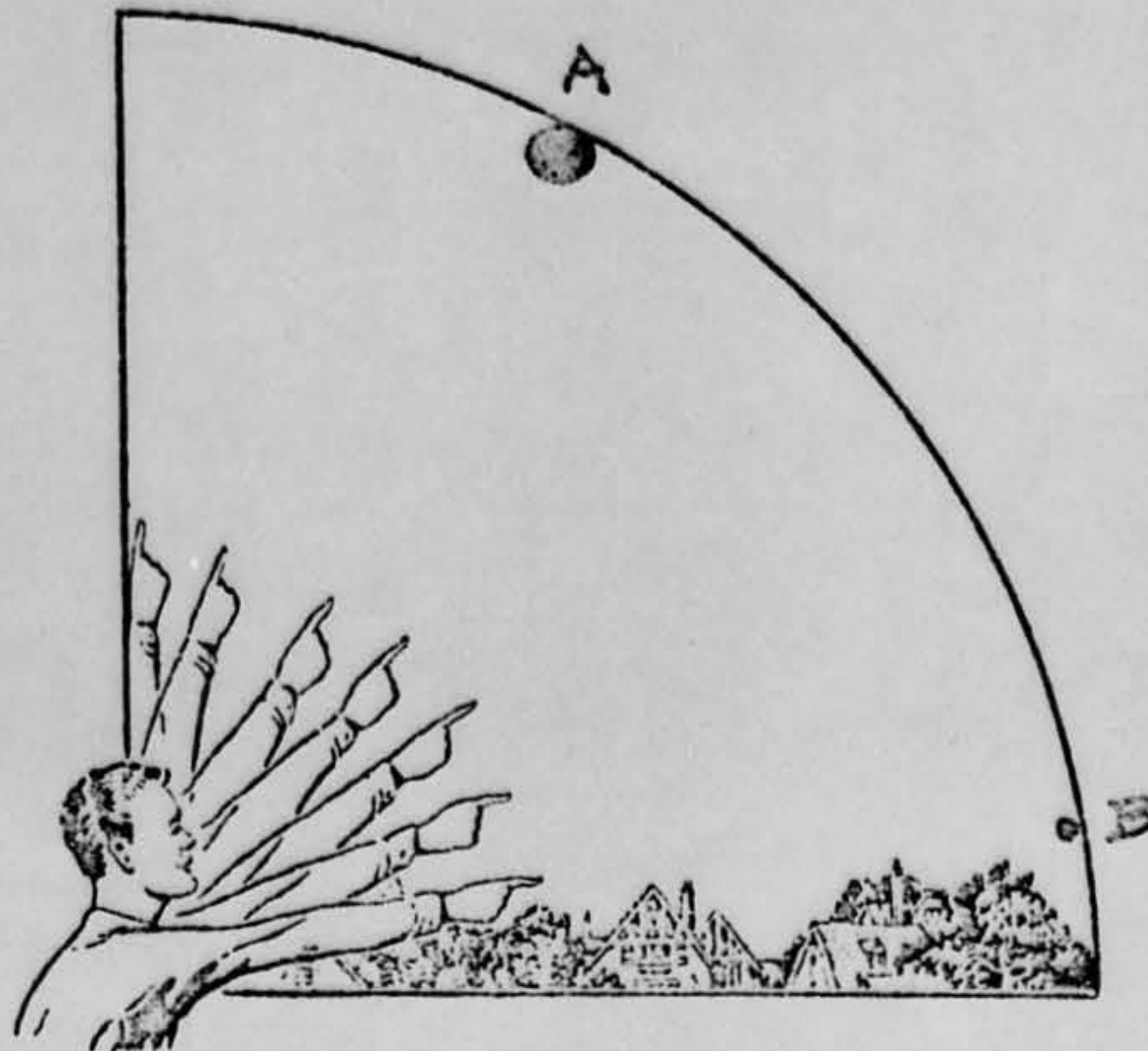

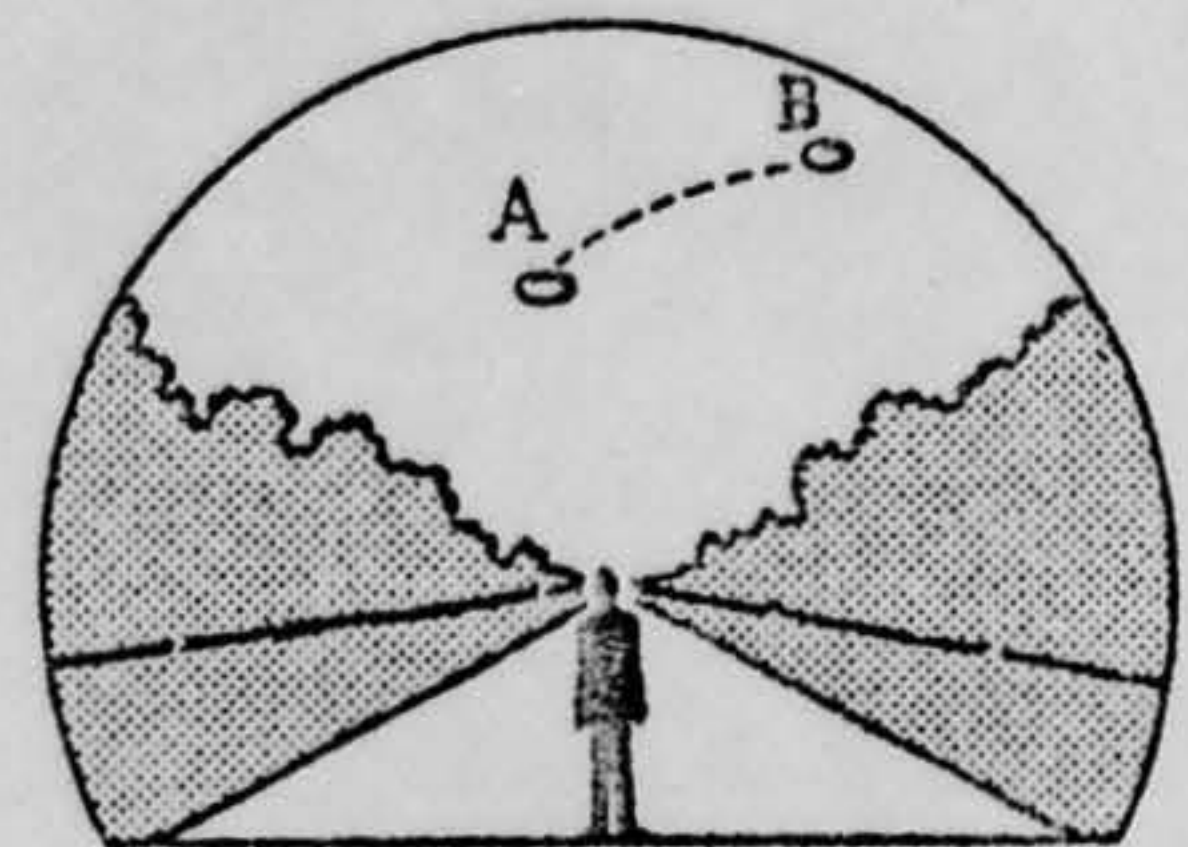
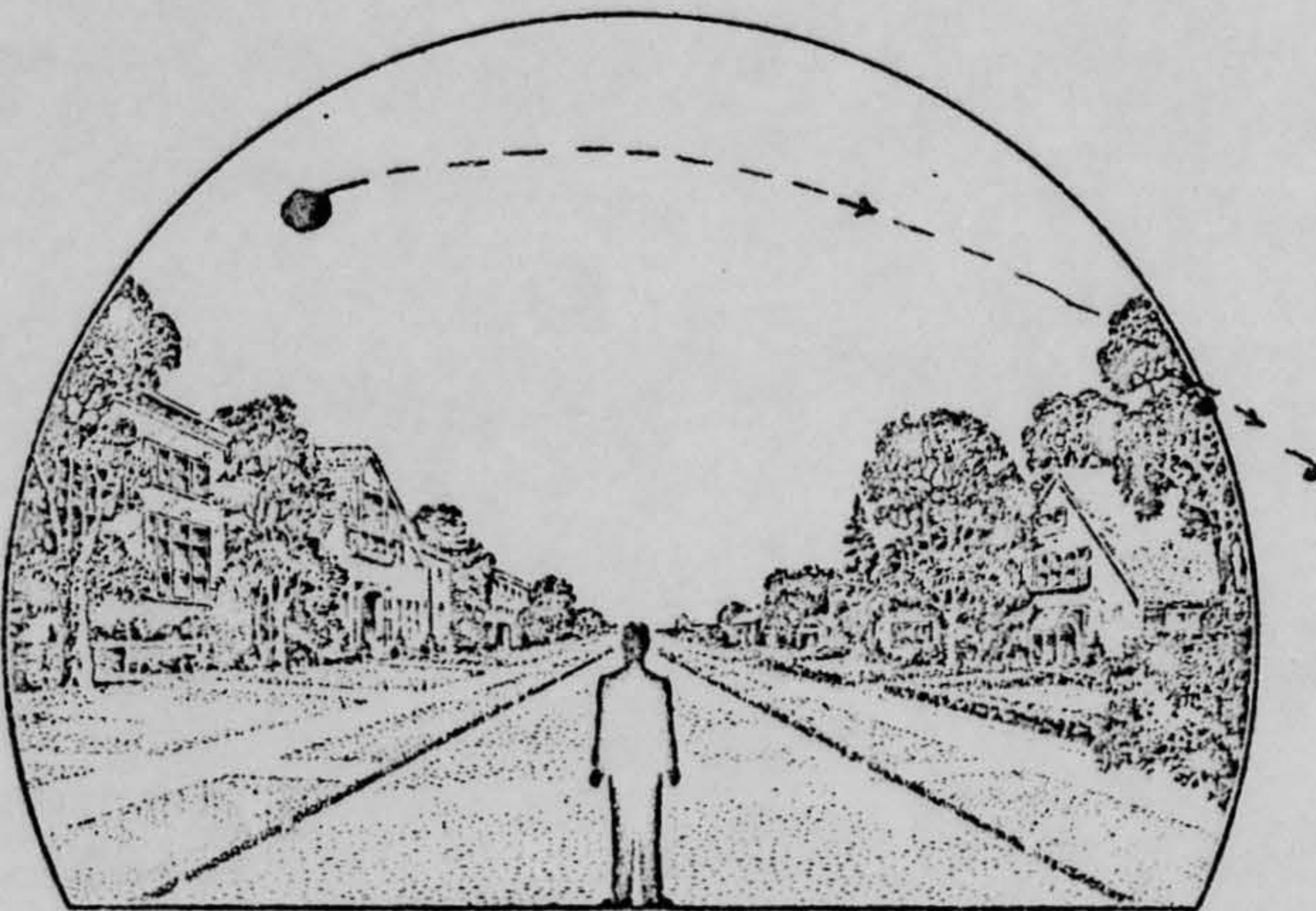

While vacationing in Europe, another physician & I had a very unusual experience. I was sitting on the open-air patio adjoining our room at the Castellana Hilton Hotel in Madrid writing a letter. It had been quite warm during the day and altho the humidity was low, it was still somewhat uncomfortable. I remember watching the sun go below the horizon just as I was completing the letter. Dr. _____ was also on the veranda & kept remarking about some birds ("swifts") that were darting around the building. When I next glanced up at the sky towards the north west I saw what I first interpreted as a huge soaring bird, such as a hawk or eagle, floating along high above all the others. I was a bit curious about it and as I watched this thing approach from the west it became quite apparent that it was not a bird, not a plane, not anything I had ever seen before - because it was silhouetted against the brilliant sky as a perfect circle, resembling pictures I have seen of the sun at total eclipse. I called Dr. _____

attention to it, and we both jokingly said that it must just be one of the famous "flying saucers". But as the seconds passed it soon became anything but a joke.

I automatically kept trying to eliminate all possibilities that could explain the thing on a natural basis, but got nowhere. When it was about half way across the sky (having taken all this time when the object was best illuminated or contrasted by the bright sky behind), to convince ourselves of its reality, we both yelled, "get the camera, quick!"

The thing seemed to go fairly slowly over Madrid, but started picking up speed as it went eastward beyond the city. Altho it could be seen in the view-finder of the camera all right, it will be lucky if we get a decent picture of it because it was then against the darker eastern sky, and 35 mm color film isn't exactly the best for such a shot.

At any rate we tried, and will turn in the negative if it shows anything at all. This was a disturbing experience to us and we really wish we had not seen the object, since we were both more or less convinced that such sightings were usually reported only by cranks or crack-pots and merely represented some easily explained natural phenomenon that had become distorted & misinterpreted by hysterical individuals.

However, though no one believes us, I felt it my duty to report this matter to the Air Technical Intelligence Center, and can only hope that the photographic evidence which we should have in another week, will be of assistance to them. ~~██████████~~

ADDENDUM

I. Dr. [REDACTED] has reviewed this report and concurs with all opinions expressed except for answer to question #22.

We both agree that this is the most difficult question that you have asked. A coin held at arms length against the sky, if held in a window, looks large; if held against a vast expanse of sky, it appears small; (for the same reason that the full moon looks much larger when rising than when overhead).

However, after practising with coins etc., he has convinced me that my answer is probably incorrect, and that the object was between "pea" + "dime" sized.

It is easier for me to say that it appeared to be about $\frac{1}{4}$ the size of the full moon — (when seen at its closest approach).

II. Dr. [REDACTED] was in the U.S. Navy during W.W.II. at a location where launching of weather balloons was very common. I have never had the opportunity of observing these, but he is familiar with their appearance and is convinced that the unidentified object was not any type of balloon that he has ever seen.

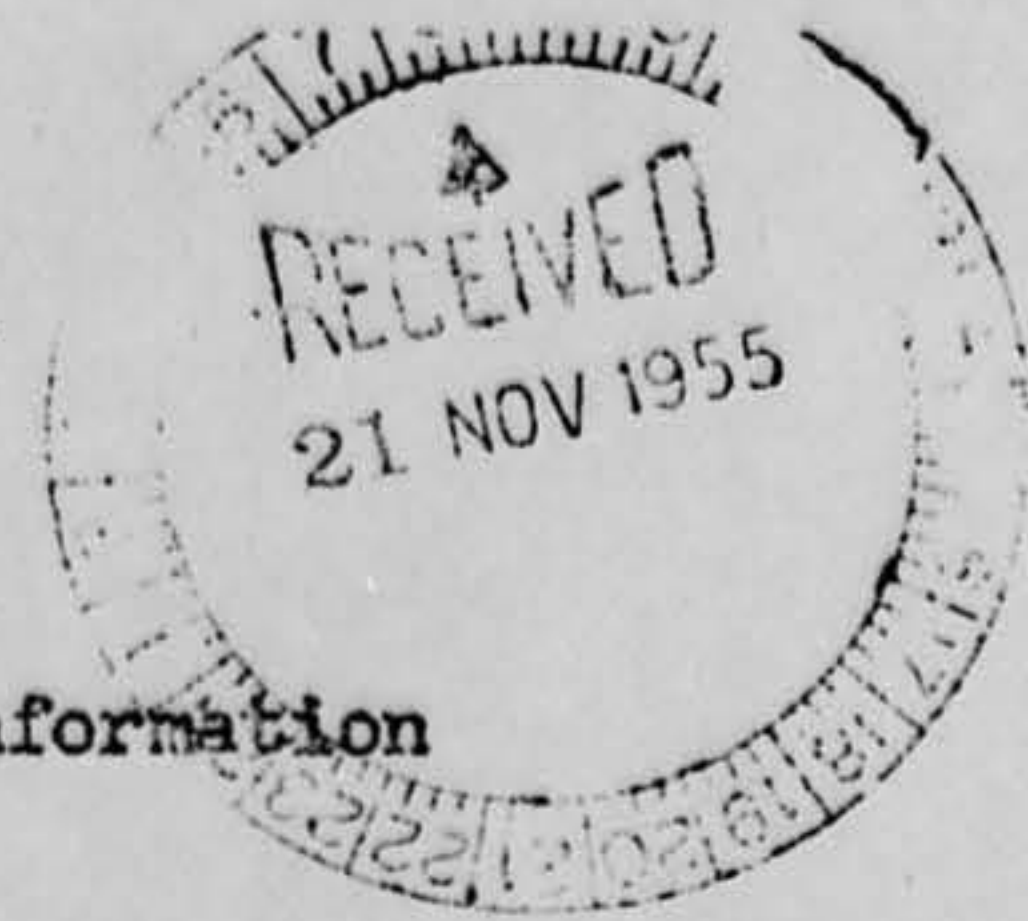

II. RELIABILITY: Good. In a personal interview SOURCE seemed positive of all his statements and displayed a good knowledge of speed, distance, and altitude. He was disturbed only in his lack of an explanation of what the object might have been and repeated the statement that he wished he had never seen the object.

III. SOURCE'S DESCRIPTION OF SIGHTING: SOURCE was writing a letter on the open-air patio of the CASTELLANA HILTON HOTEL in MADRID, SPAIN, at the time of the sighting which was 141935Z JUL 55. The sun had set approximately five (5) to ten (10) minutes before the sighting. The evening was a clear bright twilight, warm, dry with no wind. The single object appeared black and became chocolate colored as it came overhead and then returned to the solid black color. The object was estimated to be one hundred (100) to two hundred (200) feet in diameter, spherical in shape, and have a clearly defined outline. Object travelled in what appeared to be a straight line but accelerated gradually after passing over the city to what appeared to be a supersonic speed (APRX one thousand /1000/ MPH).

Object appeared to be solid and did not move behind anything while being observed. The only aid in observation was view-finder of early model ARGUS C-3 camera with F 4.5 lens.

SOURCE's opinion of the size of object based on altitude estimation of five (5) to ten (10) thousand feet and approximate size of a nickle held at arm's length at closest point during observation. This estimation of size was later changed to between pea and dime size held at arm's length.

SOURCE has no opinion of what the object could be but stated that he is certain it was not a conventional or delta-wing aircraft, weather balloon, reflection, satellite, or hallucination.

SOURCE stated duration of sighting was between one and one half (1½) to two (2) minutes.

Dear Sirs:

Another Long Beach, Calif. physician & myself are vacationing in Europe for the month of July. Neither of us had ever seriously considered the possibility of "flying saucers" being real objects, and assumed that all such observations could be explained on the basis of natural phenomena or pure hysteria.

However, just after sunset this evening (8 35 PM Madrid time), [REDACTED] I were sitting on the open sun porch adjoining our room on the top floor of this hotel. A dark circular object appearing about 1/3 the size of the moon appeared in the bright western sky, passed over Madrid & disappeared to the east. It took about 1 1/2 - 2 mins for it to cross the sky. Since the sky was almost perfectly clear, there were certainly no cloud effects to explain this very solid object. A few tiny cirrous (SIC) clouds were illuminated by the sun, the disc was not, so we estimate that it must have been below the altitude of the clouds (probably less than 20,000 ft). It moved steadily, and seemed to gain speed as it passed eastward. There were no lights visible, nor was there any sound associated with it.

I do not know whether you are at all interested in this subject at this time, but we both feel it our duty to report this observation, in case it might correlate with some other report from this area, or in some way be helpful to you.

Dr. [REDACTED] took a photograph of the disc as it passed by and we hope it will demonstrate what we saw. If you are interested in obtaining the photo, please write to me after August 5 at the address below.

I called Dr. [REDACTED] attention to it, and we both jokingly said that it must just be one of the famous "flying saucers!" But as the seconds passed it soon became anything but a joke.

I automatically kept trying to eliminate all possibilities that could explain the thing on a natural basis, but got nowhere. When it was about half way across the sky, (having taken all this time when the object was best illuminated or contrasted by the bright sky behind) to convince ourselves of its reality, we both yelled, "get the camera, quick!"

The thing seemed to go fairly slowly over Madrid, but started picking up speed as it went eastward beyond the city. Altho it could be seen in the view-finder of the camera allright, it will be lucky if we get a decent picture of it because it was now against the darker eastern sky, and 35 mm color film isn't exactly the best for such a shot.

At any rate, we tried, and will turn in the negative if it shows anything at all. This was a disturbing experience to us and we really wish we had not seen the object, since we were both more or less convinced that such sightings were usually reported only be cranks or crack-pots and merely represented some easily explained natural phenomenon that had become distorted & misinterpreted by hysterical individuals.

However, though no one believes us, I felt it my duty to report this matter to the Air Force Technical Intelligence Center, and can only hope that the photographic evidence which we should have in another week, will be of assistance to them.

ADDENDUM

I. Dr. [REDACTED] has reviewed this report and concurs with all opinions expressed except for answer to question #22.

We both agree that this is the most difficult question that you have asked. A coin held at arms length against the sky, if held in a window, looks large; if held against a vast expanse of sky, it appears small; (for the same reason that

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the full moon looks much larger when rising than when overhead).


However, after practising with coins etc, he has convinced me that my answer is probably incorrect, and that the object was between "pea" & "dime" sized.

It is easier for me to say that it appeared to be about $\frac{1}{4}$ the size of the full moon -- (when seen at its closest approach).

II. Dr. Ellis was in the U. S. Navy during W. W. II at a location where launching of weather balloons was very common. I have never had the opportunity of observing these, but he is familiar with their appearance and is convinced that the unidentified object was not any type of balloon that he has ever seen.

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COMMENTS of Preparing Officer:

1. It is the opinion of the Preparing Officer that the reliability of the observers in this sighting is good but as sighting was from only one point no definite conclusion can be made.

2. Dr. [REDACTED] was not asked to submit a separate statement because he viewed the object together with SOURCE and his conclusions were the same except for a small difference in size of the object. (See inclosure #1, Part One)

3. A limited analysis of the photographic evidence,, Inclosure #1, Part Two, reveals nothing of significance. Microscopic study may alter this opinion.

NOTE: UFOB location on slide pinpointed by lines drawn on frame.

4. The only possible explanation could be an aircraft. A jet flying low would be below the rays of the sun and would appear black. The exact outline would be hard to distinguish.

a. The time duration was in line with an aircraft sighting.


b. Exact altitude not definite, therefore, the great speed reported by the SOURCE could be explained by a low flying jet aircraft.

Dear Sirs:

Another Long Beach, Calif. physician & myself are vacationing in Europe for the month of July. Neither of us had ever seriously considered the possibility of "flying saucers" being real objects, and assumed that all such observations could be explained on the basis of natural phenomena or pure hysteria.

However, just after sunset this evening (8:35 pm Madrid time), Dr. [redacted] & I were sitting on the open sun porch adjoining our room on the top floor of this hotel. A dark circular object appearing about $\frac{1}{3}$ the size of the moon appeared in the bright western sky, passed over Madrid & disappeared to the east. It took about $1\frac{1}{2}$ -2 mins for it to cross the sky. Since the sky was almost perfectly clear, there were certainly no cloud effects to explain this very solid object. A few tiny cirrus clouds were illuminated by the sun, the disc was not, so we estimate that it must have been below the altitude of the clouds (probably less than 20,000 ft). It moved steadily, and seemed to gain speed as it passed eastward. There were no lights visible, nor was there any sound associated with it.

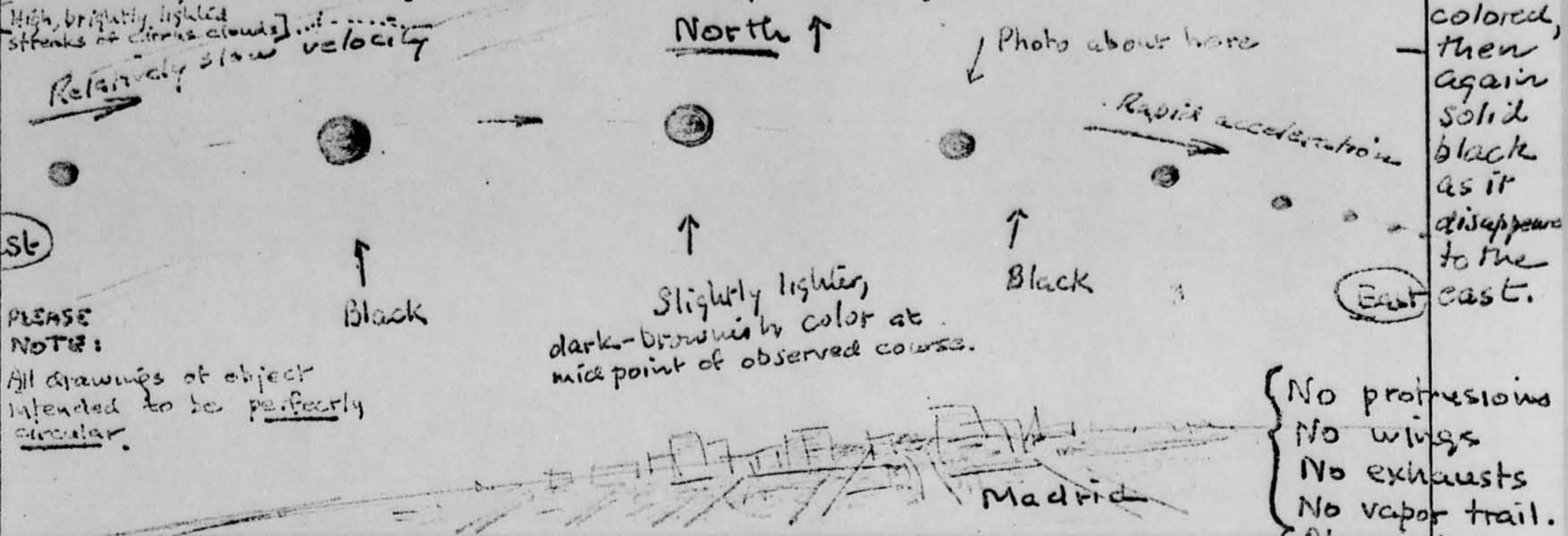

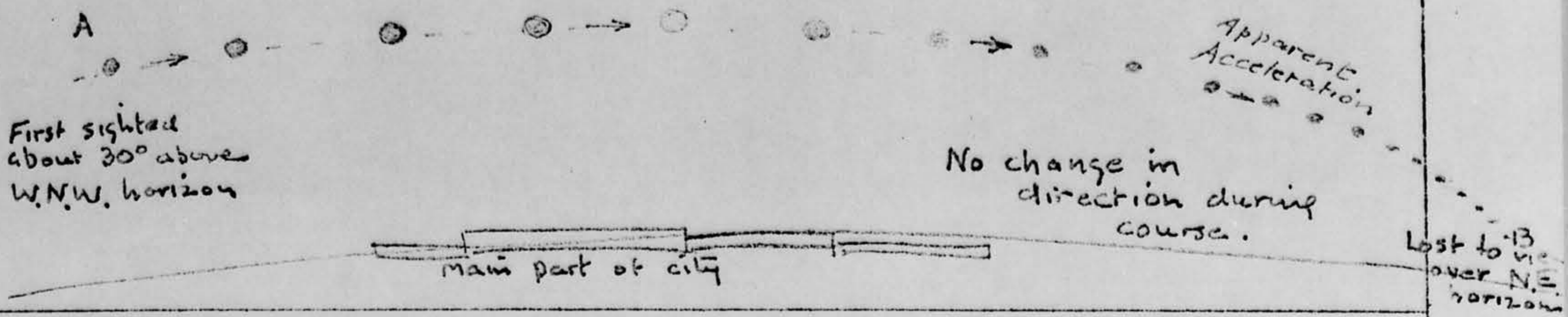
