

AFTER EXPLOSION A BLUISH GREEN TRAIL WAS OBSERVED IN AN ARC OF APPORXIMATELY TWENTY DEGREES WHICH LASTED APPROXIMATELY TWO SECONDS AND CHANGED INTO A WHITISH GREY THLXZR ICPXATED CLOUD ESTIMATED FIVE FEET LONG AND ONE FOOT HIGH WHEN HELD AT ARMS LENGTH. OBSERVATION OF THIS CLOUD WAS OBSERVED BEING DISAPATED BY THE WINDS ALOFT. THIS CLOUD LASTED FOR A PERIOD OF NINE MINUTES. POSITION OF THE FLASH AND CLOUD FORMATION WAS ESTIMATED

COMMENT: DUE TO AIRCRAFT COMMANDER'S ELEVEN THOUSAND FLYING HOURS AND HIS DEFINATE STATEMENTS; (1) THAT THIS OBJECT WAS NOT A METEOR SIGHTING AS HE HAD PREVIOUSLY OBSERVED METEORS, BUT RATHER LIKE THE SIZE AND APPEARANCE OF THE SOVIETS FIRST SPUTNIK WHICH HE HAD OBSERVED. IT IS BELIEVED POSSIBLE THIS SIGHTING COULD HAVE BEEN A MISSILE SIGHTING THAT WAS OFF COURSE FROM THE FRENCE MISSILE RANGE IN NORTH AFRICA. IF FURTHER INFORMATION IS DESIRED, THE CREW MEMBERS CAN BE CONTACTED AT 4TH MATS TRANSPORT PROVISIONAL SQUADRON, CHATTERAUX AIR STATION, FRANCE. THE CREW IS ON AN INDEFINITE TDY THERE FOR CONGO AIR LIFT.

Description cont;

Size of the flash was at least 2 feet in diameter at arms length. After explosion a bluish green trail was observed in an arc of about 20 deg which lasted about 2 seconds and changed into a whitish grey clout estimated 5 feet long and 1 foot high when held at arms length. The clout was observed being disipated by the wind. The cloud lasted for 9 minutes, the \*\*Xxxx\*\* object 4 seconds. The flash and cloud was estimated to be about 50 NM from observers position.

Analysis and Conclusions: The apparent size, shape and speed of the object rule out a missile such as reporting officer suggested. There was no satellites reentering at this time. The description of the object is very similar to that of a meteor as seen in the daylight hours. When a meteor enters the atmosphere in the daytime, the burning substance leaves a trail that that cannot be seen at night. The witnesses probably saw a type of meteor called a bolide enter the earths atmosphere and explode.
