Case 182, Ipswich, Mass., Aug. 7, 9, 10, 1956—Mysterious lights were first seen by Edwin Damon and Russell Green Tuesday night. The lights reappeared more brilliantly on Thursday when the skywatchers were joined by two more neighbors. Green who watched till 2:45 a.m. Friday said that it was a ball of light, very bright. He said that it changed shape from a disc to a crescent and faded away only to return. He described it as moving slowly from right to left and up and down. Following it with binoculars Green said that it appeared to have a nimbus or colored light around it. Civil Defense said that radar had been involved in the sightings and that the results were being scrutinized at top headquarters of the Eastern Air Defense Command. Temperature inversion was considered as an explanation.
