II NEW "FLYING DISC" RUMOR

At approximately 0230 on 31 October 1948, an unidentified object moving rapidly through the air was sighted and watched by three enlisted men stationed at Lagens, Terceira. The object was variously reported as being round, yellow-orange in color, larger than a star and moving upward and forward in a northerly direction from an estimated altitude of between two and three thousand feet. There were no attendant vapor trails or sound effects, and the object was lost from view within five minutes. It is believed by an authoritative source that the object was a weather balloon with an attached light swinging from it. This opinion has since been substantiated by weather squadron records showing the release of such a balloon at 0245 on 31 October 1948.

Incident #201, a, b -- Army Air Base, Azores -- 31 October 1943

There appears to be no astronomical explanation for this incident.

The observers agree in the general description, but not in the speed of the object: speeds are given from 30 to 600 MPH.

The most likely explanation on the basis of the meager information offered is that the object was a balloon carrying a swinging light.

No. 201. Pilot balloon sounding released from Azores station at 0300 ~~S.~~ Time of sight "about" that time. Description sounds very much like lighted pilot balloon sounding. Only discrepancy is speed which is reported from 25 M.P.H. to 800 M.P.H. If the lower speed is correct, object may be almost certainly assumed to be a weather balloon.

1. Reference is made to letter from your headquarters, MCIAKS, dated 9 March 1949, subject "Unidentified Flying Objects," and first endorsement thereto by this headquarters, dated 31 March 1949.

2. The incident summaries 173 through 233 have been checked against routine weather-balloon ascents made by the Air Force, Navy and Weather Bureau. Comments based on this review are inclosed.

3. It is recommended that the "Guide To Investigation Of Unidentified Aerial Objects" be changed as follows: Item 15, "Direction of Flight of Object," should be clarified so that vertical and horizontal motions are distinguished if possible, and so that motion is specified as the direction towards which the object appears to move. "Relative to Radar Settings" should include a statement of the type of radar set used.

Incident: 201

Staff Sgt [REDACTED] AATS APO 406, N. Y. reported the following: On 31 Oct 48 at approximately 0230Z he noticed a flat round object weaving overhead but maintaining a northerly course at an approximate speed of 160 MPH. Object was pale yellow or light orange color and not bluewhite. Seemed to maintain the same altitude and disappeared behind clouds. The object was viewed from 3 to 5 minutes. No vapor trails were seen nor was any sound heard.

Incident: 201A

At approximately 0230Z 31 Oct 48, Staff Sgt J. [REDACTED] pointed out an object to PFC [REDACTED] who described it as being round, orange in color and larger than a star. Object was moving in a northerly direction at an estimated speed of 800 MPH. Altitude was estimated as 2000-3000 feet above the clouds which were reported to be at 2500 feet. This would give an approximate altitude of from 4500 to 5500 feet. Object would swing forward and then backward but always maintained its forward velocity. Object was seen for approximately 2 minutes before it disappeared behind a cloud. No sound was heard.

Incident: 201 B

Vlas described object as a light bulb moving upward and forward at an estimated speed of 25 to 30 MPH. Object was white with a yellowish tint and was proceeding in a northerly direction and steadily gained altitude. Object disappeared behind a cloud and could not be located again. No vapor trails noticed and no sound heard.

It was the opinion of A-2, that object sighted in each instance was a weather balloon with a light swinging from it.
