The object could also have been a slow moving a/c light, however there were no known a/c in the area at the time of the sighting. Therefore it is assumed to be a balloon.

No correlation of sighting with known air traffic at time, but civilian weather station at Truax Field states weather balloons are released daily at 1800 CST.
