Captain Van Diver in our Safety Office sent me your letter in which you requested information and books on UFOs. I would first recommend consulting the public library and, if they are not able to satisfy your requirements, you might write to:

That agency, part of the Secretary of the Air Force's Office, is geared to answer specific questions and provide more information than we can.

In regard to your questions about helicopters, they can descend in a straight line, hover at a standstill and then take off in a straight line. As you can see in the attached photo, one of our Kirtland helicopters is at a standstill fighting a fire.

The search lights used on the night in question are a series of lights rather than one single light of the World War II searchlight variety. Thus, the lights would appear to be a glow rather than be a single beam. Dust would also make it glow. Helicopters when nearing the earth create large clouds of dust from the wind generated by their rotating propeller blades. Helicopters are also equipped with blinking red and white lights as well as red and green lights.

One of our helicopters should be in the Los Lunas/Valencia area next Thursday evening (1 June) and you might be able to compare what you saw earlier.

We in the Air Force are doing our best to answer UFO queries in an open and honest manner. We try to explain each sighting. Your sighting is an example of our efforts to investigate and determine what was sighted.

Dear Sir:

I received your letter in which you state that the sighting I witnessed was a helicopter operating high-powered search lights, and that the atmosphere contained large amounts of blowing sand and dust.

I'm sorry to say this but I cannot possibly accept this as what I saw. In the first place the light was not a directed beam of light and it was a very large sphere of very very bright light that turned orange and red, getting dimmer as it descended. I'm sure I can tell the difference between a search light and a steady glow that does not blink or change colors, it just seemed to fade from bright yellow to orange to red at it stopped in mid-air. Can a helicopter descend in a straight line straight down, then hover at a standstill for a few seconds before taking off in a straight line through rather fast?

these sightings seem to want to be quieted so badly. For instance the sighting at Socorro. They had a plausible story from a man that was not merely someone who didn't know the difference between a searchlight and something else. When I was 17 years old I saw three U.F.O.s but I feared ridicule so I kept it to myself. Outside of my parents I told no one. I assure you, I'm not the type of person who makes up tales to draw attention to myself. I'm an average housewife that stays to home. I've too much to keep me occupied & have no time to run around telling tales of things I "thought" I saw.
