10. BRIEF SUMMARY OF SIGHTING A/c like glider or "chicken hawk" hovered in area. Painted orange or dark brown or black bottom. No sound. Left 2-3 mi radius of fine fibre-like material dropped in 5 drops at 10-21,000 ft. Took 45 min for material to fall. Plane had insignia not readable with binoculars. Plane departed after drops with tremendous speed. No sound. Phone call to one witness revealed wings like U-2, and established altitude at 15-18,000 ft. Substance covered large area. Sample sent to ATIC for analysis.

SUBJECT: Letter from Dr. DeLoach Report

16 NOV 1960

TO: (FBI - All FBI Offices)

The following, extracted from Dr. [redacted] report dated 11 Nov 1960,
is passed for your information:

1730 called by Mr. [redacted] (DeLoach said) spokesman of
Civil Defense Organization, Kentucky. He informed he would
use 1500 scuba divers at 17,000 ft (near Lake Erie) to search
bed rocks closely resembling a gusher, located in that area.
The gathered orange with black, or rock bottom debris situated
underwater. No scuba divers found any debris. A 2-3 mile
winding flow of fine fiber (which is later identified
as asbestos) was collecting atop fibers - a fine cloud was
seen by many people. The discharge led to disaster, but even with
1500 divers was not clear due to its thickness of approx.
10 to 15,000 ft. The place where it finally deposited did
so with excessive speed with no sound. All witnesses
agreed to (the place) resembled a "volcano mouth".
