5. One (1) object was reported. There was no noise, although the estimated speed was from seven hundred (700) to eight hundred (800) miles per hour.

6. Time of sighting was from 2130 hours to 2200 hours on the sixteenth (16), seventeenth (17), and twenty-first (21) of June 1952. Object was observed for a period of thirty (30) minutes while it "liss" around in one area and then departed to the East.

"There was no color other than a sort of yellow-white - no mixture of color."

"There was only one (1) at a time - if there was more than one you couldn't see them. There was nothing protruding - it looked just like the two arms - like this." (Informant stretched arms out from shoulders - palms up.) "No trail or exhaust streaks were visible."

"Judging from the speed of jets - I would say it traveled faster than a jet - but occasionally when it would make one of these dips it would drop fast. It dropped right straight down - towards those trees - I would think it was going to go to the earth. Most of the time it resembled a butterfly in flight except when it dropped down. When on the level I would say its speed was around 700 - 800 miles an hour. I was out there on the sun porch - it just simply took right out here and kept going in that direction." (Mr. [redacted] pointed to the trees on the horizon - then straight East.)

- (2) "It was probably between 9:30 and 10:00 - about the same length of time - about a half-hour or so each time. Tuesday it reappeared about the same time but it was visible only for a short time - still North of the Hospital."

When asked how far he believed the object to be from Denver he stated: "Over the city limits - it looked like it might be directly over those trees - about a mile from here."

I am a patient at the National Jewish Hospital, 3800 E. Colfax Ave., On Monday & Tuesday nights, June 16-17 and again last night 6-21, I saw the so called "Flying Saucers" between 9.30 P.M. & 10.00 P.M., North of the Hosp. There may have been more but only one was visible at a time. They resembled the front portion and wings of a toy model plane all lighted up, the after part not visible. It traveled at a high rate of speed between 700 - 800 miles per hour. And, except for its speed, the gyrations were like that of a butterfly, very irregular. However it remained in the same area. It would continually disappear and reappear. They appeared rather close and rather low. When it left it shot straight away in an easterly direction.

This was witnessed by several other patients. [redacted], [redacted] i, [redacted], and our charge nurse, Miss [redacted] I pass this on to you for what ever interest it may have.



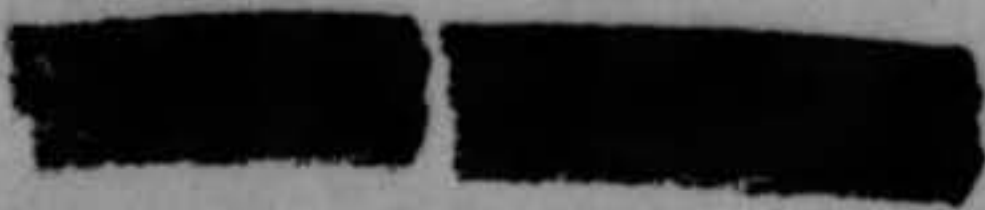

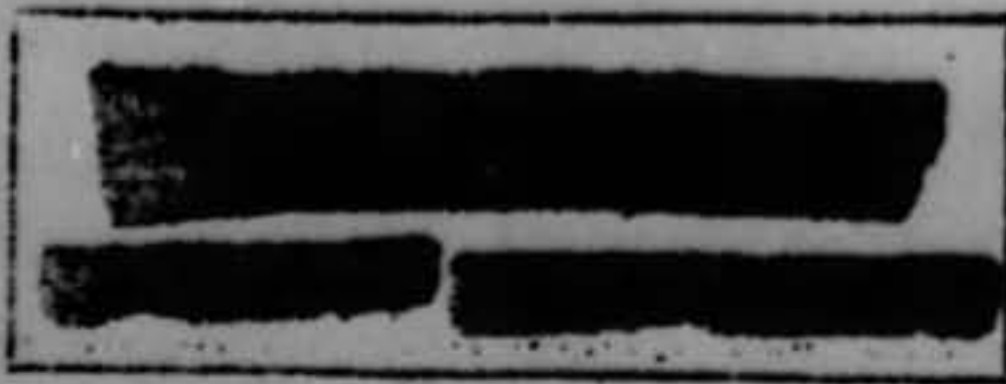

On 16 June 1952, at 2030 hours, I started from the barracks, #590 to the latrine, T-503. About half way between the two buildings, I noticed a moving object to the southeast which I thought was the shadow of a B-29 or B-50 coming in to land. I stopped to watch the object and as it drew closer, I could see that it was not an conventional aircraft. There was no engine sound whatsoever. Either recipricating or jet.

As the objects passed overhead, traveling in a northwest direction, I could make out between five (5) and seven (7) round objects. They were in a half-moon formation. Color d silverish gray. They were the approximate size of a dime held at arms length. Speed approximately 500 to 600 MPH. Height approximately 5000'.

As they went overhead, the object on the right side, broke formation and veared off to the right at approximately 10 degrees.

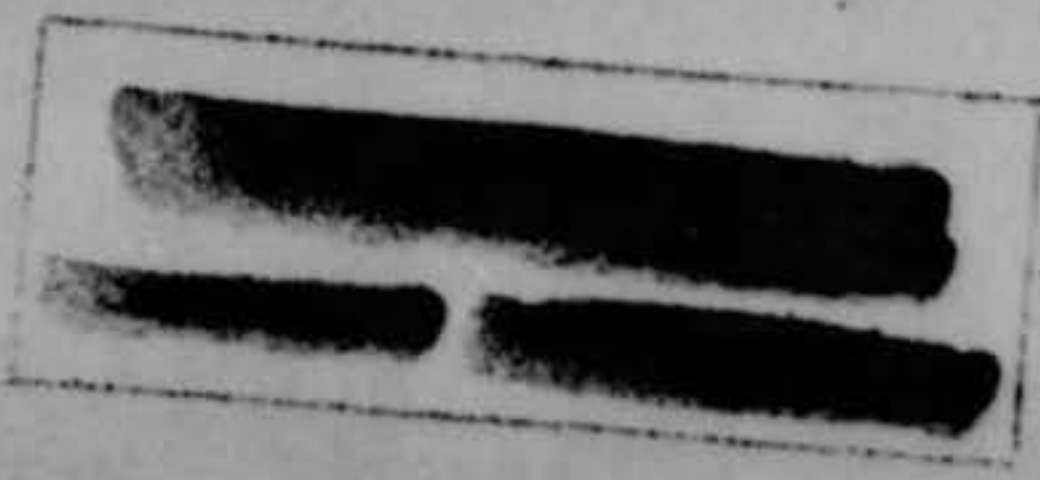
The weather that night was fairly calm and very clear. There was no engines running on the flight line at this time.

1. At first the objects appeared to be the outline of an aircraft with the size of the airframe approximating that of a medium bomber. However, after a second, the outline seperated and became five or six separate objects. Due to the extreme rate of speed, the exact number of objects could not be determined. The objects were first sighted at a point several miles south of Walker AFB and continued in a straight Northerly line of flight and disappeared from sight several miles north of the base. The objects were at an estimated 5,000 ft. altitude and traveling at an estimated rate of 500 to 600 miles per hour. In the moonlight, the object had a grayish hue and appeared to the observer as a disc about the size of a dime while under observation. They presented only a flat view to the observer during the line of flight. The objects traveled in a half moon formation with the outer curve facing the line of flight. While the objects were passing over Walker AFB, the most easterly Object veered even more sharply to the east at about a 10 degree angle until the formation disappeared from sight. Neither the exact size of the objects or their spacing while in flight could be determined accurately. While in flight, all the objects appeared to be on the same plane of level. No sound or type of propulsion could be detected. At all times the objects appeared to be flat and no other characteristics could be determined.

2. The object was first sighted at 2030 hours MST 16 June 1952 and remained under observation for less than a minute.

3. The object was observed visually by Sgt [redacted] from the ground. He had no type of lenses or glasses for aid.

4. The observer was standing on the flight line at Walker AFB, New Mexico. The objects were first sighted about 1 mile south of the base at a 5,000 ft. altitude.

5. S/Sgt [redacted] is considered to be a reliable and intelligent individual by his Squadron Commander and immediate supervisors. Sgt [redacted] has seven years service in the USAF and is a B-29 Maintenance Specialist. He was also an aircraft maintenance specialist in civilian life.

6. A check of the weather station at Walker AFB and Roswell Municipal Airport reveals the following teletype sequences at 2030 hours MST:


7. There was no known meteorological or other phenomena which might account for the sighting. A check of Walker AFB radar revealed nothing unusual on the scope at the time of sighting. It is unknown whether the set was on the 25 or the 50 mile scan.

8. There is no physical evidence of the sighting such as photographs.

9. Interception or identification action by the observer was not feasible at the time.

10. There was no known air traffic in the general area at the time of sighting.

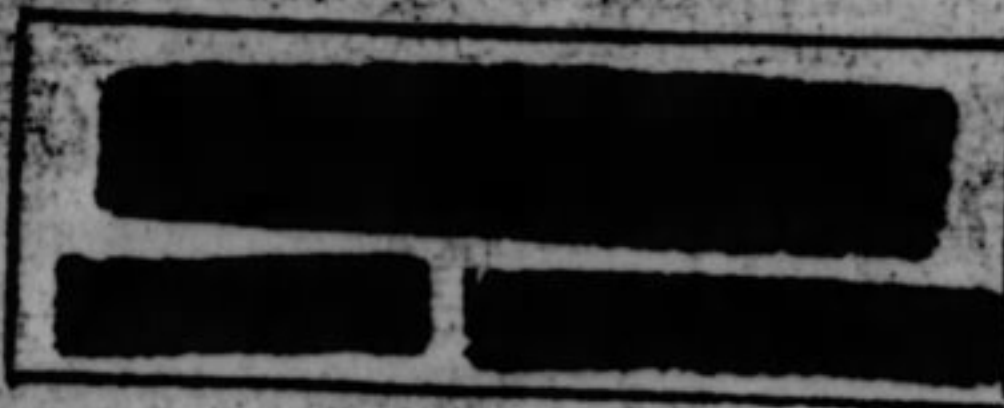



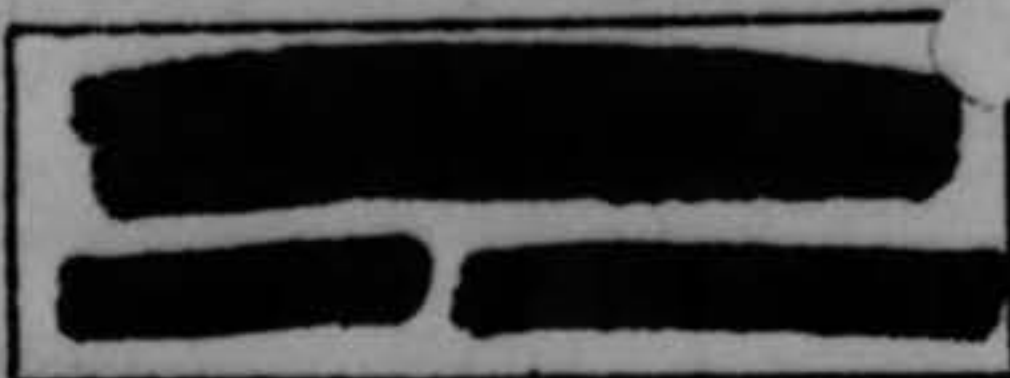

A group of unidentified aerial objects was sighted at 2030 hours MST on 16 Jun 52 about 1 mile south of Walker AFB, Roswell, New Mexico. The objects were of a grayish hue in color and their estimated altitude above the terrain was about 5,000 feet. The objects traveled in a half moon formation in a general Southwest to Northwest line from a point about 2 miles south of Walker AFB until they disappeared from sight several miles north of the base. The rate of speed was estimated to be between 500 and 600 miles per hour.

This sighting is similar to those reported in the press and other publications. Although the objects were viewed for only a short period of time, the reliability to the observer is felt to warrant the probability of the sighting.

4. The observer was standing on the flight line at Walker AFB, New Mexico. The objects were first sighted about 1 mile south of the base at a 5,000 ft. altitude.

7. There was no known meteorological or other phenomenon which might account for the sighting. A check of Walker AFB radar revealed nothing unusual on the scope at the time of sighting. It is unknown whether the set was on the 25 or the 50 mile scan.

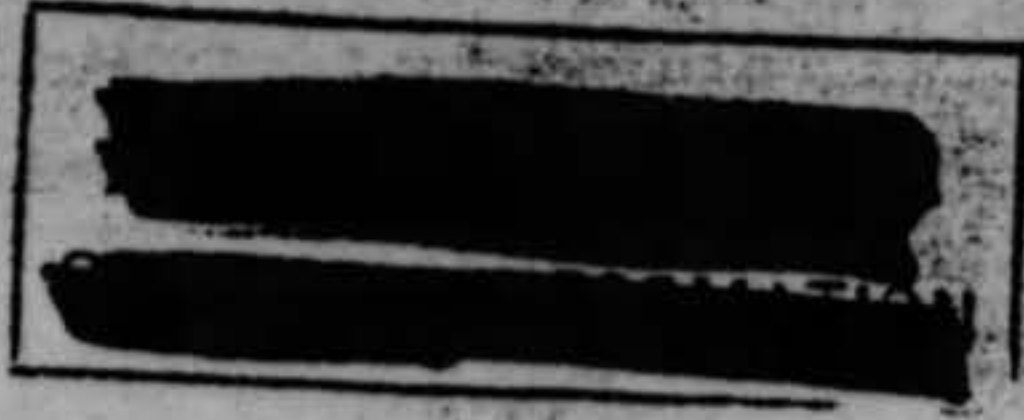

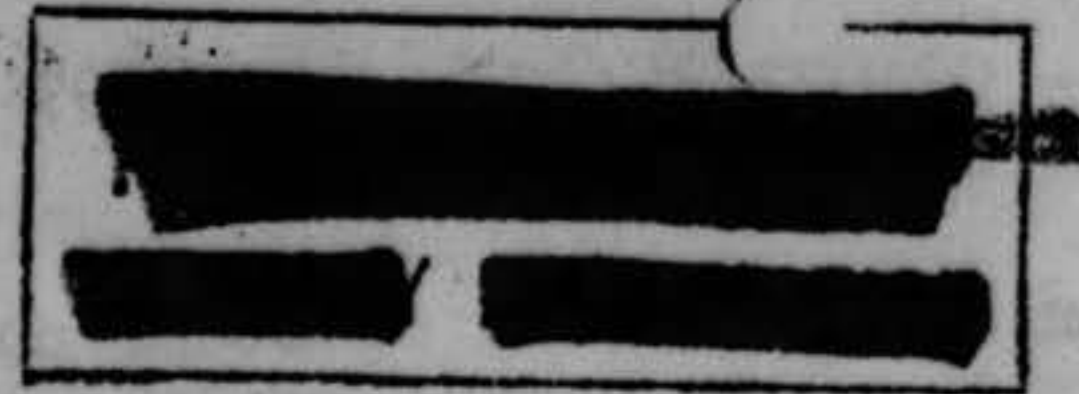

1. At first the objects appeared to be the outline of an aircraft with the size of the airframe approximating that of a medium bomber. However, after a second, the outline separated and became five or six separate objects. Due to the extreme rate of speed, the exact number of objects could not be determined. The objects were first sighted at a point several miles south of Walker AFB and continued in a straight northerly line of flight and disappeared from sight several miles north of the base. The objects were at an estimated 5,000 ft. altitude and traveling at an estimated rate of 500 to 600 miles per hour. In the moonlight, the object had a grayish hue and appeared to the observer as a disc about the size of a dime while under observation. They presented only a flat view to the observer during the line of flight. The objects traveled in a half moon formation with the outer curve facing the line of flight. While the objects were passing over Walker AFB, the most easterly object veered even more sharply to the east at about a 10 degree angle until the formation disappeared from sight. Neither the exact size of the objects or their spacing while in flight could be determined accurately. While in flight, all the objects appeared to be on the same plane of level. No sound or type of propulsion could be detected. At all times the objects appeared to be flat and no other characteristics could be determined.

2. The object was first sighted at 2030 hours MST 16 June 1952 and remained under observation for less than a minute.

3. The object was observed visually by Sgt. [redacted] from the ground. / He had no type of lenses or glasses for aid.


I am positive that it was not an airplane and almost as sure it was not a weather balloon because I was on the wrong side to see reflection from the sun.

4. The size of the object was an estimated seven (7) to eight (8) feet in diameter and two (2) to three (3) feet in depth. Its color was reported to be yellowish-white.

5. One (1) object was reported. There was no noise, although the estimated speed was from seven hundred (700) to eight hundred (800) miles per hour.

1. In compliance with Paragraph 7d, AF Letter 200-5, dated 29 April 1952, the following information is submitted:

(a) Mr. [REDACTED], a patient at the National Jewish Hospital, [REDACTED] Denver, Colorado, was interviewed 27 June 1952. Mr. [REDACTED] home is in Philadelphia, Pennsylvania.

(1) "The object appeared between 9:30 and 10:00 o'clock each night - the 16th June, 17th June and 21st June. It is difficult to say what shape it was - it was moving so fast - but I would describe it like this - and it looked like a little hat on it." (Mr. [REDACTED] stretched out his arms - straight from the shoulders and turned his palms up - see sketch - Inclosure #2.)

"I would say it was very large. It was not a far distance - it appeared very close." (Mr. [REDACTED] pointed to a row of trees - about a mile away - and said it appeared right over the top of these trees.) He further stated: "It would be difficult to gauge even approximately the distance." (From the description of the informant - the altitude is estimated at about 600 feet.) "I would say it was about eight (8) or nine (9) feet across it and two (2) or three (3) feet high. It was awfully big."
