MEMORANDUM FOR THE RECORD

UFO Sighting Ravenna, Ohio 2 January 1963

On 4 January 1963 FTD received a phone call (300) from Mr. 100 of Akron, Ohio. Mr. 100 reported that on Wednesday, 2 January 1963, Mr. 100 of Ravenna, Ohio observed an unidentified flying object.

The object was in view for 20 to 25 minutes, and the time of the sighting was 6:00 PM. The object was motionless, had dull yellow lights, faded on and off, and was surrounded by a ring of light. The object moved slowly to the southeast and was fairly close.

The object, observed in the west, was about star size, fuzzy, round, and remained stationary for ten minutes. The flight was not steady. The object faded out three times remaining out for 30 seconds the first two times. The third time it faded, it did not reappear (it was high). The object changed color to red each of the first two times it faded out; on the third fading, it changed to white.

At 2045 Mr. called to report the following:

While out hunting he noticed small strips of tin foil scattered over a wide area of farm land. He was curious at the time, but did not collect any samples of the material. He became more curious and concerned when he read that British bombers had penetrated our air defenses, and thought that perhaps the foil strips were some type of British radar jamming material. He contacted the CAP who suggested that he collect some samples and notify FTD.
