On the evening of June 17, 1960 at approximately 8:40 a brilliant white object appeared in the sky. As far as I could reckon, it was about 50-60 degrees above the horizon at a direction of 250-260 degrees southeast.

It appeared only for about 2 to 3 seconds and in that time it moved very rapidly downward and to the left the brightness decreasing very rapidly.

I realize that this information may be of very little value, but I am a Engineering Physics major at the Univ. of Colo. and in one of my Astronomy courses I had the opportunity to observe many of the objects through a telescope. I have never witnessed any thing like this before. It was in my opinion, not a falling star, because from our front porch it appeared in size to be very large - about the size of "hula-hoop". (a common toy on the market for small children) Of course, I realize that the size of the object would depend upon its distance from an observer so this bit of inffomation is of very little value.


