II. RELIABILITY: Fair. At apersonal interview appeared to be sincere and positive of the sighting that he had seen. His age, and the imagination which he exhibited during the interview, places him as a fair source.

III. SOURCE'S DESCRIPTION OF SIGHTING: Source was on duty at ground level outside of the Arlington Ground Observation Post at the time of the sighting (0906h8Z July 1955). The night was dark, clear, dry and cool with a slight breeze blowing. There was dull moonlight and many stars were out. The single object was observed for four to five seconds and appeared brighter than the background. The object seemed close but the distance could not be judged by source.

- A. The object did not appear to stand still nor suddenly speed up and rush away at any time. Source did not know if the object exploded but stated that it faded out fast. It did change brightness and gave off smoke or fumes in the form of a tail or trail but did not change shape nor flicker during sighting.
- B. The object appeared to be solid and did not move in front of nor behind any object at any time. Source does not wear glasses and no visual aids were used for the sighting.
- C. Source was indefinite in his estimation of the objects size. It varied between the size of a half-dollar to that somewhat larger than a volley ball held in the hand at arms length. Object traveled in a downward arc from Northwest to Northeast. The arc decreased from 60° to 45° elevation above the horizon.
- D. Source stated that he had seen meteors before but never at such close range. He believed this object to be a meteor.
