

<p>On the evening of 1 Nov 60, the time of reported sighting, a new cylinder they was unannouncing the opening in Mandeville, Louisiana about four and a half miles from the sighting area. To ballyhoo the opening, the searchlight had a powerful searchlight battery over the city during the evening hours. Several persons have reported seeing the searchlight reflections on the same evening. The reporting officer now believes that these searchlight reflections account for the reported sighting. This evaluation is based on the fact that the searchlights were turned on approximately at the same time as the sightings, and several Air Force Personnel have reported seeing such lights on that evening and at first mistake mistaken these lights for unidentified objects.</p>
