SUBJECT: Report Of UFO Observed 1740Z Near Stuttgart, Germany

1. The following is the report of an UFO submitted to the 17AF
Air Liaison Officer, Hq 7th Army, Stuttgart, Germany, 1430Z 6 Jan 61.

Shape of top unit was rectangular and reflected a bright orange yellow color similar to a rocket exhaust that was coming from a round shaped object beneath it far enough to plainly discern the separation. Faint high pitched whistle heard before object reached the Zenith and then died out after passage. Size not known as estimate of altitude for comparison not available. It was much larger than stars seen during passage. Cloud cover was such that objects would have been less than 12000' high at time of observation. Course was South West to North East. Wife first observed object and called attention of reporter to the object. Zenith was reached about 60° South East of observer. Objects moved in a straight flight path. Top rectangle constantly moved through a 90° flat trajectory back and forth. After objects reached 45° past Zenith toward North East, bright orange flames seemed to explode from the fire ball causing the rectangular object to catch fire starting at tips working inwards toward center. Fire was more red than fire ball flames. As the burning progressed the ball and rectangle started to separate rapidly. The ball disappeared from view going lower at about 30° above the horizon while the rectangle was still visible burning and breaking into many flaming pieces. Estimate that the whole sighting took place within three minutes.

Object was observed from the ground unaided by optical aids. Time of observation 1740-1743Z. Sky condition at 1800Z was 2000' scattered 12000 overcast. (As reported at nearby Echterdingen Airfield) Sighting was apparently beneath clouds as object did not disappear and reappear through breaks observed where stars could be seen. Location of sighting was Singelfingen, S.W. of Stuttgart, Germany, 48° 42' 20" North 9° 00' 00" East by SP4 Wilfred K. Schuelke, RA55627271, Hq Sp Troops, Provost Marshal Office, Bldg 6, Patch Barracks. Tele: Patch Mil: 6179.
