





LOW-FLYING DISC FRIGHTENS EARLY HORNING FISHERMAN

July 23, 1957: Dominick Drago, a beauty-shop operator of Bethlehem, Pennsylvania, was driving northeast on Route 521 in Warren County, New Jersey, en route to Swartswood Lake (Sussex County) to fish. It was 5:15 a.m., just before sunup. He had just passed through Squire's Corner, a little village about three miles north of Blairstown. To the right of the road about a quarter of a mile away is White Pond. Drago was driving up a slight grade when he suddenly saw a large greyish oval-shaped object emerge from above a row of trees on the left side of the road some distance ahead. It moved swiftly to his right (northwest to southeast) in a straight, level path at a 15 degree elevation until it passed beyond the right side of the road, when it ascended slightly and made a sweeping counterclockwise U-turn toward the north and back toward the road. Stopping abruptly, it hung motionless in the air to his right, somewhere between the road and White Pond. There it remained as the observer drove past, and it was still there when he lost sight of it.

Its altitude was relatively low—it seemed to Drago to be no more than a few hundred feet away from him. It appeared very much larger than the full moon: by actual comparison with coins, it was similar to a quarter held at arm's length, and tilted toward the observer from a horizontal position. It was a sharply defined solid body, but non-metallic in appearance; its color was grey, "like a dull mist." (Compare with previous report.) Although darker than the brightening dawn sky behind it, the observer was certain that the object had a slight, colorless luminosity. The shape was definitely circular; the bottom flat, or flattish; and the top might have been irregular, although he was uncertain of this detail. He did not see any cylindrical rim, or edge, as on a coin. When the object crossed the road, it presented a full ellipse; while hovering, the visible ellipse appeared narrower, and more pointed at the ends, and at this time it was inclined at a slight angle to the horizontal.

Mr. Drago had the object in view for at least two mimutes, but since he was driving, it was not under uninterupted surveillance. It was still ahead of him, and to the right of the road, when it commenced hovering, but he drove on past and left it behind as fast as possible, for he was alarmed by its sudden appearance and peculiar behavior. ("Nothing ever scared me before," he remarked to us, adding that, uncertain as to what it might do next, it made him feel "trapped" in his car.) He finally lost sight of the object when the car passed under a bank of trees further along the road.

Mr. Drago was interviewed in his home on Sept. 2nd by Ted Bloecher, Lex Mebane, Ivan Sanderson and Stefan Santesson; we have Chester Ehrie to thank for bringing the report to our attention. All the interviewers felt that Mr. Drago was a thoroughly trustworthy witness and that he gave a straightforward and unembroidered account of what he had seen.

Missile Flight Safety Chief Reports Sighting of Large UFO

Nathan Wagner, missile flight safety chief for the White Sands Proving Ground, has reported the sighting of a "large, unidentifiable object" between Las Cruces, New Mexico and El Paso, Texas. This report has added importance because of Mr. Wagner's statement regarding the possibility that spaceships may be involved in near collisions on airways. (Story in this issue)

According to Mr. Wagner, his entire family saw this large UFO for 35 to 40 seconds on July 24, 1957. When first sighted, the object was heading east toward the Organ Mauntains. The missile safety chief was driving to El Paso when the UFO was first sighted by his wife, then by both their children.

Mrs. Wagner, the missile expert said, called it a "flying saucer." All agreed that it was not a familiar shape. The UFO was traveling so fast that by the time Mr. Wagner had stopped the car for a good look it had vanished.

July 25, 1957: While driving northward along Springwater Road, in Clackamas County, Oregon, in the vicinity of the Estacada-Springwater highway, Brad Woodward and Carl Pollack, two county tax appraisers, were "almost blinded" at 12:35 p.m. when a brilliant disc-shaped object suddenly crossed the sky in front of them. They said the object resembled a "bright silver dollar" as it passed from their left to right at a "terrific" speed, about 150 above the horizon. "The object seemed to be spinning and was tilted at a slight angle...we didn't hear the slightest sound or see any sign of a vapor trail," the men said. They had it in view only several seconds before it disappeared from sight beyond the right-hand corner of the car's windshield. -- Oregon City Enterprise Courier, 7/28. (Since the object was definitely seen to be a flat disc, there is no question of its being a daylight fireball; moreover, a fireball would have been reported by many observers over a wide area.)

THE GALT INCIDENT: From indefatigable Gene Duplantier, 1157 Saint Clair Avenue, West, Toronto 10, Ontario, Canada, besides the full account of the Galt incident, where a boy saw a saucer and later three-toed footprints burn marks on ground were found, we received the following comment: "I would like to add the following information about the Galt sighting. I spoke to Jack, and he told me and showed me various things the paper did not say. He also corrected some things the paper said and as he said, 'errors'. There were three prints in the circular area as if it had a tripod landing gear. The distances were approximately 14, 15 and 17 feet between prints. Jack didn't go to the scene after it took off. He went home. It wasn't until Thursday that he and two friends went to view the scene. There was slight radio-activity around the circumference of the area. This has been checked by a local resident with a geiger-counter. An investigator for the NICAP organization visited the youth. The official preferred to remain unknown. The Royal Canadian Air Force up to then, hadn't investigated, which seemed strange 's me, n THE STREET STREET, STR

"Monster" Theory Discarded in UFO Landing Case Witnessed in Galt, Ontario, Canada

An an-the-spot NICAP investigation of the Galt, Ontario "monster" story, which was publicized on August 3, 1957, has produced no absolute evidence that any three-toed creature was involved, as first hinted. But though this suggestion is generally rejected, evidence indicating that some unknown machine landed or briefly touched down near Galt has not been discredited.

The story first made headlines when 15-year-old Jack Stephens reported having seen a round dome-topped object four miles southwest of Galt on July 30. According to his signed NICAP report, the brightly glowing UFO hovered almost on the ground for about 45 minutes. Then, after ascending vertically, it leveled out and disappeared at a speed exceeding that of a jet.

When the UFO descended it made a throbbing sound, Stephens said. The lower part was aluminum colored; the upper part brighter, like chromium. In an interview with Roy Francis of the Galt EVENING REPORTER, Stephens said the domed top did not rotate, but the main body did revolve at high speed. As the machine hovered near the ground, he said, he could see a reddish flame beneath it. When the rotating section slowed down, its glow resolved into several small lighted areas, which he called portholes, around the lower rim. (It has since been suggested that these could have been jet exhausts.)

After the UFO took off, Stephens said, he was too frightened to tell anyone for two days. When the area was examined by Francis and other investigators, they found some braken branches, several charred spots on the ground, and indentarions 18 inches long, shaped roughly like huge, three-toed footprints.

An implication that it was a hoax-not

causing the three-toed affect, the rest of the indentations being caused by sliding of the landing gear.

This suggestion, forwarded by NICAP's Special Adviser Wilbert B. Smith, former head of the Canadian Government's UFO project, came from Mr. Alfred Emerson who made a personal check on the Galt
