III. SOURCE'S DESCRIPTION OF SIGHTING: SOURCE had been standing in the driveway of his home when his son brought his attention to a strange object in the sky. The first impression was that it might have come from a landing goar of an aircraft, however, the absence of noise seemed to rule this out as a possibility. The time of the o original sighting was 10:43 P.M. EDT. A brilliant red ball of light was passing overhead from east to west at what SOURCE estimated to have been 2000 to 3000 feet. There was no visable outline of the object nor was there any trail of exhaust. There was also no sound of aircraft aloft in the area, which is extremely rare.

SOURCE further estimated the object's course to have been on a direct line from Andrews AFB, Md., to Washington Nat'l. Airport. It continued on this course until directly over Washington Nat'l, where it hovered for ten to fifteen seconds. As the object hovered, its light, blinked off for approximately three-seconds, then came back on, shifting course abruptly 90 to the left. As the object proceeded now on a southwesterly course, SOURCE called next door for Maj. Curdes to come outside and help identify the object. It then shifted directions several times as it rose gradually, disappearing finally into the overcast. The phenomenon was observed for a period of ten minutes.

SUPPLEMENTARY INVESTIGATIVE EFFORTS:

- 1. A check with the Air Traffic Control Center at Washington National Airport revealed that the only information which they had on the UFOB was what had been relayed to them by Maj. Curdes. They had received no confirmation either from their units or from any surrounding radar installations.
- 2. The Ass't. Operations Officer at Andrews AFB was contacted. Confirmation negative. The above-referred officer contacted the local AC&W Det,GCA unit, each giving negative reports.
- 3. Maj. Springer and Capt. Casey at Bolling AFB Operations reported negative confirmation of the June 25 sighting. Capt. Casey helped contact the Flight Service Center at Washington National, which was unable to offer any confirmation.
- 4. A phone call to Capt.Gray, Ass't. Supt.of the Washington Naval Observatory, revealed that no UFOB's had been sighted by his faculty for over a year. Results negative.
- 5. The Director of the Georgetown University Observatory was contacted but was unable to give confirmation. Their observations on the night of 25 June had been restricted to less than an hour due to a heavy overcast.
- 6. A check with the Silver Hill Weather Observatory (Hillcrest Heights, Md.), located approximately five blocks from the area of first sighting of the UFOB, produced the following information: Namely, that twice daily, 0500 EST and 2200 EST, weather balloons are released from their station. One of these balloons had been released at about 10:45 EDST, 25 June 1955, containing a small, bright magnesium light. The ground winds at 10:45 EDST were 7 Knots East. (From the east) At 2000 the wind was from the NB. At 6000 the wind had shifted to the NW. Such wind conditions could easily have carried the balloon along the approximate path of the unidentified object.
- 7. The Baltimore Filter Center was contacted but no information could be furnished on the June 25 sighting.
 - 8. The Ground Observer Corps Hdq. in the Pentagon was contacted. Results negative.
- 9. Both the Processing Branch and D&D of DCS/OPS, Hdq. USAF were contacted but results were negative.
- 10. Col. Mason at the Command Post, Hdq.USAF was called by telephone, but aside from the information which Maj. Curdes had relayed to him nothing additional had been reported to his office in regard to the June 25 sighting:
- 11. Finally, the DCS/I,MATS,Lt/Col. Rhody, was interviewed at Andrews AFB. He surrendered a copy of his report of the incident to the 4602d AISS Investigating Officer. From conversations which he had had with the authorities at the Silver Hill Weather Station regarding weather and wind conditions at the time of the balloon's release(10:45EDST 25 June 1955), Lt,Col. Rhodes concluded that the UFOB sighted could have been this very same balloon.

COMMENTS: of Preparing Officer:

1. The opinion of the Preparing Officer is that the UFOB sighting of 25 June was in fact the sighting by several observers of a weather balloon being carried aloft through shifting currents of air. It is further the opinion of this officer that the balloon sighted by the several observers in Hillcrest Heights, Maryland was the same which was released by the Silver Hill Weather Observatory at approximately 26/0245Z Ju55.

a. The object's hgeneral appearance and behavior seem to have been very deceptive to the observers on the ground.

- (1) First, the object's specient speed seemed to rule out all possibility of its being a balloon. However, this could easily have been the deception created by the balloon's low altitude at the time it was first observed.
- (2) The object's altitude could easily have been misinterpreted by the observers on the ground since the absence of any sound being emitted from it, in addition to the fact that it was nightfall and the object was suspended in space, would have made it virtually impossible for an observer on the ground to have accurately estimated its altitude.

b. All SOURCES when informed of the coincidence in time of the release of the Siver Hill Observatory balloon and their sighting of the UFOB conferred that the two objects could well have been one and the same.

- to their observation posts in Hillcrest Heights.at
 - (2) SOURCES generally acknowledged this Officer's belief that the sporadic action of the object can be explained by the constant shifting of wind currents at various altitudes during its ascent, and that the brilliant light observed on the object could easily have been the glow from the magnesium light attached to the Silver Hill balloon.
 - (3) The searchlight beam neutralizing phenomenon which was noted in the original TT message was what the Hillcrest Heights observers seemed to see, yet in fact it was probably caused by advertising searchlights in the city some 10 miles away. A clicking on and of at the source of light or a sudden power failure at the source might have given the effect of their being neutralized to an observer 10 miles away.

c. In the absence of any positive radar or other confirmation of the nature of the object sighted, and in view of the overwhelming coincidence surrounding the release of the Silver Hill Weather Observatory balloon on the night of 25 June 1955, this Officer concludes that the phenomenon observed was the ascent of the Silver Hill weather balloon.



The object seemed to be controlled, because it seemed to hover for awhile and then move. The size and shape can only be guessed at. It was round or at least resembled a glowing light bulb. I looked at my watch as soon as I stepped outside and it read 10:46. We all observed the object for approximately six minutes, after which time the object disappeared."

III. SOURCES DESCRIPTION OF SIGHTING:

"We had just finished dinner and had begun watching television on the evening of 25 June 1955 in my home in Hillcrest Heights, Washington 21,D.C., when our neighbor, Mr. , knocked on the door and yelled for us to come outside to observe something (a flying object), which we might be able to identify. Myself, Col. and guests went out on the front lawn and I immediately checked my watch. It was 10:45 Pull EDT. We saw a bright, yellowish-orange object, approximately 70 elevation, traveling at great speed in a zigzag course to the Southwest. It stopped and hovered once, then circled and departed in a straight line due west. It appeared to over the vicinity of Washington National Airport from our position as it disappeared into the overcast, at about 30° elevation. When it had disappeared, I again checked my watch and it was 10:51 P.M. EDT.

The object at no time emitted any noise, nor did it change color or intensity. It appeared to have a triangular-shaped tailcone attached to the round object the size of a grapefruit. Both the tail cone and the circular part of the light were of the same color and intensity. At no time did this object change color, nor did it appear to get larger or smaller from the time of my first observation until it disappeared into the overcast."
