GRODHAUS, Intelligence Officer, ENGLAND AFB, LA., received the initial report of sighting on 22 May 1960. It was Major GRODHAUS who received definite word from the ENGLAND AFB Weather Office that the object was a weather balloon which placed the object in the category of a known object rather than an UFO. He therefore did not make an initial UFO report in accordance with AFR 200-2. (Mr. GRANT AND Major GRODHAUS were contacted by telephone by the Preparing Officer.)

After preliminary analysis, it is the opinion of the Preparing Officer that the object was a weather balloon.
