10. BRIEF SUMMARY OF SIGHTING Eight objects, round in "V" formation. Sighted almost directly overhead. Second observer saw only one light object and was unsure that it was anything except a star. No air traffic reported from local tower. Objects moved from SE to NW, disappearing in about 30 seconds.		11. COMMENTS No distance moved included and it is assumed that disappearance was overhead also. The constellation Bootes was directly overhead at the time of the sighting, and has several bright stars forming a triangle, including the 1st magnitude star Arcturus. It is believed that the witness was looking at the constellation Bootes and that clouds moving across the sky gave the illusion of movement to the objects.

K. INSTRUCTOR, AIRCRAFT MAINTENACE OFFICER COURSE. INTERVIEWS  
WITH OBSERVERS ONE AND TWO REVEALED THAT OBSERVER ONE FIRST  
SIGHTED THE UFO AND POINTED IT OUT TO OBSERVER TWO. OBSERVER ONE  
STATES THAT THE OBJECTS WERE IN V FORMATION MOVING FROM SE TO  
NW AND DISAPPEARED IN APPROXIMATELY THIRTY SECONDS. OBSERVER TWO  
THOUGHT AT FIRST THE OBJECT WAS A STAR BUT APPARENTLY WAS
