About 3" in diameter at arm's length. Glowed red, occasionally flashing bluish-green. Two still; one moving E-W/no planned formation. Sighted approx 45° above horizon. 2 still objects disappeared after about 20 min in same position. Third moved in a straight line to W to a position directly overhead then went behind light cloud and disappeared--was visible about 3 min.
11. COMMENTS Witness probably saw a combination of things which added up to his sighting. 2 stationary objects were probably stars and moving object an a/c. There were 3 bright stars in the E. Betelgeux, Rigel, and Aldebaran. It is believed 2 still objects were Betelgeux Alpha Orion and Rigel Beta Orion. Third object viewed by witness was possibly an a/c. A cloud coming between witness and stars could account for the disappearance.

Shortly after 0200Z, 28 Nov 60, one [REDACTED] who was visiting at the home of Mr. [REDACTED] in Great Barrington, Mass., sighted an Unidentified Flying Object. He telephoned Mr. [REDACTED] Director of Civil Defense for Great Barrington, who verified the sighting and then called Mr. [REDACTED] a Civil Defense official in Pittsfield, Massachusetts. Mr. [REDACTED] in turn, notified Mr. [REDACTED], Director of Civil Defense for Massachusetts [REDACTED] in Springfield. The information reached Westover at approximately 0245Z.

- a. (1) The objects were round but jagged as a pinwheel at rest.
 (2) Compared with an object at arm's length, the objects were about three inches in diameter.
 (3) The objects glowed Red, occasionally flashing Bluish-Green.
 (4) Three objects altogether: Two at rest and one moving.
 (5) No planned formation was discernable. The two still objects were in random positions; the third moved from East to West.

 (9) a. The moving object did not glow as brightly as the other two.
 b. The observer noted that the objects did not interfere with his television reception the way aircraft usually did.
 b. (1) The observer was first attracted by a telephone call from one "Bucky" Woodard, who had seen the objects while visiting at the home of one Horace Martin in the area.
 (2) All objects were first seen approximately 45° above the horizon and to the East.
 (3) The two still objects disappeared in the same position as first observed: the third moved in a westerly direction to a position directly overhead.
 (4) The moving object described a straight line.
 (5) After moving to an overhead position, the moving object went behind a light cloud and disappeared ("blinked out").
 (6) The moving object was visible for about three minutes; the other two disappeared after about twenty minutes.
 c. (1) The objects were viewed visually from the ground.

Analysis and Conclusions: It is probable that the witness saw a combination of things which led him to his sighting. The two separate objects were probably stars with the man-made aircraft and balloons. These were these stars (Begout) in the East, Begouen, Rich and Huggins, however it is believed that the witness did see the two separate Begouen or Begout and Rich & O'Brien. This was definitely caused by the witness not seeing all in perfect alignment. A causal connection between the witness and the aircraft could account for the phenomenon.
