Knowledge of UFOB was first brought to the attention of the 100th Bomb Wing Intelligence upon receipt of a telephone still from Mr. Atterney at Law, on 9 March 1957.

February 16, 1957. CSI member Yeaman Condict was walking northward in Laurelton,

near the northeastern horizon. It was a brilliant incandescent yellow-orange in
color, one-fourth the size of the recently-risen full moon, which was just to its
right. The meteor moved downward and to the observer's right as he faced it, ard
"looked as if it were going to hit the ground"; but being somewhat low on the
horizon, it disappeared from view behind buildings after being observed for 2 to
3 seconds. Ur. Condict hurried to the corner, but it had disappeared.

The observation, one of a group of recent local sightings of fireballs and more or less fireball-like objects, is included here in the hope of obtaining corroborating reports for the purpose of triangulation.

14. On 9 March 57, an investigation team composed of Capt Anthony, Capt Blue, T/Sgt McNeil, and S/Sgt Jack visited the pond where the object supposedly fell. Observations of the surrounding area showed no indication of burned tree tops, bushes, etc., which would have been caused by a low flying burning object. Due to mild weather a large portion of the ice had melted and no trace remained of the hole described by Mr. Gunderson, nor was any object visible in the water.					
15. On 13 March 57, the investigation team again visited the pond where the object supposedly fell. This time the team was equipped with 1 geiger counter and 1 ion chamber. The pond and the surrounding area for 50 yards was thoroughly probed. The highest reading recorded on the geiger counter was 1/100 of a roentgen. The ion chamber reading was negative. It is the opinion of the investigating team that Mrs. is sincere and convinced that she did see a bright green lighted object passover the top of her house and disappear behind the trees.
