# FLAMING OBJECT BASHES HOLE IN

Case 129, Lawrence, Mass., Aug. 11. 1955-Possibly related to the "meteoric" cases mentioned above is an incident reported by the Lawrence Evening Tribune, which reads, "Coming out of the sky in a cloud of smoke, an object not yet identified, struck the side of a house occupied by Mr. and Mrs. Rei Bernard, shortly after 1:30 p.m. Thursday and made a good sized hole in the house, with a shattering of wood around it, before it fell to the ground; Sergeant Philip DtAdamo at police beadquarters was notified of the occurrence by Edmund Rickard, whose wife was a witness to the object striking the house, and cruising car squads were sent to the scene to investigate. Mrs. Rickard stated that she was on her porch shaking out a mop when she saw the object come hurtling through the sky and hit the back of the Boroard house. Showid the best it came through the air in a cloud of amone and his without a resounding crach, after which it fell into the yard. Mrs. Rickard identified the object as being as big as half a manhole cover and said that it made a hole in the side of the house about eithe inches by a floor, with a shattering of wood all around de bola . . . .

#### LOUISIANA WOMAN FRIGHTENED BY LENTICULAR DEVICE

August 21, 1955: At Chalmette, Louisiana, Mrs. chanced to look out of her window shortly after midnight on August 21, 1955; she saw, much to her astonishment, a low-hovering object about the size of a plane, a block and a half away. Rotating slowly, it was a glowing white, as clear as the full moon, and appeared to be a solid object. The glow was bright and even, and the edges were clearly defined. It looked like two soup plates put together, but rounded at top and bottom. There was a rim encircling the outer edge.

The night was dark and the sky clear; the weather warm and dry. After watching the object for about ten seconds, Mrs. saw it move to the south, then turn up on edge and shoot away at high speed (a typical maneuver). She described the phenomenon as "very pretty and very frightening."

The information was obtained from the witness by a constant of New Orleans, in correspondence. It am a careful and thorough investigator, writes: "I am thoroughly convinced that it was an honest report. I questioned her thoroughly by mail and had to pry the facts out of her. She is certainly not a publicity seeker, and a hoax seems unlikely because of the non-sensational nature of the report, and the unwillingness of the observer to discuss the matter freely. Our correspondence ceased abruptly when she asked me what it was, and I suggested that it might be a spaceship."

An additional note of perhaps some significance concerning her report is that not only did the incident occur on the same date as the Hopkinsville, Kentucky, "landing," but the object as described by Mrs., is almost identical to the object described by at Hopkinsville. (The two towns are approximately 500 miles apart in a straight line.)

These figures are <u>not</u> accurate and the data on the sighting are far too inconclusive to be of any real value, except perhaps in the chance that someone else in the same vicinity, but with a better vantage point, had the opportunity to observe the same object with greater detail. Even if this would be the case, chances are that such an observer would fail to record the sighting with any authority.


One thing I have failed to do is to check with the weather bureau on the ceiling for that date; by doing so we could determine that the object was not below such-and-such altitude. I have made half an attempt to do so, but one party referred me to another and they in turn to another and I become easily discouraged with this type of merry-go-round.

Although my brother failed to see the object, he was convinced that I had seen the reflection of the setting sun off the fuselage of a high-flying jet. I would be inclined to agree with him but for two points: a) the object was flat white and very definitely not reflections and b) the absence of any sound makes the jet explanation questionable, unless the winds were such as to eliminate the sound from my position.

Outside of a few sightings of "Nocturnal Meandering Lights", this is the only time I have observed what might possibly have been an UFO; if the data on many of the other cases were no better than mine, I'm afraid we would be forced to label the subject "BUNK!", as does the astronomer Royal, Sir Harold Spencer Jones.

But as in the former case mentioned above, I find myself extremely perplexed as to the limited witnesses involving sightings over the metropolitan area. Either one of two explanations must be considered: a) the observer(s) suffer(s) from a subjective hallucination or b) people just do not look at the sky in New York City. Your views on this would perhaps be most enlightning.

I want to thank you again for your interest. If you might be able to add any further information to the above mentioned cases for our own records, we would be greatly appreciative.

I would like to thank you for your kind reply of August 13 in answer to my letter to you of August 8.

The following report of an UFO over the city came to my attention last Week: On July 24, sometime between 7:45 and 8:30 p.m., Mr. and Mrs. New York City 25, were walking in Riverside Park near 107th Street. Mrs. called attention to a long, silvery object high in the sky above the Hudson River. It was moving quite slowly at first, then sped rapidly and gracefully to the south like "a very straight silvery stick." The apparent width was less than the full moon and the length was equal to that of 8-10 full moons placed side by side. They are German and I questioned Mrs. at length. I had some trouble trying to determine exactly what she meant in her descriptions; she said that although it was extremely shiny, it wasn't like silver or aluminum, but "in between." I presume she meant that the object had some sort of luminosity, though she didn't seem to be sure what I meant by this. She was uncertain as to the exact shape and likened it only to a "silvery stick." When asked for details about the two ends of the object, she could not give a satisfactory answer. Mr. description varied rather abruptly from his wife's; he said the object appeared to resemble more of a long oval. However, when asked if it resembled a long cigar, his answer was negative. He was under the impression that the object was stationary in the sky. Before I am satisfied with this observation, there are many more questions to ask the witnesses. Mrs. remarked that the most interesting thing about the sighting was the fact that a plane, approaching New York from the west, passed directly over the object and they felt that the crew of the plane must surely have seen it. With the was an elderly friend, Mrs. of the same address. She also witnessed the phenomenon but as yet I've had no chance to question her.

The following report is of very little importance, but I include it simply for the record.

At approximately 7:15 p.m. on Sunday, August 13, 1955, I was sitting on the back porch of my brother's apartment at Stamford, Conn. High in the sky, at about a 65-70° elevation and roughly 90° of azimuth, I saw a small white round object moving in approximately a southeast heading at a steady rate of speed. The object was circular and flat white, as clearly as I could make out, and was about one tenth the size of a full moon.

I watched the object for several seconds as it passed above the clouds and disappeared momentarily from view. Calling my brother to the porch, I watched it reappear and tried in vain to point it out to him. By this time it was dwindling to a speck and when I lost sight of it, it was about 40° above the horizon in the general area of the southeast quadrant. I estimate I was able to follow it through about 30-40° of arc in a period of about one minute.





#### FLAMING OBJECT BASHES HOLE IN SIDE OF HOUSE

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Case 129, Lawrence, Mass., Aug. 11, 1955-Possibly related to the "meteoric" cases mentioned above is an incident reported by the Lawrence Evening Tribune, which reads, "Coming out of the sky in a cloud of smoke, an object not yet identified, struck the side of a house occupied by Mr. and Mrs. Rei Bernard, shortly after 1:30 p.m. Thursday and made a good sized hole in the house, with a shattering of wood around it, before it fell to the ground. Sergeant Philip DiAdamo at police headquarters was notified of the occurrence by Edmund Rickard, whose wife was a witness to the object striking the house, and cruising car squads were sent to the scene to investigate. Mrs. Rickard stated that she was on her porch shaking out a mop when she saw the object come hurtling through the sky and hit the back of the Bernard house. She said that it came through the air in a cloud of smoke and hit with a resounding crash, after which it fell into the yard. Mrs. Rickard identified the object as being as big as half a manhole cover and said that it made a hole in the side of the house about eight inches by a foot, with a shattering of wood all around the hole. . .
