

1. The objects seen on the evening of 7 March 1960, have been determined to be the re-entry of Discoverer VIII satellite. It apparently began its breakup over Florida.

2. Mr. [REDACTED] probably witnessed the re-entry of the above satellite. The time of his sighting, as well as his description of the objects, is identical to that reported by other witnesses.

Gentlemen:

This is for the purpose of reporting the sighting of what, so far as we were concerned, were unidentified flying objects on the evening of March 7, 1960, at 2017 EST in the vicinity of lat $25^{\circ} 18' N$ long $77^{\circ} 43' W$. Three of us were on board a 38 ft auxiliary ketch en route from Nassau to Chub Point, in the Berry Is., BVI; the owner, [REDACTED], my wife, and myself. Mr [REDACTED] and myself were on deck, my wife was below at the initial sighting.

The objects appeared midway between Polaris and Cassiopeia and appeared to be seven in number to me, arranged as follows:



All appeared to be travelling exactly the same course and speed. The course was generally southerly, so they were moving roughly from our right to left, as we were on about $310^{\circ} T$, but at the same time they appeared to be climbing very rapidly. They were what I would guess to be "rather far away", which could have been anything from 15 to 100 miles. We heard no sound relative to this at all.

Several seconds after my initial observation, having satisfied myself that they were not a constellation and that they were moving, I called Mr Hatch's attention to them. He confirmed my observation, and I then called to my wife to come up and see them. She did at about 15 sec after my first sighting. In this interval 6 of the 7 had vanished, one after the other, in the order G F E D C A, leaving only B, which she saw, and which then vanished in about another 5 sec.

All the objects had about the same color, a light orange; size, roughly as I have drawn them viewed from about 6 ft; and brightness, except for B which was noticeably brighter than the others. Very approximately, their brightness was halfway between Betelgeuse and Sirius but more orange than the former.

I have been wondering if these might have been jet planes with after-burners on, but the formation seemed a little unusual for this, and if they were they must have been much closer than my guess and we should have been able to hear them. I would be much interested in knowing whether you have had any other reports of this particular incident.

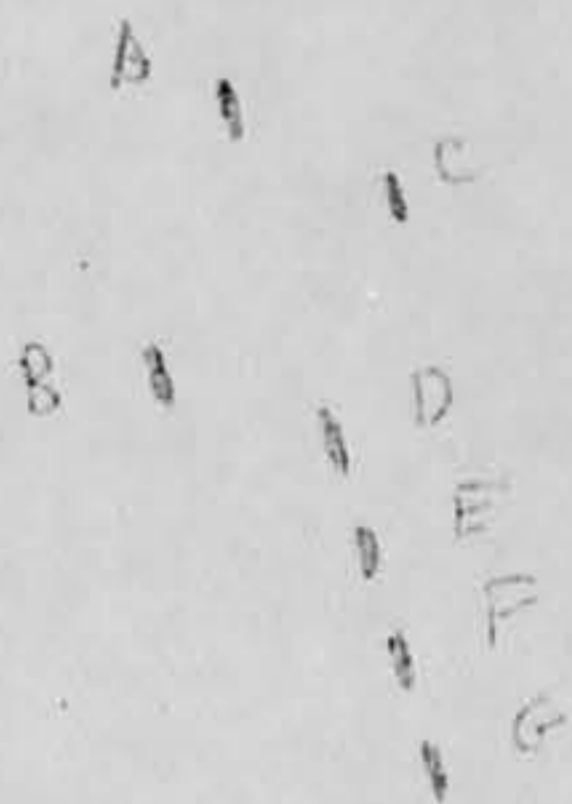

Sir:

At 2010 hrs. this evening, I sighted a strange object flying at about 10,000 feet, flying at about 600+ hrs. This object was heading in a south-south-westerly direction.

This object was colored a green or white, and gave off no apperant sound. An aircraft, either conventional or jet, would have made some sound flying under similar conditions.

This object had no apperant red or green running lights. Only the constant green to white light.

The circumstances for this sighting are as follows: I was walking in a northerly direction from the College when this bright, fast moving object caught my eye. I watched it moving in a straight line of flight until it entered a cloud bank. The total time of the sighting could not be more than fifteen to twenty seconds.





On 7 March 1960 about 2015R while orbiting NAS Sanford at 8000 feet in an A3D-1 type aircraft, we sighted 9 bright white objects on a bearing of 020° out of Navy Sanford. At first sighting they appeared to be over Daytona Beach, however, this crew has no idea of their distance from Navy Sanford. They appeared to be over the coast and slightly above the horizon. They resembled nothing this crew has ever seen before. They were by no means conventional aircraft, jet or prop. A head-on view of the object revealed one large white light, accompanied by several smaller ones of a lesser intensity. As they passed abeam us (090°) they appeared to be traveling at a high rate of speed, parallel to the horizon. They were streaming fire or extremely hot gases a tremendous distance aft. We counted 9 distinct objects. The fire or hot glowing gas was trailing approximately 100 times the diameter of the lead object, aft. The object faded from our crew on a heading of 180°. They did not appear to burn out, but dim and fade due to distance. Sanford tower advised us to investigate, but we were unable to do so due to a fractured right windshield.

URGENT

CAPE CANAVERAL, FLA., MARCH 7--(UPI)--A MYSTERIOUS FORMATION OF FLAMING, COLORED LIGHTS FLASHED ACROSS THREE SOUTHEASTERN STATES TONIGHT, TOUCHING OFF AN AIR FORCE INVESTIGATION AND SPECULATION THAT THE SOVIET SATELLITE LUNIK III HAD FALLEN TO EARTH.

THE ARCING LIGHTS WERE SEEN OVER THIS U.S. SPACEPORT AROUND 8:10 P.M., SOME 10 MINUTES AFTER THEY WERE FIRST SPOTTED OVER NORTH CAROLINA AND LATER OVER SOUTH CAROLINA.

THE NATIONAL SPACE AGENCY IN WASHINGTON CONFIRMED THAT LUNIK III, THE MASSIVE RUSSIAN ROCKET THAT TOOK PICTURES OF THE FAR SIDE OF THE MOON, WAS EXPECTED TO PLUNGE INTO THE EARTH'S ATMOSPHERE IN MARCH.

BUT NASA AUTHORITIES SAID THAT THE SMITHSONIAN ASTROPHYSICAL LABORATORY AT CAMBRIDGE, MASS., WAS THE AGENCY WHICH KEPT TRACK OF SATELLITES ONCE THEY WERE LAUNCHED.

HOWEVER, OFFICIALS AT THE SMITHSONIAN LAB SAID THEY COULD GIVE NO EXPLANATION FOR THE LIGHTS, WHICH TRIGGERED A SMALL FLURRY "FLYING SAUCER" TALK.

AN AIR FORCE SPOKESMAN WERE TOLD UNITED PRESS INTERNATIONAL THAT "THE ONLY THING WE CAN SAY RIGHT NOW IS THAT WE ARE INVESTIGATING."

MISSILEMEN WERE SAID THAT THE LIGHTS "DEFINITELY LOOKED" LIKE A SATELLITE MIGHT BE EXPECTED TO LOOK IN FALLING BACK TO EARTH, WITH THE RED-HEAT OF AIR FRICTION TEARING IT APART.

OBSERVERS AT WINSTON-SALEM, HIGH POINT, STATESVILLE AND CHARLOTTE, IN NORTH CAROLINA, AND AT COLUMBIA, S.C., REPORTED SEEING THE BRIGHT LIGHTS FLAME ACROSS THE SKY. ONE WITNESS SAID HE SAW FIVE SEPARATE PIECES OF LIGHT WITH AN ORANGE OR WHITE FLAME BETWEEN THEM.

THE LIGHTS WHICH FLASHED OVER THE CAPE TRAVELED IN A BOARD ARC GENERALLY NORTH-NORTHWEST TO SOUTH-SOUTHEAST, APPARENTLY AT HIGH ALTITUDES AND AT HIGH SPEED, CURVING GRACEFULLY TO THE HORIZON DUE EAST OF HERE.

THE LIGHTS STARTED AS A CLOSELY-COLLECTED MASS OF FLAMING COLORS--RED, BLUE, GREEN, ORANGE AND YELLOW--THEN SPREAD OUT AS THEY SHOT TO THE SOUTHEAST.

THROUGH BINOCULARS, THE LIGHTS APPEARED TO BE FAST-MOVING BALLS OF A MOLTEN SUBSTANCE, PERHAPS METAL, FALLING APART. THE DISPLAY LASTED ABOUT THREE MINUTES BEFORE BLINKING INTO BLACKNESS.

SIMULTANEOUSLY, ANOTHER SLOWER-MOVING OBJECT TRAVELED OVER THE CAPE IN THE SAME GENERAL DIRECTION. BUT ITS LIGHT WAS A BRILLIANT WHITE, FLASHING AT ABOUT ONE-SECOND INTERVALS. IT DISAPPEARED INTO THE SOUTHEAST, THEN MADE A RETURN TRIP.

THIS OBJECT LEFT A VAPOR TRAIL FAINTLY VISIBLE THROUGH BINOCULARS, AND ITS LIGHTS WERE SIMILAR TO THE STROBE LIGHTS WHICH FLASH ABOARD MANY MISSILES LAUNCHED AT CAPE CANAVERAL AT NIGHT. STROBE LIGHTS ARE USED TO ENABLE BALLISTIC CAMERAS TO TRACK MISSILES ACCURATELY.

Agencies in Disagreement On Mystery Lights

A press release by UPI, datelined March 8, revealed that the Air Force was investigating reports of a mysterious stream of lights that flashed across eastern U.S. on the 7th of March. According to the U.S. Defense Department, the lights were seen as far north as Lake Erie and as far south as Key West, Florida.

Air Force officials in Washington said the lights were believed to have been caused by a meteor. Missilemen at Cape Canaveral, however, said the lights "definitely looked" like a satellite as it fell back to earth and burned in the atmosphere.

The National Space Agency in Washington confirmed the fact that Lunik III, the huge Soviet rocket which put the picture-taking satellite around the moon, was expected to fall into the earth's atmosphere in March.

But . . . officials at the Smithsonian astrophysical laboratory at Cambridge, Massachusetts, which keeps track of satellites once they are launched, said that the lights, which were reported by airline pilots, Air Force pilots, state police and control towers, had not been explained by them—they simply couldn't explain them away.

Observed through binoculars, the objects appeared to be fast-moving balls of molten substance, perhaps metal, which were falling apart, and which spread out as they proceeded into the southeast. They were observed at Cape Canaveral at 8:10 p.m., 10 minutes after they were spotted over North Carolina. The display at Canaveral lasted for three minutes, before disappearing into the blackness of the night. The three minute observation takes the objects out of the category of meteors, and since Smithsonian could

not explain them, experts conjecture about crashing rockets. We must then assume that the formation of lights was probably a flock of UFOs.

UFO SIGHTING
EASTERN UNITED STATES
7 March 1960

On March 1960 between the hours of 2010 and 2027 witnesses along the east coast of the United States from Maine to Florida, and airborne witnesses as far west as Ohio, reported sighting an unidentified flying object. The object was described as a flaming formation of bright lights having a shape like an ice cream cone. The object was reported as a very brilliant white trailing off to a bright red. Many witnesses reported that the object broke into several pieces. The lights moved generally in a broad area from the northwest to the southeast at a high altitude and at great speed. The display was reported to have lasted approximately three minutes.

This object was determined to be the decay and re-entry of satellite 1959 Lambda. (Discover VIII)

THE LIGHTS MOVED GENERALLY IN A BROAD ARC FROM NORTHWEST TO SOUTHEAST. MISSILEMEN AT CAPE CANAVERAL SAID THE LIGHTS, THROUGH BINOCULARS, APPEARED TO BE FAST-MOVING BALLS OF A MOLTEN SUBSTANCE, PERHAPS METAL, FALLING APART.

A WINSTON-SALEM, N.C., MAN REPORTED SPOTTING A VERY BRIGHT LIGHT FOLLOWED CLOSELY BY TWO SMALLER LIGHTS AND ANOTHER SMALL LIGHT SOME DISTANCE BEHIND THAT.

AN AIR CONTROLLER AT THE RALEIGH-DURHAM, N.C., AIRPORT SAID THE LIGHTS WERE VISIBLE AT AN EXTREMELY HIGH ALTITUDE FOR ABOUT 2-1/2 MINUTES AND APPEARED TO BE MOVING IN A STEADY FORMATION.

"THEY WERE LIKE A FORMATION OF JETS WITH AFTERBURNERS ON," HE SAID. "THEY LEFT A VAPOR TRAIL SIMILAR TO THAT OF JET AIRCRAFT."

THE U.S. WEATHER BUREAU IN RALEIGH SAID IT ALSO RECEIVED A NUMBER OF CALLS DESCRIBING THE LIGHTS. "IT WASN'T A COMET," A SPOKESMAN SAID, "BECAUSE A COMET DOESN'T MOVE THAT FAST."



- 2110 - Recd call from Capt Billy DULA, Base Flight Services, X-51107, giving consolidated report of 18 UFO reports. Reports ranged from Cleveland, Ohio to Miami, Florida, and within the same time range, i.e. 0107 to 0115Z. Capt DULA will submit a full report.
- 2145 - Recd call from Major Sizemore, AF Comd Post, requesting confirmation of above report. Report confirmed to Major Sizemore.
- 2200 - Major Friend advised of above condition. His initial reaction was, "A meteor".
- 2230 - Due to public interest in UFO reports, Majors Nedbal and Sizemore (AF Command Post) called to establish a telecon between myself, Captain Beasley (NORAD) and themselves. After all facts were compared Major John Walker (AF PIO Duty Officer) was called in and a joint position was taken, i.e. "Initial indications, without detailed evidence or investigation, appear to be a meteor break-up". All requests for information will be referred to Major Walker, Washington, D.C., JE 4-2291. Telecon completed at 2305 hours.
