I saw this object. It was definitely metal - not chrome, plane flying through swamp gas, - Venus, stars, moon, or any other ridiculous explanation - it was there!

My explanation of the sighting is that the USAF in the late 40's & early 50's discovered a new method of propulsion. The new power method was a certain type of metal surrounding a reactor which when activated by pulling out the rods caused electrons to pop off of the metal surface surrounding the reactor - this electron potential is then transferred via magnetic flux to drive a unique antigravity reverse polarity mechanism, also involved in the familiar gyroscope which makes possible the control to maneuver the craft. 





1. On March 5, 1967, Troop I Rolla advised reporting officer that they had received a letter from a Mrs. [redacted] who lives about two and one-half miles northwest of Bourbon, Missouri, [redacted]. She stated in the letter that she had been seeing lights in the woods behind her house and across the road and she seemed to think that they were unidentified flying objects.
2. Reporting officer contacted Mrs. [redacted] the afternoon of March 5, 1967, and she talked for sometime about the lights. She showed this officer where they had been seen and just what they did. She stated the first time she saw them they landed in the woods behind her house. She stated that there was one about the size of a dinner plate and after the one landed several smaller ones would leave it. The small ones were about the size of a baseball. The small ones would then go back to the large one and they would leave. The first time they were seen was February 8, 1967, and she stated she had seen them almost every night since. She also stated that several other people had seen them, including the children of [redacted] who live directly behind her. This officer contacted the Hunter family and talked with the six children ranging from five to seventeen years old. They stated they were carrying out some trash one afternoon late and saw this object about the size of a car coming towards them from out of the sky. They all dropped their trash and ran into the house. They have not seen any more.
3. The night of March 6, 1967, this officer went back to the home of Mrs. [redacted] and observed the area for about two hours. During this time officer observed eight airplanes, all flying from east to west or west to east. They have flashing red, green and white lights. Mrs. [redacted] pointed to one and said, "There is one now."
4. It is the opinion of this officer that Mrs. [redacted] lives in a flight path and what she is seeing is airplanes. When the airplanes are off some distance, they appear to be coming through the woods. Mrs. [redacted] is getting up in years and since she has been watching this for so long, this officer feels that her imagination is contributing to some of the things she sees.





h. Other unusual activity or conditions: Columbia, Mo., reported lightning to the west and east.

i. Flight of aircraft or balloon releases: Balloon released from Columbia, Mo., at 0000 Greenwich Time, 18 April 1967. Ozark Airlines Flight #319, DC-3, from St. Louis was warned of object before take-off but reported nothing, landed at 2150 in Jefferson City.

j. Preparing Officer: 2Lt S. T. Martin, Jr., Assistant Ground Training Officer, BOT, Ext. 3108, Box 693, Whiteman AFB, Missouri, 65301. Personnel interviews with both observers revealed a conscientious and professional attitude toward their job. Their initial report was accomplished in accordance with the duties of their occupation to report such objects observed in flight paths.

a. Description of object:

(1) Shape: Round and flat (World War I helmet shaped) - two oval shaped undercarriages.

(2) Size: 340 feet across.

(3) Color: bluish-white glisten, not mercury type, unusual glow, cold light, not a harsh light, metallic glisten.

(4) Number: Only one large vehicle observed at first, but two smaller vehicles dropped from under the larger vehicle four minutes later.

(5) Formation: Smaller vehicles dropped and took off from larger vehicle at a great speed, one heading east and the other north.

(6) Discernible features: Metallic glisten, glow shining from under the larger vehicle that lit up the area underneath and produced a glowing effect.

(7) Trails or exhausts: N/A

(8) Sound: N/A

(9) Other pertinent or unusual features: Observer was frightened by the glow of the light from the vehicle.

b. Description of course of object:

(1) What first called the attention of the observer to object: Object came over a cliff above the car with lights shining down on the car, observer thought the lights were from aircraft and became frightened.

(2) Angle of elevation and azimuth of object when first observed: 45° - 90° overhead.

(3) Angle of elevation of object upon disappearance: Low to the southwest about 40°.

(4) Direction of movement/maneuvers of the object: Moved right from directly overhead and headed southwest.

(5) How did the object disappear: Gradually to the southwest.

(6) How long was the object visible: Approximately 45 minutes. }

c. Manner of observation:

(1) Ground - visual

(2) Used 8 power binoculars, 8V Clement, made in Paris, France.

d. Time and date of sighting: 17 April 1967, 2100 Central Standard or 0300 Greenwich Time.

e. Location of observer: On a highway, #94, (state) about 4½ miles north of Jefferson City airport on a curve in the road below the nearby bluffs, Longitude 92.25W, Latitude 38.65N.

f. Identifying information on observer: Mr. [REDACTED], Jefferson City, Missouri, 65101. [REDACTED] elementary school in Mokane, Missouri and [REDACTED] of the same. He has a BA degree in history and elementary education from the University of Missouri, as well as a BS degree in Science from the same college. He is 25 years of age and the Air Force should have most of his physical and mental records, as he was at one time in AFROTC. Seems to be a reliable citizen and told his story in a logical manner.

g. Weather and winds - aloft conditions at time and place of sightings:

(1) Observer's account - Clear, no overcast, fair and mild.

(2) Visibility - 15 miles

(3) Amount of cloud cover - 5500 scattered, 10,000 overcast.

(4) Temperature - 78°, Dew point 68°.

(5) Wind - SFC 240° 15kts, 6000 320° 25kts, 10,000 310° 30kts, 16,000 280° 40kts, 20,000 230° 41kts, 30,000 260° 83kts, 50,000 270° 49kts.

(6) Balloons released at Columbia, Missouri at 0000 Greenwich Time, 18 April 1967 indicated: Temperature Gradient (Aug) SFC - 60: +1.5° C/1000M; 060 - 400: -5.7° C/1000M.

h. Other conditions or activity in the area: Lightning reported west and east of Columbia, Missouri.

i. Flights of aircraft in the area: Ozark Airlines, Flight 319, A DC-3, departing St. Louis at 2130 was informed of the observation before departure and arrived in Jefferson City at 2150.

j. Preparing Officer: 2Lt S.T. Martin, Jr., Box 693, Whiteman AFB, Missouri, 65301. The UFO sighting of Mr. [REDACTED] is the same object sighted by Mr. [REDACTED] and Mr. [REDACTED] in the accompanying report. Mr. [REDACTED] has an educational background that substantiates a degree of credibility to his observation. However, other reports of the observation do not substantiate its size, shape, or two smaller vehicles as he reported. Mr. [REDACTED] has no avid interest in UFO's or a background concerning UFO reports, but now firmly holds suspicions concerning such objects and has subjective feelings toward them. I feel that his viewing of an object is valid, but his description of the details of the object may be exaggerated due to his highly emotional condition at the time of the sighting.


