as the aircraft. SOURCE continued on N-E. The fireball seemed to climb slightly as it continued on its original path to the west. The fireball was fairly bright for 30 seconds and faded out of view in about 1½ minutes but never lost altitude. After the fireball disappeared, SOURCE stated his son spoke of a second fireball which departed from the right side of the aircraft and disappeared to the north in the same manner. SOURCE stated he did not see the second fireball because of a tree in his line of vision. SOURCE thought the aircraft was practicing some sort of night maneuver as the fireballs seemed to be unusual so he reported the sighting to Base Operations, Dobbins AFB as he thought the aircraft would probably be from there. About one hour after the sighting, SOURCE stated that when he thought the same aircraft came back over flying in a S-E direction (at the same altitude), steady, and displaying running lights.

SUPPLEMENTARY INVESTIGATIVE REPORTS

1. A check of 547, the 4674th (code) at Dobbins AFB, revealed that no reports of any unusual aerial activity had been received through any of eight direct channels.

2. Flight Service Centers checked and also made the following checks with negative results:

- a. Atlanta ATC, Atlanta, Georgia
- b. Dothan ATC, Dothan, Alabama
- c. Seville ATC, Tampa, Florida
- d. Berry-Nashville Airport, Tennessee
- e. Memphis Naval Air Station, Tennessee
- f. Memphis Municipal Airport, Tennessee

3. Base Operations, Dobbins AFB, revealed that the 4674th had not received any information from the flight of 4602D. On the other hand, the report of the sighting given to Base Operations differed considerably from the report. Sources gave F2C investigative Observers reported to Base Operations, DATA, that the craft was 4000-5000 feet altitude flying North, and the aircraft appeared to be a smaller aircraft which flew faster than the conventional aircraft.

Base Operations, DATA stated, indicating local activities was in the Rome, Georgia area at the time of the sighting and had no other information on the sighting was received from any other source.

4. A check was made with the Atlanta Airport, Atlanta, Georgia, for unusual activity reported.

5. Information received from 4602D, Observers, Atlanta, Georgia, indicated that no unusual observations were made by them reported to the Observers during the past week.

6. Operations Officer, Naval Air Station, Columbus, Georgia advised that two flights of four aircraft each were practicing take-off formations, plus tactical break-ups in the Rome, Georgia area between 010100Z and 010400Z, 10-17-52.

Operations Officer described these aircraft as Navy F4U Corsair type aircraft, having a collector ring television system with the single gun in position at the bottom section of the collector ring. During these tactics, the top of the aircraft would display running lights, so far as he could ascertain, indicating the aircraft may or may not display flares during the dives.

COMMENTS of Preparing Officer:

In the opinion of the Preparing Officer, this sighting was probably caused by one of these flights of Navy B-454 aircraft when the wing man in the flight disengaged to the right and left in a tactical break-up for the following reasons:

a. Source first reported that a small aircraft departed from another aircraft. When he probably first saw it, the flight of four aircraft had already been over one aircraft. When the left aircraft then broke off, it took on the appearance of a small aircraft departing from a larger aircraft.

b. Source's report to 520 Investigations was considerably different. He first reported no base operations, Dobbins AFB. The forebait he described could have been the exuberant flying from the aircraft that was seen the morning before.

c. The sighting was made shortly after midnight; therefore several flights in the Rome, Georgia area must have witnessed the same sighting but from something unusual about it.

Nuclear Test Today

LAS VEGAS, Nev., April 5 (UPI).—Atomic scientists changed their minds today and rescheduled for 9 a. m. tomorrow the highest nuclear test made in the United States. An earlier announcement said there would be no test tomorrow because of unfavorable weather. However, a later re-evaluation apparently indicated improving wind conditions aloft. The shot, designed to wipe out an enemy air fleet, is to be touched off six miles above the proving ground at Yucca Flat.
