1. Description of object:

- a. Shape: Round
- b. Size: Larger than a B-47 aircraft.
- c. Color: Pink to red.
- d. Number: One object seen by all observers except Mr. and Mrs. [REDACTED] who claim a second object joined the first momentarily, then both rose to great heights and disappeared.
- e. Formation: N/A
- f. Features: Three illuminating lights equally spaced around the object.
- g. No tail, trail or exhaust.
- h. Sound: None

2. Description and course of object:

- a. Observers attention first drawn to object while casually looking at the sky.
- b. Angle of observation: High in the sky in a northeast direction from the observers.
- c. Angle of elevation and azimuth of object upon disappearance: Same as above.
- d. Description of flight path and maneuvers of object: Hovered in one area continuously for approximately 40 minutes to one hour. Mr. [REDACTED] observed the object through a surveyor's transit for approximately 25 minutes. During this time the object hovered between 357° and 020° magnetic.
- e. Manner of disappearance of object: Rose high in the sky and disappeared.
- f. Length of time in sight: Forty minutes to one hour.

a. Civilian: Mr. ██████████, Center Sandwich, manager of a lumber mill; Mrs. ██████████, Center Sandwich, housewife; Mr. ██████████, Center Sandwich, realtor; Mr. ██████████, RFD 1, Center Harbor, occupation unknown; Mrs. ██████████, RFD 1, Center Harbor, housewife; ██████████, RFD 1, Center Harbor, high school student.

b. Military: Major ██████████, USAF, Retired, Center Sandwich, postmaster.

a. Observers account of weather conditions: Clear, visibility good.

b. Report from nearest AWS or US Weather Bureau: Surface wind N/NW at 7 knots. Surface temperature 48°F. Wind at 6,000 feet 20°/20 knots; wind at 10,000 feet 20°/25 knots; wind at 16,000 feet 320°/30 knots; wind at 30,000 feet 280°/35 knots; wind at 50,000 feet 280°/25 knots.

c. Ceiling: 25,000 feet.

10. Air traffic: One F-86F prior to sighting.

11. Position title and comments of preparing officer: The control room at PAFB received a call from Mr. ██████████ between 1900 and 1910 hours on 22 March 1957. The investigation team composed of Capt Anthony, Capt Blue, and M/Sgt Sayer arrived in Center Sandwich, N.H. at 0630 hours on 23 March 1957, and remained for approximately four (4) hours. Although the total number of people who saw the object was approximately fifty (50), (this estimate given by Mr. ██████████) the statements of 15 people interviewed are similar, therefore only the names of the principal observers are included in this report. Mr. ██████████ who observed the object through a transit is of the opinion that it was a weather balloon. All other persons who observed the object have no opinion as to what it was, other than a strange object in the sky. ██████████ supposedly took four (4) photographs of the object. When developed by the Photo Lab at PAFB, the film was completely blank. During the period the team investigated the incident no unusual or strange objects were visible in the sky.
