10. BRIEF SUMMARY OF SIGHTING See case file. Seven sightings in Columbus area rptd to Fort Benning. Include objs identified as balloons, a/c in area, & picked up on radar, various lights, some stationary others moving & in all portions of sky. Rpts fm a/c, ground radar, & fm civilians phoning to the base.		11. COMMENTS Objs picked up on Radar identified as a/c. One of the rpts identified as a balloon. Of the stationary objs or lights the most prominent one rptd was in the position of Jupiter. Jupiter rose at 2155 local & at 0255 local was at 45dgr elev 150dgr azimuth. This body was responsible for the light rpts in the SE quadrant & the early rpts of an obj to the East. Altair, Arcturus & Pollux also may have contributed. WX not received, however it is likely that an inversion existed due to the many rpts.

15.	0310		<p>The following report received from LAAO Lamer.</p> <p>UFO report 2125 eastern standard time, Pilot observer reported bright light at an unknown altitude, estimated to be 1000 to 10,000 feet. First sighted three miles SE of Lamer. Range estimated 15 to 20 miles. Aircraft at 9000 feet, estimated UFO bearing 89°. Another bearing Huesega county Airport at 4500 feet indicated at 100 degrees the aircraft lost sight of light passing toward Lamer. Light is compared to that of aircraft landing light. A high intensity light, with a yellowish color gradually changing to a reddish orange. 0123 HLT Columbus reported two aircraft southbound through a restricted area. Ejector burstwart was made; aircraft extinguished navigation lights. 0130 received a call from Lee Hensel, 2425 Sunnack Drive, Columbus. He observed three objects passing over his house. He did not hear any noise and believed them to be gliders. Hensel saw one go down estimated three miles from house. 0130 Columbus advised one object stationary South over LAAO. 0210 three UFO's sighted, (1) SW, (1) N and (1) NE of Lamer. [redacted] said the light previously observed, was too large to be an aircraft beacon or landing lights. These objects are on a set frequency and are thought to be weather balloons.
