

Reference your letter concerning bunches of foil found in nearby fields.

These pieces of foil are known as "chaff." Dropped from aircraft in bundles, they quickly separate and each piece of chaff gives a radar return resembling an aircraft. These radar returns clutter the monitoring radar scopes masking the movement of the aircraft. They are extremely effective as they fall slowly and permit the aircraft to pass undetected. Chaff are dropped by USAF aircraft on practice missions.
