The object was moving from approximately North to approximately South at a pretty fair rate of speed. [redacted] remarked that it was <sup>moving</sup> travelling mighty slow, which would be the impression at the height it must have ~~has~~ been traveling. The object did not seem to be falling, but was moving away from us at <sup>an</sup> angle that caused it to become smaller by slow degrees.

I stopped the car on the pavement to watch the show for a minute or two, realized that this was really something—[redacted] had said immediately that it must be the Sputnik we'd been reading about that was going to strike the atmosphere and burn itself out. But she remembered that this was to have been early that <sup>the</sup> morning and the first moment we saw this one, she looked at her watch and it showed 7:10 p.m. (*official sunset was 7:08*)

After a moment on the pavement with cars and trucks whizzing by in the other direction I pulled off the <sup>the black top</sup> ~~pavement~~ pavement, cut the motor and watched out the window where I had a fine view of this lit-up baby. I still think we watched it for 15 minutes, but [redacted] says not that long. Finally the object reached the elongated stretch of black cloud and disappeared behind it, ~~remained~~ the long way, and ~~perhaps~~ possibly for good, so I restarted the motor and we headed for the Lowe's lodge, several miles down the road.

As we turned into the parking area there the object reappeared beyond the cloud which had <sup>by</sup> then changed shape somewhat and thinned out. The object now was much farther away, getting smaller, and was turning a dark red instead of the almost white color it had been before, the change <sup>in color</sup> possibly caused by the atmosphere ~~in~~ in the vicinity of the cloud.

We stepped out of the car and watched it again for a minute before I went in the Inn and told ~~\_\_\_\_\_~~ what we were watching, thinking it to be the said Sputnik. ~~\_\_\_\_\_~~ thought he was being kidded and was a bit reluctant about coming out to look at it, but was finally persuaded to do so. We watched it together for several minutes before the object, getting smaller and redder as it moved away toward the south, again moved in behind a large cloud and we gave up on it, figuring that by the time it could emerge on the other side it would be so far away and dim through the sky mist that we'd be unable to see it any more.

I phoned my paper about it, ~~but~~ my ~~\_\_\_\_\_~~ editor, ~~\_\_\_\_\_~~ ~~thought somebody was kidding the teacher. He said it couldn't be a Sputnik because it travelled much faster than that and he could not have seen it so far away. He asked if I'd ever seen a comet. I had, from Halley's right on down. They had curved tails, mostly, that broadened <sup>out</sup> as they left the comet head and appeared wide and thin at the end. The tail on this object of ours was the same all the way back until it suddenly rounded off at the end. ~~\_\_\_\_\_~~ said several times later that the tail must have been a mile long, judging from the distance the object must have been from us in the sky. This I don't know, for I've still no idea how high, or how far away the thing was.~~

I know this--it was much <sup>9</sup>brighter --from head to tail-- than any moon either of us has ever seen on the brightest night; it travelled much faster, apparently, than the fastest jet plane high in the sky--and we see plenty of them in the Chattanooga area, since they seem to use the TVA lakes as their turning points on training trips,--and this ~~\_\_\_\_\_~~ baby was so apparently burning itself

out in the atmosphere that there could be little <sup>about</sup> about it.  
Nor about its size, its height, its apparently level flight, or  
its effort to get wherever it was going in a  
gosh-awful hurry.

To all of which **[REDACTED]**, a very serious minded gentleman indeed,  
agreed completely. "If you like I'll sign affidavits to all of  
it," he said.

Analysis and Conclusions: It is highly probable that these witnesses observed the vapor trail of a high flying aircraft, illuminated by sunlight. The reason the aircraft was still in sunlight ( after official sunset for the longitude and latitude ) was due to its altitude. An aircraft at 30,000' would have approximately 12 minutes more sunlight than a point on the ground corresponding to its position. The red appearance of the object just before it disappeared is probably due to sunset at the aircrafts altitude and the associated reddening of the sun due to increased scattering of the blue light by the atmosphere. This is an increased effect at sunset and sunrise due to the longer path through the denser portion of the atmosphere.

Dear Sir:

Attached are my thoughts on the burning object seen in the sky April 8, at 7:10 p.m. I knocked this off about two hours after seeing the object while the whole thing still was fresh in what I laughingly call my mind.

Mrs. [REDACTED] and [REDACTED], who owns and operates [REDACTED], out from Parksville, Tenn., agree with me almost completely on details, although Mrs. [REDACTED] doesn't believe we watched it as long as I thought we did. Anyway, from two minutes after sundown until almost full dark, the object was in view from Lake Ocoee, before it disappeared a second time behind a distant cloud.

The object was so large, so bright and so almost in our laps that I didn't bother about the whole thing very much, figuring that any number of others must have seen it also. But 7:10 p.m. is dinner and radio-TV time, and most folks must have been in their houses.

If you should have any confirmation of the whole thing, I'd appreciate it if you'd have someone let me know. And thanks for the patience of you and your men in listening to my tale. Honestly, no one else believes that we saw anything unusual at all.

~~Thursday, October 14, 1964~~

~~WHAT WOULD BE THE PROBABLY~~

From Tellico Plains we cut back through the foothills on Highway 30 to Lake Ocoee to spend the night with the ~~MAN~~ at LAKE Ocoee Inn, since there was work to be done the next morning early in the Ocoee Wildlife Management Area (Turkey Season opened there Thursday).

As we came out <sup>9</sup> of Highway 30 onto the lakeside highway from Ducktown ~~MAN~~ discovered what we both thought to be one of the Sputniks doing ~~an~~ a burn in the <sup>sky</sup> atmosphere somewhere between Ocoee Inn and Cleveland. ~~It was just a moment or so~~ It was just a moment or so after sunset, the sky in that immediate area clear, and it was evident that whatever the object was it was burning itself out in the atmosphere. The height could not be judged, but later--possibly 15 minutes or so, although ~~MAN~~ thinks less--it disappeared behind a long thin and black cloud formation, so it had to be higher than the clouds. It could have been 30 or 40 or 50 miles up. I'm no judge of such things, any more than you can look at the moon and say how high it is. (N-64)

The object was brilliant against the evening sky, possibly the size of the moon at its largest, but much brighter than any moon you have ever seen. Strung out behind it was a fiery tail the width of the diameter of the object. The tail held this width for its entire length--about 10 times the diameter of the object itself--then tapered out in a curved finish at the end. (See the sketch)
