11. COMMENTS It is possible that this object was a very slow meteor. However it is more probably a reentry of the 1960 Epsilon vehicle, parts of which reentered during Sep and Oct 1960. Epsilon had an inclination of 64°, therefore the heading would be about 26°. This object entered at an estimated 30°. Also the burning and color conform to a reentry as well as the duration of the sighting.

MILES AWAY AND GAVE A VERY SIMILAR REPORT, THIS MAN WAS A PILOT IN WWII. THIS MAN IS BELIEVED TO BE A RESIDENT OF VIDAUX HIS NAME IS [REDACTED]. AS PREVIOUSLY STATED IN THE REPORT A FULL LIST OF OBSERVERS IS BEING KEPT BY THIS OFFICER CONTAINING STATEMENTS WHERE POSSIBLE. THIS WILL BE AVAILABLE FOR FOLLOW UP INVESTIGATION IF DESIRED.

IT IS THE FEELING OF THIS OFFICE THAT THE SIGHTING WAS SOMETHING MORE THAN A METEOR. THIS IS BASED UPON THE WIDE SPAN OF OBSERVATION AND THE FIRM CONVICTION OF ALL OBSERVERS WHICH SHOULD BE CONSIDERED VERY RELIABLE. THAT THE OBJECT WAS NOT A METEOR. MYRON H.
