Case - Henderson N. C.: This report was submitted by J. Edgar Hoover, Chief, FBI. Dr. Hynek arranged for a personal interview with Miss Minutes (now Mrs. 4 and her (then) flance, Mr. Miles, who also observed the object that whizzed over their car on a lonely North Carolina road just before dawn on 16 April 56. Mrs. Name is an FBI employee and Mr. Mannes, according to Dr. Hynek, is believed to be a member of the CIA. As such, they are considered to be reliable informants. Further, they both expressed concern over the UFO sighting from the publicity viewpoint, and the affect it may have on their professions. They were assured that their interests would be honored. The object was seen for only a few fleeting seconds. It resembled a "large top" in outline. They emphatically stated that it was not a newspaper, a large bird (owl, Canadian goose) or similar object that they observed. Dr. Hynek and the undersigned reached this conclusion: the possibility that it may have been a kite dangling from its string that was hanging over the road from a telephone pole, wire or tree. Also, it was March and kites are flown quite extensively by children in that locality. The outline of a kite, when sketched, does resemble a "large top" which would startle the drivers that flashed underneath it, first hitting it with their headlight beams. On April 6, 1956, Miss State Complete, an employee of this Bureau who resides at The Carolina, via automobile, with her fiance, Mr. Language, Jr., observed an unusual object which appeared to resemble a flying saucer.

Miss Remark stated at about 5 A.M., on April 6, 1956, while it was still dark and while driving on Route 1 north of Henderson, North Carolina, she and Mr. were startled by what appeared to be an oval-shaped, low-flying object coming directly towards their car at a great speed, on the driver's side. Miss that stated the object, which was less than 25 feet from the ground, appeared to be spinning, was bright as though containing a series of lights in a zigzágging pattern, was light blue in color and was at least as wide as the highway and no more than from two to four feet in thickness. She stated the object did not change shape, it made no sound and that she observed it for only a few seconds before it appeared to pass over the car, accelerate speed and veer off out of sight behind them. Miss advised when daylight came she noticed it was cloudy and that approximately 30 minutes after they had sighted the object it began to rain.

- 1. Reference letter from Dr. Hynek addressed to Misselfer FBI employee, regarding a proposal for an interview on the sighting observed by her on 16 April 1956. Letter in case file.
- 2. The following are the results of conferences held between Dr. Hynek and the undersigned on 13 September 1956 at Cambridge, Massachusetts:
- a. Miss Products, who is now married to her then fiance (and coobserver of the sighting) was interviewed together with her husband, Mr.

 The sighting is believed to be a member of the CIA. As such, this
 would place both Mr. and Mrs.
- b. The object which passed over their car at dawn was observed for only a fleeting instant. It rushed from the front of their car and Mrs. The turned around to observe it flashing by from the rear window. Under questioning they agreed it resembled a "large top" in outline.
- c. Both insisted that it was not a newspaper or large bird, such as owl, goose, etc. that suddenly flew over their car while speeding through the darkness.
- 3. Dr. Hynek and the undersigned approached the following possible explanation of the sighting from the only slim clue: "It looked like a large top in outline":
- a. It was March and children do considerable kite flying at this time of year and in this locality.
- b. Kites are usually snagged in telephone wires or trees throughout the United States, and the general size and shape of a kite does resemble a large top in outline.
- c. A kite hanging from its string, and a few feet above the highway, would seem to suddenly pass over the car with "startling speed" and disappear from the rear window.
- 4. Mr. and Mrs. Masse, being members of intelligence agencies, told a sincere and straight forward story and expressed concern that there be no publicity, inasmuch as it could reflect on their professions.
- 5. Although the above explanation is very limited and the best that could be given under the circumstances, the sighting will be placed under an "insufficient info" category until such time more information is obtained.
