At 1015 EST on 27 July 1960, CSgt Bolieu called Titiric AFS, W.Va. and talked to Captain Johnson, Duty Controller of the day. The objects observed over Oak Hill, W.Va. on 1 July 1960 was determined to be aircraft, and this was explained to the persons involved. A formal report was not submitted due to the objects falling within the provisions of par. 2B(2) AFR 200-2 dtd 11 Sep 59.

clouds moving. When I looked a little closer, I could see that they were not stars, but they were a little larger. They were spread out in a V-formation.

"They were moving pretty fast. They all moved at the same speed and stayed in the same formation until they were out of sight. We watched them until they moved out of sight."

Bill Napier of Whipple, who was at the Ellison home, also saw them and husband George got outside in time to witness the objects before they faded away.

George Ellison called the Tribune, and several employees went outside to look for "satellites." However, our attention was attracted to something different—probably a star. We thought, however, at first that the object was moving and had a green tinge to it.

After checking with Ellison again over the telephone we learned that it took approximately five minutes for the three "objects" to pass across the horizon. Ellison said they were brighter than stars.

About 7:04 p.m. a 72-foot Scout rocket had veered off its path high above the Atlantic Coast Friday night, two minutes after launching and was destroyed.

The Scout rocket attained an altitude of 860 miles and landed in the Atlantic 1,500 miles off the Virginia coast.

Earlier Friday at Cape Canaveral, Fla., the first operational prototype of the intercontinental range Titan missile veered sharply out of control and had to be destroyed about 300 feet above its launching pad. It is not known what time this occurred.

The Ellison's actually discovered these objects about 8:55 p.m. We intend to send this article to the Air Force for their records.

Only a few weeks ago Ivan Wilcox and his brother at Mullens spotted an extremely strange object in the sky. It was purple in appearance and was only seen for a few seconds. The same description was reported to proper authorities by a man a number of miles away in West Virginia. The Air Force investigated the sightings.

Anyway, all eyes were turned toward the skies Friday evening. Earlier the city of Oak Hill was shaken by a low-flying jet which zoomed overhead as Oak Hill residents were eating dinner.

The sky truly is a mystery. Those folks from Mars are going to come down here one of these days—you just wait and see.

# Mysterious Objects Seen In West Virginia's Skies

4 July 60

FAYETTE TRIBUNE, OAK HILL

What were the mysterious objects which passed over Oak Hill Friday night?

Shortly after 8:30 p.m. excitement was in the air at the George Ellison residence on Sunnyside Drive, Oak Hill. It was there that Mrs. Ellison, her children, Tim and Rose, and her nephew, Jimmy

Ellison, saw three unidentified objects passing across the sky.

Mrs. Ellison describes the happenings like this:

"The children saw them and called me, and I went to see about the situation. I thought at first they were stars and the
