1. We are reviewing sightings of unidentified flying objects for 1963 and have arrived at no definite conclusion for your sighting of 2 January 1963.
2. Would you please complete the attached form and return it in the envelope provided. Particular attention should be given to movement of the object. The main discrepancy in the report concerns the movement of the object over the horizon. The weather report indicated a ceiling of zero, visibility 5/8 of a mile, with fog and a light drizzle. The time of the weather report was 1200Z and your sighting about one hour later. Your comments as to visibility at the time of the sighting would be appreciated.

- A. DESCRIPTION OF OBJECT: A BRIGHT LIGHT, ^{SIZE} INCREASING IN ~~SIZE~~ FROM THAT OF A LANDING LIGHT TO THAT OF AN AUTOMOBILE HEADLAMP HELD AT ARMS LENGTH. CHANGED COLOR FROM ORANGE TO RED AS IT GREW MORE BRILLIANT. ONLY ONE OF OBJECT NOTED. THERE WERE NO TRAIL AND SOUND. ESTIMATED DISTANCE FROM OBSERVER: ABOUT TWO MILES.
- B. DESCRIPTION OF COURSE: APPEARED IN THE SOUTHWEST AT ABOUT TWENTY DEGREES ALTITUDE GREW MORE BRILLIANT AND DISAPPEARED TO THE EAST OVER THE HORIZON. TIME NOTED: ABOUT TWO TO THREE SECONDS.

H. REMARKS: LIEUTENANT LAMBERT, ^{AT} ~~ATE~~ THE SITE, RECALLED SEEING A SIMILAR PHENOMEMOM ABOUT ONE YEAR AGO, BUT DID NOT REPORT IT AT THE TIME. AIRMAN NEWMAN SAID HE THOUGHT ITSMIGHT BE A BURNING AIRPLANE, WHICH WAS WHY HE HAD REPORTED IT, BUT NONE SUCH HAS BEEN REPORTED. THE ONLY POSSIBLE EXPLANATION THAT THE UNDERSIGNED CAN THINK OF IS THAT IT WAS THE REFLECTION OF A COLORED SEARCHLIGHT OFF THE FOG. LIEUTENANT LAMBERT'S SIGHTING WAS MADE IN NOVEMBER 1961 ON A CLEAR MORNING, ABOUT DAWN, HOWEVER.
