

II. RELIABILITY: SOURCE seemed to be an intelligent young woman. SOURCE had taught high school students, and was very active in Civil Defense work. She was rather vague in answering a few questions, but preparing officer believes that SOURCE would be considered fairly reliable.

III. SOURCE'S DESCRIPTION OF SIGHTING:

1. On the night of 20 June 1955, SOURCE was visited by a neighbor, Mr. John Stewart, who stated that he had observed an unknown object in the sky a few minutes earlier, (approximately 2200 CST). SOURCE, her husband, and Mr. Stewart went outside and within a period of five minutes sighted a round, reddish object which appeared to be in the southwestern sector of the sky. Object appeared to be as large as a bright star, however the object was red in color and round in shape. The object was travelling north at a great speed, and soon was out of sight. A few minutes later, the object appeared again in the same area travelling from west to east. It appeared to hover over a neighbor's house and SOURCE stated that the object looked much larger in size than it did previously. The size of the object appeared comparable to that of a salad plate. The object then resumed speed and faded out of view in the north.

- 2. SOURCE stated she actually observed the object for a total time of one minute thirty seconds.
 - 3. Sunset on the night of the observation was 1938 CST.
- 4. SOURCE could not give the actual times of the sighting nor the duration of time between the sightings.
 - 5. Sighting of the object was strictly visual.

 - 9. The object was last sighted disappearing in the north.



II. NELEABILITY: SOURCE'S description of sighting was excellent and in great detail. He was quite familiar with the latest type jet aircraft, astronomy, and weather balloons. SOURCE was very familiar with vector problems, angular distances, and bearing terms. Mr. Elder is at present a Civil Engineer working for a Dallas construction company. Preparing officer considers the SOURCE to be reliable.

III. SOUTHOR'S DESCRIPTION OF SIGHTING:

- 1. On monday 20 June 1955 at approximately 2200 hours CST, SOURCE was arroused by conversation in front of his home and he stepped outside. SOURCE, accompanied by his neighbors sighted a rapidly moving light, brighter looking than a first magnitude star. The light traveled at a speed about three times greater than any aircraft he had ever seen. The light made three passes over approximately the same course. The time of the observation was more than sixty seconds at each sighting with a time lapse of about five minutes between sightings. Viewing the light through eight power field glasses, SOURCE stated that the light appeared as three bright incandescent white lights with a small red light similar to a wing light on an airplane preceding the white lights. All lights were parallel to the flight path of object. This view of the lights appeared only during the second sighting. On the third sighting, thru field glasses, the light appeared as only a single white light. On the first pass, SOURCE only abserved a white light, but he was not using the field glasses.
- 2. SOURCE stated that there was no moon present on the night of the observation, but that there were many stars in the sky.
 - 3. The lights seemed to be at an altitude of seventy-five thousand feet.
- 4. At no time did the SOURCE state that he had seen an object. All the SOURCE saw was an incandescent light or lights.
 - 5. The edges of the light were similar to that of a bright star.
- 6. Without field glasses, the light seemed to be about the size of a pin head when held at arm's length. When the field glasses were used, the light appeared to be about the sixe of a quarter when held in the hand at arm's length.
 - 7. SOURCE estimated the length of the light to be three hundred feet:
 - 8. Observer first sighted the light in the northwest.

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9. SOURCE stated that in his opinion, he thought the object to be a large aircraft and the origin unknown.



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

II. RELIABILITY: SOURCE answered all questions in an informal, conversational manner. She seemed to be: very concise and emphatic in answering all questions. SOURCE was quite friendly, congenial and willisto cover every minute detail of the sighting. Details of the sighting seemed to be quite vivid in the SOURCE's mind. Preparing officer considers the SOURCE reliable.

III. SOURCE'S DESCRIPTION OF THE SIGHTING:

1. At approximately 2200 CST 20 June 1955, SOURCE was attracted by neighbors talking about an object flying in the sky. SOURCE went outside and observed an object directly over neighbor's home. The object proceeded from the south and travelled in an arc to the north. SOURCE stated the object appeared to be disk in shape and very bright and shiny. The object appeared to be moving at a rate of speed faster than any jet aircraft the source had ever seen. While watching the object, the source stated it changed from a shiny silver color to a red. SOURCE stated that the object did not travel at the same speed all the time it was in view, but rather slowed down and accelerated frequently. SOURCE sighted the object for a second and third time travelling from the west and disappearing in the north. During the second and third sightings, the altitude of the object appeared to be much higher than it was in the first sighting. SOURCE stated that during the entire period of sighting, no smoke or sound were observed.

- 6. SOURCE stated that she would estimate the real size of the object to be about the size of a B-36 aircraft.

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

II. RELIABILITY: SOURCE was sincere, friendly, and cooperative. All questions asked were answered in a straight forward manner. SOURCE was very interested in the sighting, and quite eager to find out the results of the investigation. Preparing officer believes the source to be reliable.

III. SOURCE'S DESCRIPTION OF THE SIGHTING: On 20 June 1955, SOURCE's attention was directed to an unknown object travelling at a transndous rate of speed in a south westerly direction. The object followed an erratic course in the southwest direction and changed course from 195 degrees to about two hundred and sixty degrees. The object held this course until it faded from view. The first sighting lasted a total of twenty five to thirty seconds. The time of the first sighting was 2150 CST.

- 2. On the second sighting the object was observed through binoculars. The object appeared to be silver in color and very fuzzy around the edges. SOURCE stated that there was no sound. The total time of the second sighting lasted twenty seconds. The object followed a course of approximately ten degrees, and travelled at a tremendous rate of speed. The second sighting occurred at 2200 CST.
- 3. At 2215 P.M. CST, 20 June 1955, the object was sighted a third time. The object approached SOURCE maintaining a heading of about ten degrees and then changed to a heading of about one hundred and sixty degrees. During the third sighting, the object appeared as three bright incandescent lights. The lights were arranged in a straight line and the outline of an object was seen. The total time of sighting was approximately twenty five seconds.
 - 4. At 2220 COT, 20 June 1955, the fourth sighting occurred. The object appeared on a course of two hundred eighty degrees, and then again changed to a heading of ten degrees. On this sighting there were three green lights accompanied by one white light. One of the green lights seemed to fade out, and then come back on. Total time of the last sighting was approximately twenty five to thirty seconds.

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




II. RELIABILITY: SOURCE seemed to be a very intelligent young woman. She had done a great deal of research in the field of Bacteriology. SOURCE answered all questions in a pleasing conversational manner and without hesitation. Preparing officer believes the SOURCE to be reliable.

III. SOURCE'S DESCRIPTION OF THE SIGHTING:

- 1. At about 2150 CST 20 June 1955, SOURCE first observed the object. The object was in a south westerly direction and appeared as a bright glow. SOURCE stated the object pursued a very irregular course and then turned right proceeding in a westerly direction. The object moved at a very rapid rate of speed, much faster than any jet aircraft SOURCE had ever seen. The object seemed to glow before fading out of sight. On the second sighting, the object was again in a south westerly direction, but was slightly more westerly than it had been before. On the third and fourth sightings, the object appeared in the west and disappeared in the north. The object appeared much closer to SOURCE on the third sighting than it did on any of the other sightings. SOURCE stated that the objects appeared to be guided and were not free falling objects.
 - 2. SOURCE could not remember the exact times of the sightings.
 - 3. SOURCE stated that she observed only one object.
- 4. Object was a brilliant white in color and object would turn red before disappearing.
 - 5. SOURCE was looking to the southwest when the object was first sighted.
- 6. SOURCE had no conception of what the object might have been or what caused it.

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SUPPLEMENTARY INVESTIGATIVE EFFORTS:

- 1. A check with the United States Weather Bureau, Love Field, Dallas Texas for balloors released in the area at the time of sighting. Negative results.
- 2. Contacted Civil Aeronautics Administration, Love Field, Dallas Texas for aircraft over the area at the time of sighting and received negative results.
- 3. Duncanville Radar Station, Duncanville Texas reported no blips on the scope from 0400Z to 0430Z 21 Jun 55.
- 4. Base Operations, Maval Air Station, Hensley Field, Dallas Texas was contacted for aircraft over area of sighting and obtained negative results.
- 5. Base Weather Station at the Dallas Naval Air Station, Hensley Field, Dallas Texas stated no balloons had been released 20 Jun 55. Weather information on 21 Jun 55 at 0400Z was clear and winds were holding out of the west up to forty-thousand (40,000) feet. Wind speeds up to forty-thousand feet averaged twenty-five (25) miles per hour. Wind direction and speed for the following altitudes were as follows:

- 6. A check was made with Mr. Director of the Texas Astronomical Association, 7 Dallas Texas and received negative results.
- 7. Carswell Air Force Base Weather Service stated that a rawinsonde type weather balloon was release at 0930Z 21 Jun 55.
- 8. Dr. S.M.U. University Professor of astronomy, was contacted and Preparing Officer received negative results.
- 9. Carswell Rawinsonde Service revealed the following information: A rawinsonde type balloon was released at 0330Z 21 June 1955. Wind direction and speed for the following altitudes were as follows:

- 10. Flight Operations, Convair Aircraft Corporation, tested two aircraft 20 June 1955, but both of the flights terminated at 0800 and 0900 CST.
- 11. Chance Voght aircraft corporation test center tests experimental aircraft only during the daylight hours.

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COMMENTS of Preparing Officer:

- 1. In the opinion of the Preparing Officer, this sighting was probably caused by a meteorite for the following reasons:
- a. All sources stated that the lights or objects sighted were round in shape.
- b. Sources stated that the sizes of the lights or objects varied from that of a pinpoint to the size of a half dollar.
- c. Colors of the lights or objects were yellow, red, white and olive green.
- d. Speeds of the lights or objects were very fast, erratic and crossed large portions of the sky in a few seconds.
- e. The formation was that of a small group when viewed through field glasses and when sighted visually, only one object was sighted.
- f. To their knowledge, no source observed a trail and no sound was present.
- g. The time of any of the sightings did not exceed 90 seconds and the observation occurred at 0400Z 21 June 1955.

COMMENTS of Approving Officer:

- 1. This headquarters does not concur with the conclusions of the Preparing Officer for the following reasons:
- a. The sources' descriptions of the flight characteristics and flight path of the object do not compare with that of a meteorite.
 - b. The duration of sighting is too long for a meteorite.
- c. Sources stated that they believed they saw the same object three separate times rather than three separate objects, with a time lapse between sightings.
 - d. One reliable source stated that the object was not a meteorite.
 - 2. This report is forwarded to ATIC as unresolved.

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I. SOURCE: RICHARD SCHRIVER BARRY

II. RELIABILITY: SOURCE was above average in intelligence and seemed very serious about the sighting. His description of the object was in great detail. SOURCE was quite congenial and answered all questions in a straight forward manner. He was quite familiar with some of the latest type jet aircraft and weather balloons. Preparing officer believes the SOURCE to be reliable.

III. SOURCE'S DESCRIPTION OF SIGHTING:

- 1. On Honday evening, 2200 CST 20 June 1955, SOURCE'S neighbor, Mr. John Stewart, visited SOURCE and asked him to step outside. They did, and Mr. Stewart pointed to the heavens in a southwesterly direction (generally toward the city of Dallas, Texas). The SOURCE sighted a dull red object which was changing in color to a glowing whitish-yellow. The object dropped from a seventy degree elevation to a fort degree elevation. The SOURCE could make no estimate as to the altitude of the object. The object appeared to hover momentarily, and then accelerate in speed. SOURCE estimated this speed to be greater than that of any jet aircraft he had ever observed. After this burst of speed, the object was sighted again in the western part of the sky, and again seemed to be hovering momentarily. SOURCE immediately rushed indoors to get his binoculars (eight by thirty-five in measurement). He returned in time to focus the the binoculars on the object before it faded in the northeastern sector of the sky. Thru the binoculars, the object appeared to be round, flat and red in color. Three lights appeared to be in a straight line, horizontal to the path of flight of the object. SOURCE estimated the total time of the sighting to be a proxi ately sixty to ninety seconds. A total of ten minutes time elapsed before the object was sighted for the second time. It appeared from the west and traveled straight toward the SOURCE. The object was changing from a red to a yellowwhite in color. The object came out of the west at an angle of sixty degrees, veering to the right and then disappeared in the northeast. Upon viewing the object thru the binoculars, the SOURCE stated that there were three brilliant whitish-yellow lights in a straight line with a red light in the lead.
- 2. The third sighting was quite similar to the first. The colors were the same and the object appeared and disappeared in the same areas. This time, however the object did not appear to hover. Reference inclosure #1 to part 1, SOURCE'S sketch of flight path of object.

11. 1 Three white lights preceeded by a red glow (with field glasses).

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- Pt. 2 Three brilliant whitish-yellow lights preceeded by a red glow with no outline present (through field glasses).
- Pt. 3 Three brilliant whitish yellow lights preceded by a red light. The outline of the lights was blurry and the edges fuzzy.
- 3. SOURCE was certain that the actual time of the sighting was one minute and thirt; seconds.
 - 4. There were a few stars in the sky and a small moon.
- 5. SOURCE estimated the object to be about one mile away and solid in shape.
- 6. SOURCE stated that he believed he saw the same object three separate times rather than three different objects because there was adequate time for the object to circle back because of its tremendous rate of speed.
- 7. SOURCE stated that the object was about the size of a baseball held in the hand at arm's length.
- 8. The night of the sighting was very warm, dry, with a slight breeze and a clear sky.
- 9. SOURCE stated that he had no conception of what the object might have been but that it was not a meteorite.

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
