NARRATIVE SUMMARY: On Wednesday, October 13, 1948 [REDACTED] was called by Miss [REDACTED] to observe an unidentified flying object. Mr [REDACTED] observed a spinning or flashing object which seemed to be moving at a high rate of speed from northwest to southeast and holding a steady course. It appeared either silver or chrome in color. Observer was unable to determine what the object was, its size, height, or rate of speed.

Synopsis
Investigation requested by Colonel W. R. CLINGERMAN, Acting Chief, Intelligence, Hq, Air Materiel Command, Wright-Patterson AFB. On or about noontime, 13 October 1948, a clear day, Miss [redacted] Secretary, and [redacted] chief clerk, Engineering, of the Studebaker Corporation, South Bend, Indiana, reported to [redacted] Executive Engineer, Body Engineering Department of Studebaker that on or about 11:40 a.m., they had viewed a flying anomaly, flying over the city of South Bend. [redacted] First saw an unknown type of plane fade from view after which her eye noted a spinning, flashing, silver, flat object without fins or protrusions, traveling at great speed, on a direct course, and at a height of 1500 feet. [redacted] called [redacted] to view the object and he confirmed her impression. The object was in view eight to ten seconds. A responsible executive of the Studebaker Corporation vouchsafed for the high calibre and reliability of [redacted] and [redacted] who collaborated to answer questions listed in Essential Elements of Information regarding "Sightings of Unidentified Aerial Objects, Project: "Sign", wherein they reiterate their initial observations of the anomaly. Investigation into the backgrounds of [redacted] and [redacted] revealed them to be individuals of good repute. Weather data was obtained from the South Bend station of the U.S. Department of Commerce, Weather Bureau, who rated 13 October 1948, as to average cloudiness, with 4, on a scale of zero to ten. No object such as described reached the earth at or near South Bend. No commercial aircraft were scheduled over South Bend at time anomaly viewed.

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DETAILS:

This investigation was requested by Col W. R. CLINGERMAN, Acting Chief, Intelligence, HQ, Air Materiel Command, Wright-Patterson Air Force Base, Dayton, Ohio, who by a letter dated 22 October, subject: "Project 'Sign'", informed this office that an aerial anomaly had been reported from South Bend, Indiana. Said letter contained as an inclosure a list of questions to be utilized, entitled, "Elements of Essential Information".

AT SOUTH BEND, INDIANA

1. On 25 November 1948, Mr. [REDACTED], S., South Bend, Indiana, and Executive Engineer for Body Engineering, Studebaker Corporation, South Bend, Indiana, stated that upon his return from lunch 13 October 1948, Miss [REDACTED] told him about seeing an aerial anomaly from her office window. Mr. [REDACTED] Chief Clerk, Engineering Department, Studebaker Corporation, South Bend, Indiana, also saw the aerial anomaly after his attention was called to it by Miss [REDACTED] according to Mr. [REDACTED]. Mr. [REDACTED] immediately questioned both persons having noted this phenomenon, separately, endeavoring to get a clear picture of just what had been seen. Mr. [REDACTED] himself did not actually see this apparation. Mr. [REDACTED] is a former Captain in the United States Army Air Force and was Projects Officer in the Production Division of Wright Engines while stationed at Wright Field. During the early days of the war, Mr. [REDACTED] was Chief Engineer of the Air Aviation Division of the Studebaker Corporation, South Bend, Indiana.

2. On 29 November 1948, the writer interviewed Mr. [REDACTED], Vice President in charge of Engineering of the Studebaker Corporation, South Bend, Indiana, who stated that he had heard about the aerial anomaly, but did not observe its flight. However, Mr. [REDACTED] stated that in his opinion, the veracity of Miss [REDACTED] and Mr. [REDACTED] was unquestionable.

3. On 1 December 1948, reporting Agent interviewed Miss [REDACTED], Secretary to Mr. [REDACTED], Vice President in charge of Engineering, Studebaker Corporation, South Bend, Indiana. Miss [REDACTED] stated that at approximately 1145 hours on 13 October 1948, while looking out the office window facing north, she noticed a very dark colored plane flying directly north, but it was so distant she could not determine what type of plane it was, other than the fact that it was not a transport plane, inasmuch as they see transports frequently, which she described as silver in color, traveling East and West, or Southeast and Northwest, while within the scope of vision of her window. As Miss [REDACTED] watched the described plane fade from view, another object caught her attention. At first she believed it to be a piece of paper being blown along by the wind. However, after observing it more closely, she noted that it was much higher than would be possible for a piece of paper to normally be floating. The object was traveling at what seemed to be a very high rate of speed, and it was impossible for her to determine the altitude at which it was moving. The object was silver in color, and seemed to be turning or spinning so that the sun reflected from the object. As the object was traveling very rapidly, and, at what seemed a very high altitude, it was not possible to determine its shape. She was certain however, it was not an airplane. It, also, did not appear to be smooth-surfaced object because of the flashing of the sun's rays against it. The object was traveling a direct course from Northwest to Southeast, and was within her scope of vision for perhaps 15 to 20 seconds.

NOTE: A test was conducted by Mr. [REDACTED] and the writer to ascertain the accuracy of Miss [REDACTED] conception of seconds. This test was repeated three times, and each time it was noted that her conception of time (which she had estimated as 15 seconds) varied from 8 seconds to 10 seconds.

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4. On 1 December 1948, Mr. [REDACTED] Chief Clerk, Engineering Department, Studebaker Corporation, South Bend 27, Indiana, stated he and Miss [REDACTED] occupy the same office, and that on Wednesday, 13 October 1948, at approximately 1145 hours, Miss [REDACTED] called Mr. [REDACTED] to the office window facing North. He stated that he observed going across the sky at what seemed to be a high rate of speed, a spinning or flashing object of either silver or chrome appearance. This object seemed to be holding a steady course from Northwest to Southeast. Mr. [REDACTED] was unable to determine what this object could be, or its size, altitude or rate of speed, but it did occur to Mr. [REDACTED] that it might be one of the flying discs of which he heard so much.

5. Mr. [REDACTED], Assistant Vice President, Engineering Department, Studebaker Corporation, South Bend, Indiana, stated that he did not see the aerial anomaly, but heard about it, and since he had passed it off as a joke, he did not pay any more attention to it. He stated however, that Miss [REDACTED] and Mr. [REDACTED] were of the high type caliber employees, and were, in his opinion, two persons that could be regarded as reliable.

6. In an attempt to gain more information, the following additional checks were made in an interview with Miss [REDACTED] and Mr. [REDACTED]

a. They were not sure the object was rotating, but gained that impression because of the flashing of the sun from its surface.

b. They were not sure of the object's altitude, but felt that it was not traveling over 1500 feet.

c. The object was traveling at very high speed, estimated approximately three times the speed of a transport. (Inasmuch as transports frequently fly over the city and can be readily seen from Miss [REDACTED] window, she was able to make this comparison.)

d. There was no vapor trail and no noise that could be heard from the object.

e. Neither Miss [REDACTED] nor Mr. [REDACTED] would attempt to estimate the distance away, nor the actual altitude that the object might have been, nor did they notice any fins, semblance of wings, or similar protusions.

f. The writer asked if it might have been an escaped weather balloon, and they were both positive that it was not spherical, and that it was not an airplane.

g. Miss [REDACTED] estimate of its size was that it was not as large as a DC-3, probably larger than a Piper Cub.

7. Both Miss [REDACTED] and Mr. [REDACTED] are considered a high type of person by their employers, and hold important positions with the [REDACTED] Corporation of South Bend, Indiana. They have no criminal records, and no derogatory information could be learned concerning them in South Bend or Mishawaka, Indiana.

NOTE: The writer check with Mr. [REDACTED] Chief, Weather Bureau, South Bend, Indiana. In company with Mr. [REDACTED], the reporting agent contacted the Civil Aeronautics Administrative Air Port tower, St. Joseph County, St. Joseph Air Port, South Bend, Indiana, and learned there were no unusual circumstances, 13 Oct 48. This determined by checking the log."

1. Reference is made to letter from your headquarters, MCIAXS, dated 9 March 1949, subject "Unidentified Flying Objects," and first indorsement thereto by this headquarters, dated 31 March 1949.

2. The incident summaries 173 through 233 have been checked against routine weather-balloon ascents made by the Air Force, Navy and Weather Bureau. Comments based on this review are inclosed.

3. It is recommended that the "Guide To Investigation Of Unidentified Aerial Objects" be changed as follows: Item 13, "Direction of Flight of Object," should be clarified so that vertical and horizontal motions are distinguished if possible, and so that motion is specified as the direction towards which the object appears to move. "Relative to Radar Settings" should include a statement of the type of radar set used.
