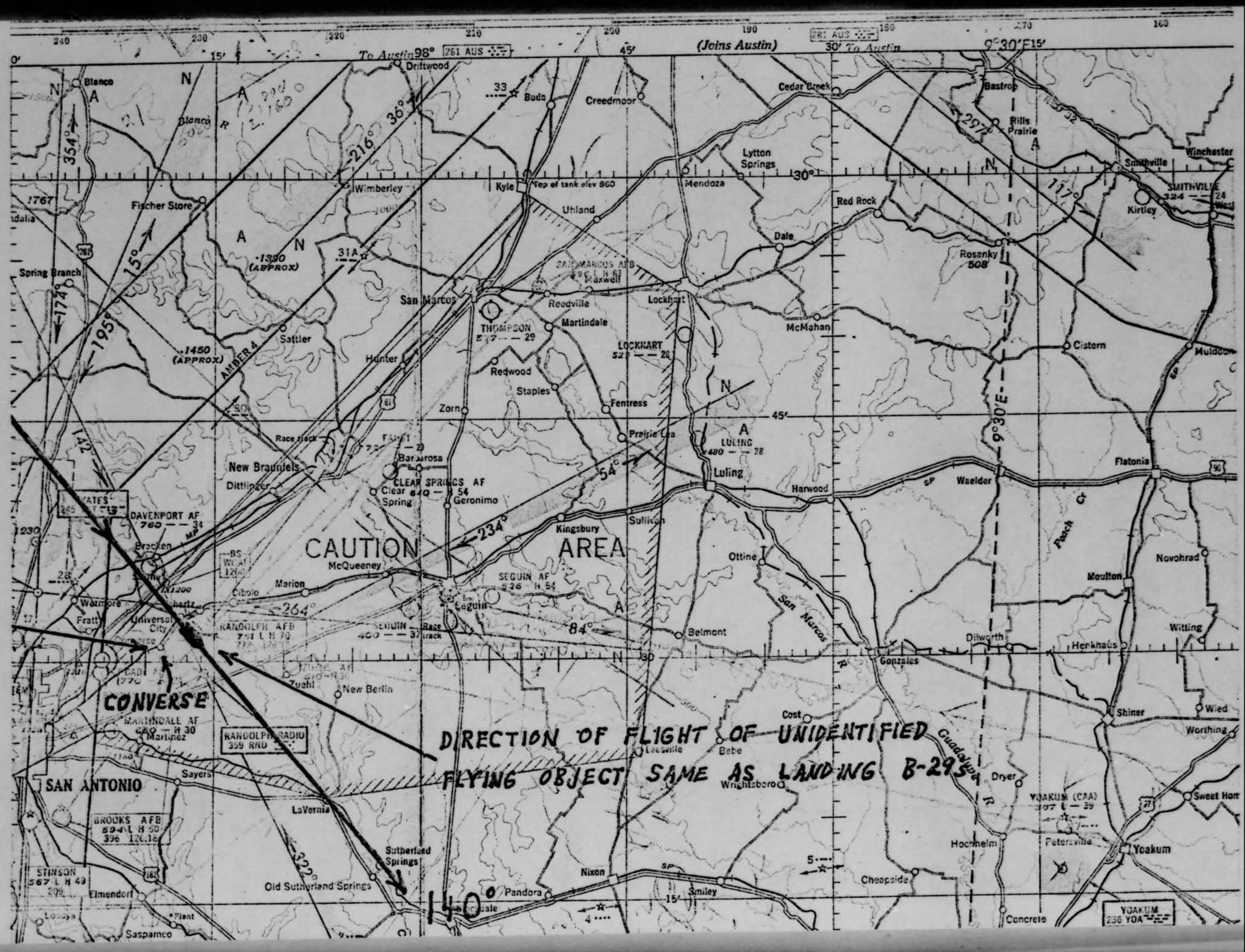

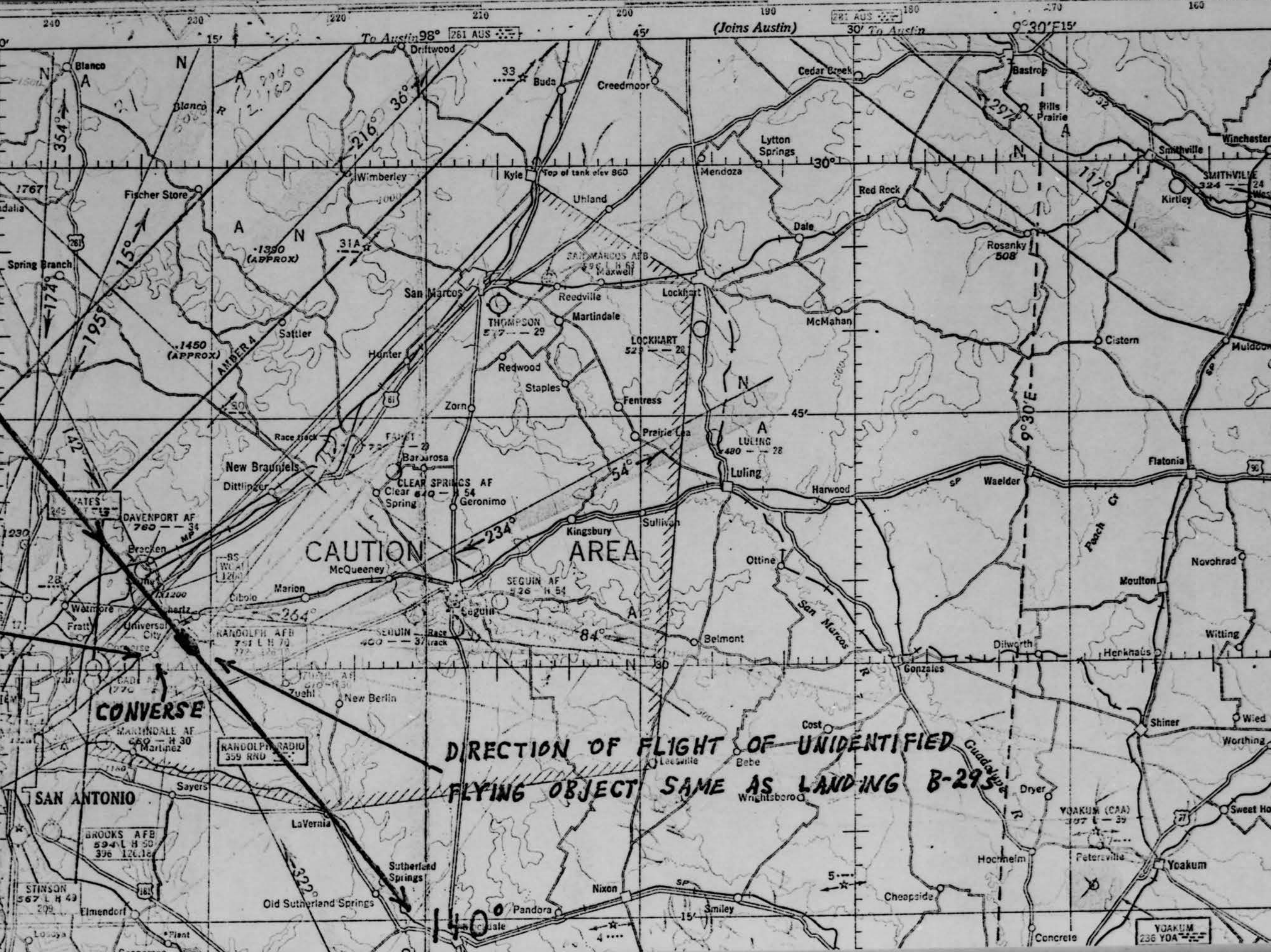

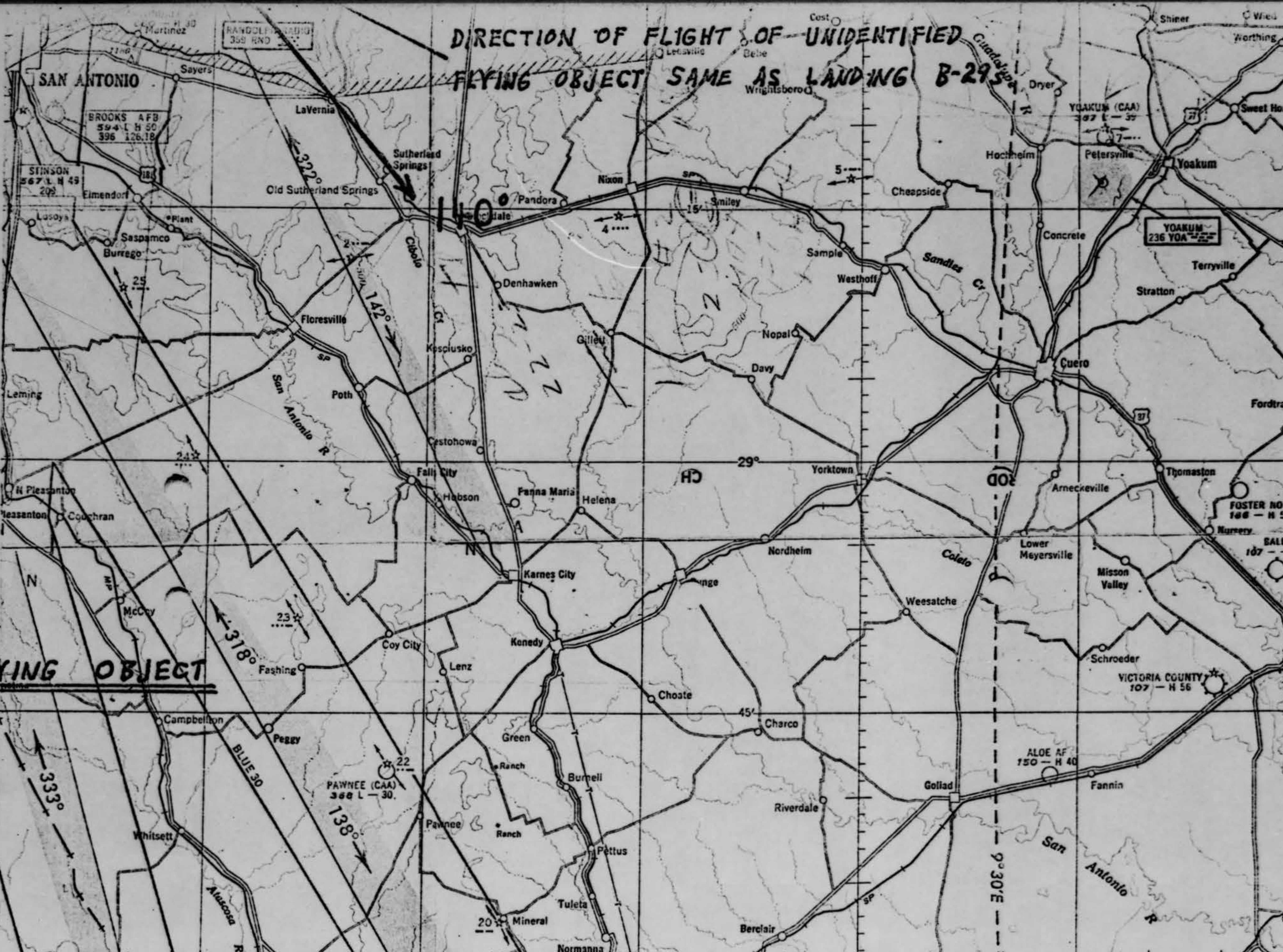

1. Reference teletype, this headquarters, 221545 July 1952, number GIO 1056 E FLYOB RPT and AFL 200-5, dated 29 April 1952, a report is submitted on the sighting of unidentified aerial objects.

2. A single unidentified aerial object was sighted by a civilian, Mrs. [REDACTED], on the afternoon of 21 July near Converse, Texas. A silver colored fuselage-shaped object appeared to the North East of the observer at what appeared to be a low altitude traveling from North West to South East at a rapid rate of speed on a heading of approximately 140 degrees. The object maintained level flight until it made an abrupt turn upward and climbed vertically out of sight.

3. This is the fourth reported sighting of unidentified objects made to this headquarters in the San Antonio Area during the last two months. Resemblance between this object and the other sightings in the area is slight. (Refer to AIIR's, this headquarters, dated 23 May 1952, 24 June 1952 and 19 July 1952.)

4. Subject's husband, a Student Officer at this station, related a similar sighting one week earlier but not reported until this date. Information on his object are included in this report.

1. At approximately 1230 hours, 22 July 1952 the Wing Intelligence Officer received a report that a civilian had observed an unidentified object on the evening of 21 July 1952.

2. Immediate investigation revealed that the civilian was Mrs. [REDACTED], wife of Capt. J. [REDACTED] who is a student officer undergoing crew training here at Randolph AFB. Interrogation revealed that the object sighted appeared as an elongated fuselage with a pointed nose and no wings. It had a protruding box-like empennage without any vertical stabilizer. Only one was sighted which was a shiny silver color.

3. Other aerodynamic features or the propulsion system could not be determined. It definitely had no trail or exhaust. The speed could not be accurately determined but subject stated that it travelled very fast — much faster than the B-29's which were also in view landing at Randolph. The speed of the B-29's was 150 MPH. No sound was audible other than that emitted from the conventional aircraft.

4. The object flew in a straight line in level flight from the North West to the South East on an approximate heading of 140 degrees until it made an abrupt turn upward and climbed vertically out of sight. This turn was described as a square corner. The direction of flight was determined as the same as the direction of the B-29's landing at Randolph, which were utilizing both East and West parallel runways, having a magnetic heading of 140 degrees.

5. The sighting was made at approximately 1630 hours, 21 July 1952. It was observed for several seconds (at least 3 and not more than 5).

6. The observation was made visually from the ground by Mrs. [REDACTED] in front of her home in Converse, Texas (29 degrees 31 minutes North latitude and 98 degrees 19 minutes West longitude). Mrs. [REDACTED] was outdoors facing about North East when the object passed across the sky at an undetermined altitude from the North West to the South East. She described the altitude as being low and near the horizon but slightly above the flying B-29's which were in the traffic pattern at about 1500 feet above the ground 3 to 4 miles away.

7. Mrs. [REDACTED] claims to have been around aircraft and airfields for over 3 years and seems familiar with many types of civilian and military planes. This information was confirmed by her husband, who is a bombardier crew member. She claimed that the flying object did not resemble anything she ever seen before.

8. The weather at the time was 5,000 feet scattered clouds with a visibility of 15 miles. The winds aloft at 5,000 feet were from 150 degrees at 21 knots. Meteorologists stated that there were no weather conditions which could account for the sighting. No fragments were seen or discovered and no photos of the object exist. There was no interception or identification action requested by this headquarters.

9. The only air traffic reported was 4 B-29's flying locally in the traffic pattern at Randolph AFB.

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COMMENTS of Preparing Officer:

10. Evaluation of the source cannot be accurately judged. However, after interrogating the husband of the source, Capt. ██████████, it was learned that he stands very firmly behind the statements made by his wife. Neither Capt. or Mrs. ██████████ could be located to sign certificate statements prior to submission of this report. The only special significance that could be rendered the sighting made by Mrs. ██████████ was the fact that her husband related a similar sighting in the same area just one week earlier, but failed to report it until 21 July. This possibly accounts for his confidence in his wife's report. Capt. ██████████ experience is submitted below as further supporting evidence to his wife's report.

a. A sighting of an unidentified aerial object was made by Capt. ██████████ near Randolph Air Force Base during the afternoon of 14 July 1952. This information was unreported until 1230 hours 22 July 1952.

b. This object was described as fuselage in shape with no wings or tail assembly and had a rather pointed nose. It was silver colored, and looked larger than a fighter aircraft at his estimated distance of 10 to 15 miles.

c. Other aerodynamic features or the propulsion system could not be determined. There was no trail or exhaust. The speed was estimated to be better than 1500 miles an hour. This was determined by the distance the object covered at its estimated 10 to 15 mile range from the observer, together with the distance the observer's aircraft had covered at an indicated air speed of 150 MPH during the time of observation. No sound could be heard due to the engine noise of the aircraft.

d. The object remained in level flight going in the opposite direction of the aircraft (approximately 140 degrees), at about the same altitude of his aircraft, then turned suddenly upward and climbed vertically out of sight.

e. The sighting was made at approximately 1800 hours, 14 July 1952, visually from the nose section of a B-29 aircraft flying at about 1500 feet above the ground in the traffic pattern on the down wind leg at Randolph AFB on a heading of 320 degrees, air speed 150 MPH indicated. Capt. ██████████ first noticed the object at about 135 degrees relative bearing from his aircraft heading. He observed it in level flight going in the opposite direction of his aircraft long enough to call the Instructor Pilot's attention to it, look back and see it climbing out of sight. This was estimated to be at least 5 seconds. The Instructor Pilot, Major Maximilian J. Hadley, was the only other crew member who saw the object. He confirms Capt. ██████████ sighting.

f. Capt. ██████████ is a bombardier on a student crew undergoing training here at Randolph AFB. He has over 1000 flying hours and has been flying off and on since 1943.

g. Only scattered clouds were noticed in the area at the time of the sighting. Winds at pattern altitude were light from the South East. There were no fragments or no photographs taken. No interception or identification action was taken.

h. Several other B-29's were flying in the pattern at the time.

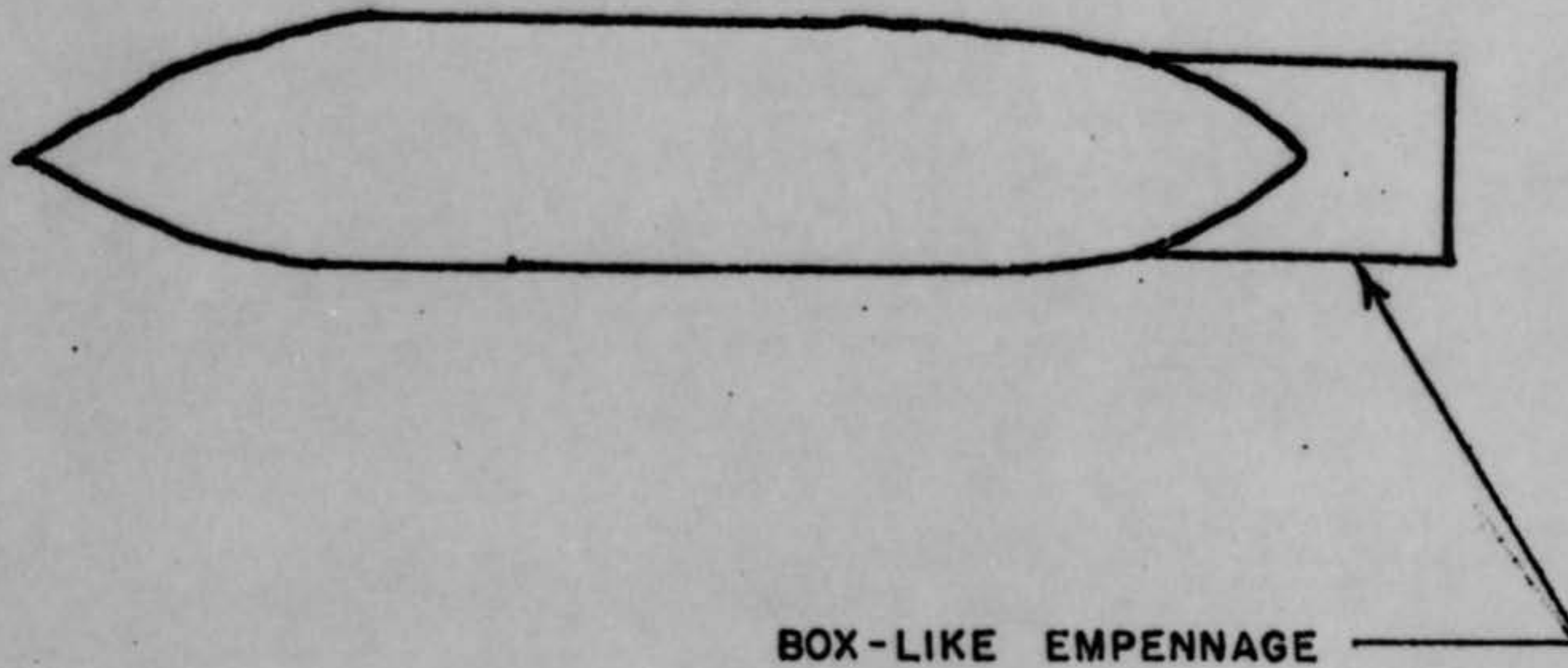
