The following, extracted from Capt. J. J. Jenett's Duty Officer's Report dated 26 September 1960, is quoted for your information.

1. 1000 2 Comd Post (Pentagon) called to play back a recording made by a NORN report of the Canadian High Seas signaller of object that fell into the water. The ships position were 12-40N 120-40E and 120-30E. This tape will be held for one week so a copy may be obtained if any one in AFSCIN desires one. Maj. Conkey, AFSCIN-4A, was notified of this report.

I RECOMMEND THAT A THOROUGH SEARCH BE MADE OF ALL THE LAND AND SEA IN THIS IMMEDIATE AREA.
