10. BRIEF SUMMARY OF SIGHTING <b>One (1) object, the size of a half dollar held at arms length, appeared to be brighter than stars or normal aircraft. The colors of the object were yellow and white. The object took two or three seconds to travel from a position directly overhead to the eastern horizon.</b>				11. COMMENTS <b>Due to the delay in receiving the initial report and its failing to meet the other criteria of investigation, no investigation authorized. The duration of the sighting and the fact that the object crossed a major portion of the sky in a few seconds leads to the conclusion of POSSIBLY ASTRONOMICAL: METEORITE OR METEOR.</b>
