Baltimore, Maryland

March 24: Baltimore, Md.—An odd UFO, like a double cylinder, was sighted about 9:00 p.m. by Charles Parmon, driver for the Huffburger Company. The sighting was investigated by a Baltimore detective who is also a NICAP member.

While driving east on Taylor Ave., Parmon chanced to look up and saw the bright orange UFO angling from left to right across the road ahead of him at low altitude. The UFO passed low over a 40-foot house about 250-300 feet away, and in comparison with the house appeared to be about 15 feet long.

The two closely-spaced cylindrical sections of the UFO were rounded on the front and blunt on the trailing end. As the perspective changed, Parmon could see a space between the two sections, but could not be sure whether the two were actually linked together. The UFO vanished behind landmarks and was not seen again.



SAUCER PHOTOGRAPHED IN WEST VIRGINIA: While visiting our friendly rival in Clarksburg, W. Va., recently, we came across a very interesting sighting right in his home town which the intrepid saucer investigator had overlooked. A local teen-ager named Joe Gonzales claims that, some time in the spring of 1960, the object pictured at the top of Page 14 flew over his home. He was alone one morning, watching T.V., when he heard a shrill noise, causing his dog to start barking. He went outside, and saw a strange craft moving slowly over a nearby hill. Returning quickly into the house, Gonzales grabbed his camera and took several pictures, the best of which is the one he gave to us. Gonzales describes the object as saucer-shaped, about 40 feet in diameter. It had a giant rudder-like protrusion underneath, with portholes in it, and

some sort of gas was escaping from this area. As seen in the photo, there were two large antennae on top. The boy lives in a thinly-populated section on the outskirts of Clarksburg. He says that one of his neighbors was asleep and the other was away; so there are no confirming witnesses; and though Gonzales seems very sincere, one is tempted to wonder if the picture may not be of some more common object such as a garbage lid with protrusions added.

FORTEAN ITEMS: A very large amount of unidentified material fell on vacant land at White Oak Flats, Tennessee, last November 27th. The stuff fell "all end-over-end" and broke branches on the trees when it hit. The farmer who

Bedford, Massachusetts

March 4 brought a report from Bedford, Massachusetts where a dark red spherical UFO was observed in the eastern sky at 9:15 P.M. by [REDACTED], [REDACTED] [REDACTED] Charles Hayden Planetarium in Boston. He and his wife watched the object for over 5 minutes near the Constellation Bootes. It pulsated from red to white to red and caused bright white streaks to appear and disappear in its immediate area.

9 March 1960  
Beverly, Massachusetts

On March 9 at Beverly Mr. and W. [REDACTED] and their daughter watched a large circular UFO at 7:15 P.M. The object maneuvered, divided in two and then sped away. The object, which first hovered, had star-like rays around it and appeared to be larger than the apparent diameter of the Moon. After the reddish object divided it moved northward across the eastern sky and rejoined into one object.

March 9, Beverly, Mass., 1960.  
Ellyn Evers and her daughter saw a large circular UFO about 7:15 p.m. which maneuvered, divided in two and then sped away. The object, which first hovered, had star-like rays around it and appeared to be larger than the apparent diameter of the moon. Then it began to drift eastward from its position in the south sky, suddenly changed to a red color and accelerated upward at an angle to the south. Still visible in the distance, the two then split into two red lights and moved away northward across the eastern sky, rejoining into one object. The sighting was investigated by members of NICAP who are forming a Subcommittee in the area.

Air Force officials at Hancock Field yesterday said an unidentified flying object, spotted near Chittenango Wednesday night, could have been the sun reflecting on the vapor trails of a twin-engine jet.

Frederick Mohr, 48, of Perryville road, Chittenango, said he saw two pinkish-orange lights apparently drifting in a clear, cloudless sky.

An amateur astronomer, Mohr used a 25-power telescope to follow the UFO. "What bothered me," he said, "was that I couldn't see what they were attached to even though it was clearly visible."

He said the lights were drifting one above the other in a northwesterly direction about four to six miles from his home. His wife, Ann, and son, Fred, 12, also saw them.

On March 14, 1960 at Wakefield, an object, round in appearance with 3 separate tail flames were reported traveling south west at 6:15 P.M. It passed over the car of Mr. [REDACTED] of Winchester. [REDACTED] of Medford was a passenger in the car and confirmed the sighting, and in addition said that the object looked like two saucers inverted one on top of the other with a rim around the middle of the object.
